Fast gun contest scheduled

A contest to decide who is the "Fastest Gun in Alaska" will be held at the KIDDIE KARNIVAL & TRADE FAIR, combined, which is scheduled for July 31st, August 1st and 2nd at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds.

This contest limited to children under 12, will select a champion who will be eligible to compete for a trip to Abilene Kansas for the National Championship.

Qualifying and elimination contest will be held prior to the Karnival, with the finals to be held in Chugiak.

Competition cap guns must have at least a four inch barrel, revolving cylinder and be capable of being "fanned" or cocked. They must be holstered in a holster that covers all of the barrel and 90% of the cylinder. The holster must be western style, as also the gun. It must be tied down not swinging or open type. This Kiddie Karnival, the first of its kind to be held in this area, will be free to all children under 12, and a charge of 25¢ for all adults and those over 12. Games, concessions and entertainment will all be aimed at the younger set, and special surprise guests are being planned for the little ones.

Spring Contaminated

The Spring, which is located at mile 18½, which has for years been the water supply for a large percentage of this community, has been tested and found contaminated.

Water samples which had been taken in to the Department of Health, the Army and the Air Force have all come back with the same report. "THIS WATER IS UNFIT FOR HUMAN CONSUMPTION

It is believed that this bad water has been the cause of the outbreak of yellow jaundice in this area.

Residents of Chugiak are cautioned against using water from this spring for drinking. If it is absolutely necessary to obtain water at this source, it should be thoroughly boiled

MAN SERIOUSLY INJURED IN HIGHWAY ACCIDENT

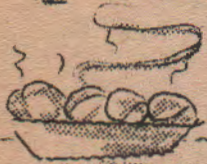
Two men escaped injury, while a third was seriously hurt when the car in which they were traveling went out of control and left the road at mile 19 on June 10th at 6:25 am.

Tom Dutchman suffered two broken thighs and was taken to the Native Service Hospital by the ambulance of the Chugiak Vol. Fire Co. Dutchman was thrown from the car when it crashed into a boulder after careening wildly from one side of the road to the other, finally ending up in the ditch on its side. The driver, Rielly Mathews and 2nd passenger a man named Hamilton were uninjured. All three men were employees of the Alaska Native Service Hospital in Anchorage.

The car, which had been traveling at an excessive speed, was badly damaged to an undetermined extent.

COOK FOR JUNE
MARGARET SWANSON

All the Swanson family is especially fond of fresh homemade bread, and Margaret enjoys keeping them well supplied with a variety of fresh baked breads and rolls.

This recipe for Parker House Rolls is an especially good one and Margaret fixes them quite often for her family.

PARKER HOUSE ROLLS

- MIX: 1 cup condensed milk
1 cup hot water
- ADD: 2 Tbs. sugar
4 tbs. butter
1 1/2 tsp. salt
- STIR until dissolved.
- ADD 1 yeast cake, dissolved in 4 tbs. warm water.
- BEAT IN: 2 eggs. (optional)
- SIFT IN: 5 1/2 cups all purpose flour.
- KNEAD with hands (using only enough flour to make a spongy easily handled dough)
- BRUSH with melted butter.
- COVER with dampened cloth, & allow to rise for 2 hours.
- ROLL the dough on floured board to thickness of 1/2 inch.
- CUT with round biscuit cutter, crease biscuit in half with dull edge of knife; fold over and press edges together with fingers.
- PLACE on greased baking sheet to rise.
- BAKE 20 min. in hot oven. (400°)

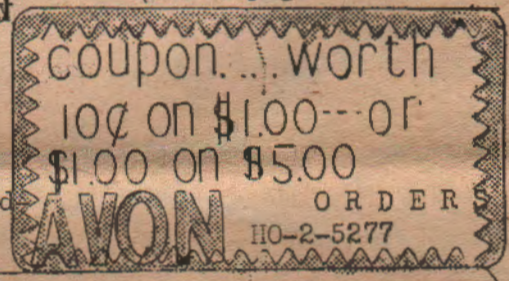
It is always a pleasure, when persons from other state move to our community discover that their favorite services and products are available here also.

The team regrets that they are losing Skip Asher. He is giving up baseball because of illness.


One of the new pitchers that is showing outstanding ability is Lester Stephens, who is 10 years old.

The GREEN THUMB Corner



WILD EDIBLE PLANTS

This article would seem to be directed to the unsuccessful gardner, or those with no gardens at all. However it is of interest that there are a great number of wild plants that are edible. Some are quite tasty, others barely palatable, but none the less nourishing and containing much food value.

Most of us are already familiar with the variety of wild berries that are available; but few know of the many plants which have edible leaves, stems and roots.

