MORE ABOUT THE SPRING

Last week the COURIER pub-  
lished the results of a test  
of the water taken from a  
spring used by the public in  
this community.

For some reason this report  
has caused considerable con-  
fusion and there has been  
some question of the authen-  
ticity of our report and the  
source of our information.

The COURIER did not instig-  
ate the test of the water,  
nor do we have any interest

The information was publish-  
ed in response to a letter  
from Mr. Calvin Winey Jr. of  
the Alaska Department of Health

This letter was dated JUNE,  
11th, 1959 and was sent to  
Mr. James McDowell, former  
publisher of the COURIER:

"Dear Mr. McDowell:

It would be greatly appreci-  
ated if you could put an ar-  
ticle in your local newspaper  
on the stream near your estab-  
lishment, which many people  
use as a source of water. We  
have recently received a large  
number of inquiries regarding  
this water supply.

This stream is typical of  
most surface water supplies,  
in that it is subject to con-  
tamination from human trespass.  
This particular stream has sev-  
eral homes on it and we have  
recently had a series of con-  
taminated water samples from  
it. There have been at least  
six cases of infectious hep-  
atitis reported to this office  
this spring which have been  
associated with water users  
from this stream.

If a surface water supply  
must be used, it should be  
treated. Such water may be  
treated in various ways.

1. Bring water to a rolling  
boil and then allow it  
to cool. If the water  
has a flat taste, pour  
it back and forth be-  
tween two containers.
2. A drop of Clorex or Pur-  
ex can be added to each  
(next col.)

(water, purification, cont)  
quart of water. The wat-  
er should be allowed to  
stand for at least 30 min-  
utes before using. For  
large quantities of water  
such as 5 gallons,  $\frac{1}{4}$  tea-  
spoon of Clorex or Pur-  
ex can be used.

The best procedure is for the  
individual to have their own  
approved type and properly  
located ground water supply.

Our office is 327 Eagle in An-  
chorage, and we will be glad  
to help individuals regarding  
these matters. Thank you.

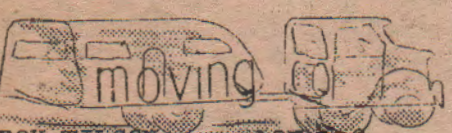

For her final recipe, Margaret has given us a delightful confection that requires rather elaborate preparation, but is delicious enough to warrant it.

## DIVINITY ROLL

### PART I

Put through a grinder:

- 1 cup raisins
- 2 cups stoned dates
- 1 cup figs
- 1 cup nut meats.

Moisten with orange juice to make a thick paste.

### PART II

Boil to thread stage 238°

- 2 cups sugar
- 2 tbs. white corn syrup
- 1/2 cup hot water

Whip until stiff.

- 2 egg whites
- 1/8 tsp. salt

POUR the syrup on the egg whites in a steady stream whipping constantly. When thick, pour divinity onto a sheet of waxed paper. Cover with part I.

ROLL while hot.

CHILL, cut into slices.

# The GREEN THUMB Corner

Since we started printing this column, we have received a number of questions from people who are new at gardening in Alaska. We have attempted, to the best of our ability to research the subjects involved, and have printed the information in some of our preceding articles.

However, there is a great deal of information that is not readily available, and we regret that we are unable to answer all questions.

We would like to suggest to all those who are interested in learning how to overcome some of the problems encountered in gardening in this area, that a visit to the experimental farm in Palmer will prove an enjoyable and educational experience.

The employees at the farm are both friendly and helpful. They are only too pleased to show one around, and to point out the various crops and plants that they are working with.

Also, any special problems may be aired here and expert advise will be forth coming.

Of course, it may confuse a person who has heard that there are certain crops that cannot be grown in Alaska, to find the selfsame plants flourishing at the farm, but it is through the efforts of these workers that perhaps some day hardy strains of these plants will be available for the gardeners of Alaska.

Some of the problems that they can solve are, for example; how to make onions develop beyond the "green onion" stage; or what to do about spinach "bolting" or going to seed before it is mature enough to harvest.

In the former case, they suggested keeping the soil scraped away from the bulb of the onion, leaving only enough to cover the roots. In the case of the spinach, they suggest the planting of New Zealand, not a true spinach, but actually a superior plant, which resembles spinach in flavor and which does not tend to bolt in this climate.

Even the reader with no problems, or for that matter no garden, cannot help but

profit from a visit to the farm, and will be amazed at the strides that are being made to overcome the problems of gardening in this land of long days, but short summers.

## GARDEN CLUB MEETS

The Chugiak Garden Club met on Monday, June 15th. at the home of Dick Hannen at the Isaac Walton League Range and Picnic Grounds.

The Lady Bugs which the club had imported to eliminate the aphids in this area were distributed and as of this printing all have been released.

These bugs are small round orange beetle type insects with small dark spots. They are a beneficial insect and eat the aphids which are destroying our birch trees. Anyone seeing these lady bugs in the area, are reminded that they are not a pest and are requested not to molest them.

The next meeting will be Monday 20th. at the home of Earl Ray, in Peters Creek.
