It is not often that one discovers that their homestead has somehow become the hub of an informal community.

This, however was the experience of our cook for June, Margaret Swanson. When she and her husband Paul and his sister Pen homesteaded the land opposite what is now the Chugiak School, they had no idea that some day "Swanee Slopes" would become one of the busiest places in Chugiak.

In fact Margaret probably had little inkling of what an interesting future she would have when she came to the Matanuska Valley to settle on a farm with her parents. This was in 1941. Margarets family left their home in Seattle Wash. to take over one of the colony farms. Margaret met Paul in June of that year, and by November they were married after what must have been a whirlwind courtship.

They lived in Anchorage for a year, while Paul worked at Ft. Richardson as a surveyor.

Shortly after the outbreak of World Mar II, Paul enlisted in the Navy as a Seabee.

Margaret followed him to California, where he was stationed at Port Hueneme: They lived in Ownard until 1945, when they returned to Alaska. Shortly after theirreturn, they homesteaded the land which wasto become known as Swannee Slopes.

The Swansons now have four children. Martha, who is 17, Steve -13, Don who is 8 and little Holly who is 21.

When the then territory of Alaska decided to put the Chugiak School accross from Swannee Slopes, the Swansons fate was decided.

As the school grew by leaps and bounds, the one teacher

apartment became inadequate for the growing teaching staff also extra class room space was desperately needed until further construction could be completed. Suddenly the Swansons found themselves constructing rental units for the teachers, and temporary classroom space to rent to the territory. As new buildings were added to the school, the forme classrooms were converted into more apartments for the ever increasing teaching staff. The next big event for

Swannee Slopes wasthe sale of land and a building to the Methodist Church. Then a few years later, Paul was selected to be the local postmaster and the community post-office was set up in the small grocery store that they were operating. The latest addition to this small community was the moving of the Public Library into a building that Paul has donated for that purpose. This same building twice a month is used for the Well Baby Clinic when the Public Health Murse visits Chugiak.

so now Margaret and Paul, who dream of someday retiring to a wilderness homestead find Themselves in the center of a collection of housing units, house trailers, school bus garages, and an assortment of public buildings.

Despite all this ativity, Margaret leads a quiet life and devotes herself sxclusively to her family. Aside from the PTA and W.S.C.S of the liethodist Church (of which she is a past officer) she is not too interested in club work. She likes to sew and garden and confessions that she enjoys writing. Last rinter she took a course in Literature Appreciation at the Anchorage Community College.

Paul and Margaret live in a lovely two story home, which was converted from a two classroom school building that Paul at one time leased to the territory. Margaret enjoys her home and enjoys cooling for her family. This coming nonth we will peek into her kitchen and sample some of the dishes that the Swansons enjoy.

Margaret says that not only has the following dessert the virtue of being good, but it is also very economical, requiring no milk or eggs. This is sometimes very important here in Alaska.

However the COURIER is happy to report that in the spots not readily accessable to cars (and there are very many of these) the fishing is just as fabuluous as ever.

Fisherman returning from some of the rivers and lakes accross the inlet tell tales of Grayling striking at every cast, and one man fishing with two fly's on his line caught two fish with a single cast. At this particular lake limits were caught within a very short time, and the fishermen removed the barbs

Ed Bellringer, of mile 23 returned this past weekend from afishing trip accross the inlet with a catch that included several rainbow over 30 inches long, plus a lake trout 28 inches long. In fact the story itself is hard to wallow, except that the evidence in this case was viewed first hand. It seems hard to understand why this fish was still hungry enough to strike at a lure.

So all we can say, is that don't feel that tales of the wonderful fishing in Alaska has been exagerated. COMPOST

Despite the fact that most crops flourish in Alaska by the addition of commercial fertilizers to the soil, there are some who feel that the addition of some organic material benefits the soil. This is particularly true when there is a great amout of clay or sand present. The ideal material is barn-

The ideal material is barnyard manure, which has been usas fertilizer for centuries.

In this part of the country, unfortunately, this product is quite scarce; most farmers keeping all that is produced for their own gardens.

A substitute for manure may be made by anyone, however by the use of compost. This consists of decayed plant matter which when, dided to the soil replaces some of the minerals which growing plants remove, and at the same time, ands the organic material which goes into the making of rich topsoil.

'The spring is a good time to start a compost pile. Usually everyone will have an accumulation of fallen leaves which they will rake from their lawn and garden. These leaves should be placed in a pile and covered with some dirt. It is best to "sandwich" lay-ers of leaves between layers of dirt. Throughout the summer lawn clippings, tops from vegetables or other plant matter can be added. This pile should be kept damp and stirred from time to time.

By the following spring, the compost will be reduced to a rich, decayed organic material which when added to flower beds and gardens does much to enrich the soil.

There is now on the market a chemical called "Compo", which when added to the pile speeds up the decaying proccess and produces usable compost much sooner.

Here in this area there is a valuable source of compost ready made in the windrows which border most of the fields and roads.

These piles which have been dozed up several years ago, usually contain a rich mixture of moss, earth and other organic material, and May be mixed directly into the soil of lawn or garden. The aly disadvantage involved in this case, is that usually there is a large am-

ount of roots and sticks buried in these windrows which would have to be removed before the compost could be used.

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