The wild celery plants is similiar in flavor to domestic celery although a much larger plant. This is used when young and may be eaten raw or cooked.

Another plant is the Lamb's quarter, or pigweed, which is an excellent substitute for the difficult to grow spinach. This is found in great quantity in this area and is easily recognized. Leaves are oval shaped, toothed and grayish green in color, with small insignificant greenish blossoms. These are cooked like spin-

ach, and is very tasty.

The very well known Fireweed, when young makes an excellent addition to a salad, as does the dwarf Fireweed or Rock-Rose.

An excellent beverage may be made from the leaves of the plant known as Labrador Tea, which grows in profusion in this area.

Among the many edible roots which can be found in this area is the silverweed or wild sweet potato. This plant is sometimes mistakenly called buttercup because of the bright yellow waxy blossom. The roots may be boiled or baked as one would a sweet potato. The roots of the wild celery mentioned earlier may be cooked and eaten, the flavor resembling rutabagas.

Many of the varieties of seaweed found on the beaches are very tasty when made into pickles or dried.

The number of plants that may be eaten in one form or other are very great, and listed in the book put out by the university of Alaska Extension Service titled "Wild Edible and Poisonous Plants of Alaska. This

book goes into great detail describing the appearance of the plants, their location and use. Also there are illustrations of each plant that they may be easily recognized. A copy of this book may be had by requesting it from the Extension Service.

easier and don't work nearly
as hard when the rains come.

This past week brush and
windrow fires have accounted
for all of the man hours put
in by our firemen.

guish these blazes, it is up to
us, the citizens of Chugiak to
do everything to lighten the
load of these men and prevent
these wastful fires.

Most of the brush fires are
started by intentional burn-
ing of windrows, trash or
brush. With everything tin-
der dry, it is very easy for
the slightest breeze to carry
the fire out of the original
area and a forest or grass
fire is started.

All of our Volunteer Fire-
man are businessmen who must
take time from their businesses
to answer these calls. They
receive no pay for this work
and since the equipment in use
is C.D., government owned, no
charge can be made to non-sub-
scribers. Also fighting fires
of this type is especially
hard on the meager equipment
and at present the tanker is
sitting down at Peter's Creek
out of commission, after at-
tempting to take on more water
to put out a brush fire in the
vicinity of mile 21. With
only the jeep in operation at
this time, if someone's home
should catch fire, there would
be no equipment capable of
answering the call.

On Tuesday, June 16th. the
Fire Company answered two calls
both of them brush fires. One
was an old fire that had re-
ignited in the Phillips sub-
division and the other the one
at mile 21.

The members of the Fire Co.
cannot stress too strongly the
need to refrain from any burn-

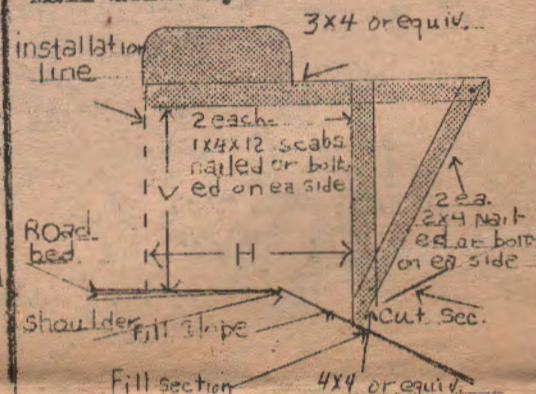
ing.

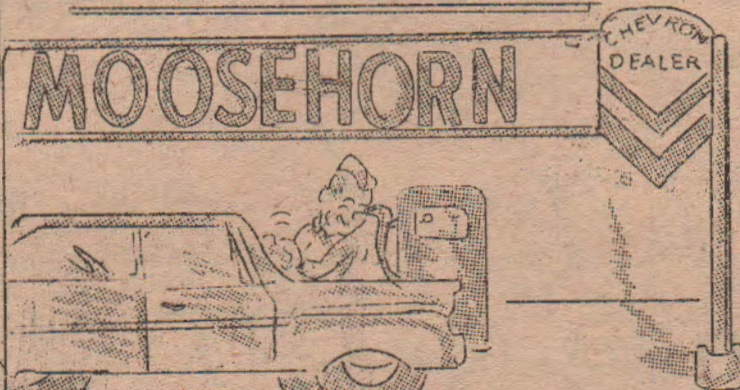



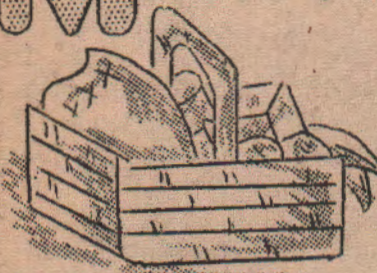
