COOK FOR JULY
LUCILLE SHOOSHANIAN

The foods used for desserts of foreign lands vary as much as do their other dishes, and one of the dessert dishes popular at the Armenian table is a rich candylike confection that is very simple to make.

IMRIG HALVA (HAL -va)

- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 cups Farina or Cream of Wheat
- 3 cups simple syrup or diluted honey
(1 cup honey or sugar to 2 cups of water)
- 1/4 cup pænemuts or chopped almonds (optional)

Melt butter and add cereal and nuts.
BRAISE well, stirring constantly to prevent burning.

When light brown, add HOT syrup.
BEAT with wire whip so that no lumps form.
POUR into buttered baking dish.
BAKE for 35 minutes at 400°.
REMOVE from oven stir well and bake an additional 10 minutes.
SERVE hot or cold.

TIP FOR CAKE MIXES

Have you ever tried your food blender to mix a box cake? It does a wonderful job and saves the trouble of having to clean up bowl and mixers. Follow the directions on the box for using an electric mixer, with the

(cake mixes) exception that all the liquids be placed in the blender jar, and the blender turned on. Then slowly add the dry ingredients, using a rubber spatula to stir if necessary. Beat for the length of time specified for electric mixers. Pour into cake pans and bake.

BIRCHWOOD GIRL TO WED

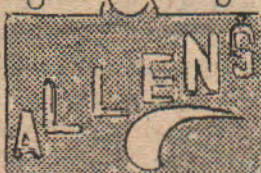

Rental of CBA equipment, such as rides, P.A. system etc to the Valley Fair or other undertakings were discussed. Also the rental of the Carnival Hall itself was considered.

Mr. Les Fetrow, who is at present associated with Rand Enterprises, suggested the his organization was interested in the rental of a building of that size on a permanent basis. He agreed to appear at the next CBA meeting with a formal offer. Also the possibility of renting the building to the state for additional classroom space was mentioned.

Another suggestion was the utilization of undeveloped property on the 30 acres of ground. One suggestion given with a grain of salt was that of a community cemetery.

A list of the creditors was read and the amount of money owed to them.

Mr. Tom Towne offered the suggestion that perhaps some organizations or individuals might be willing to loan sums of money on a no interest basis to CBA in the interest of helping to reduce the debt.

Mr. Tedrow said that any such loans would not be solicited, but would be welcomed. However, he stated that CBA would pay interest at the current rate charged by banks.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Towne proved that his was not idle talk by writing a personal check for \$100. as a loan to CBA, thereby setting the precedent. Any clubs with surplus funds might follow suit, thereby helping CBA and at the same time earning money for their organization (next col)

by the interest payed.

Pther possibilities were sale of CBA's stock of prizes to the Valley Fair or the sale of assets on the Carnival grounds. The land, it was agreed, should be retained in any event for a community park.

The outgoing board announced that they had decided that in their opinion there should be no more Carnivals produced by CBA. However the new board will be faced with the final decision. Any thing decided upon will depend on the result of the KoKo's Karnival to be held at the last of the month. Should this prove successful, it could very well be the answer to the problem at hand. Carnivals produced by professionals with CBA receiving a percentage of the profit.

Mr. Tedrow announced that CBA was planning to operate five booths at KoKo's Karnival. They will be the Baseball toss, a Soft-Ball Toss; A ring-toss (The Chugiak Bear Booth) and a bottle toss.

A call was made for volunteers to work in these booths and also for personnell to work in the stock room.

It was announced that board meetings are open to the general public, and anyone interested is urged to attend.

The next meeting of the new board was set for July 21st, at the Carnival Hall.

GARDEN CLUB MEETS

BERRY TIME

The time is approaching when the first of the wild berries should be ready for picking.

There is a large of variety of edible berries growing throughout Alaska, some more well known than others.

The first to ripen in this area are the red currants, a very good jelly and jam fruit. Newcomers often confuse these with the high-bush cranberry, because of the similiar leaf and appearance of the fruit.

The high-bush is used for jelly making tod, but does not make satisfactory jam because of the large flat seed. It is seed that is the most positive way of identifying the fruit and avoiding confusion with the currant.

The currant has several small round seeds, as apposed to the single flat seed of the high-bush cranberry. Where currants are scarce, the high-bush may be mixed with the currants for jelly without changing the (next col)

color or flavor to any extent.

The red raspberry is a very popular and plentiful berry hereabouts. It is used for a pie fruit as well as for preserving.

Blueberries require a little more effort to gather, growing at the higher altitudes. These may be found on the upper slopes of the mountains in this area, or to those who prefer a long drive to a short climb, they are very plentiful at mile 90 on the Glen Highway.

The lowbush cranberry is the most versatile of all the native berries, it can be used in the same manner as the domestic cranberry for the traditional holiday sauce; and at the same time it finds it place in pies, cobblers, salads, relishes and the juice makes an excellent punch.

The extension service puts out a booklet describing these and many of the lesser known berries with a variety of recipes for all of them.

It also describes the only poisonous berry to be found in the area.

The Chugiak Garden Club met on Monday July 20th. at the Home of Earl Ray. General gardening problems were discussed, with emphasis on the merits of organic fertilizers as opposed to the commercial variety. It was the consensus of opinion that where organic fertilizer was available in sufficient quantity, a combination of the two was the best.

The club will meet again at the home of Fred Hahn on the third Monday in August, which will be the 17th. At the present time a program for this meeting has not yet been arranged.

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SIGNPOSTS

One thing that strikes the eye when driving the Birchwood road is the neat white signposts with the "street" names on them. Some that particularly stand out are "Sunset Blvd" and "Scenic Drive". Doubtless there are others, which have not yet come to our attention.

This makes one wonder why more of our citizens have not yet named the side roads on which they live. Aside from the fact that an attractive name adds "prestige" to ones address, there is also the fact to consider that in our rapidly developing community a means of identifying the various roads will soon be a necessity, and how much better it is to have the (next col.)

(signposts)

persons living on these roads select a name that to them is appropriate.

It seems that the only requirement toward the selection of an official name is to be the first one to register a name of ones choice for any one particular public road. However, since we have heard of cases where there has been some difference of opinion between the residents on some roads, perhaps it would be wise to advise the obtaining a consensus of opinion from all residents concerned. Once a name has been chosen and registered, the state will provide a signpost with the name of the "street" or road neatly printed on it. This is also invaluable in giving a definite address. If some of us seem to be a bit forward in naming a narrow dirt road boulevard or avenue, why that may be looking toward a future when that particular road may be a thriving thoroughfare in the center of the busy city that may someday be Chugiak.

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

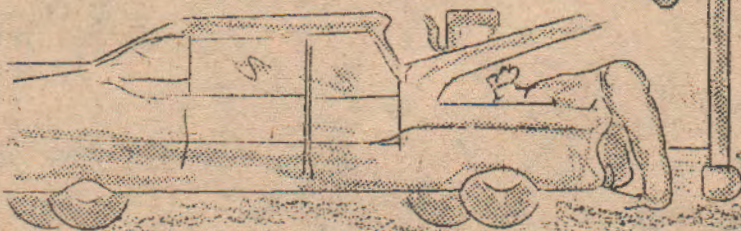

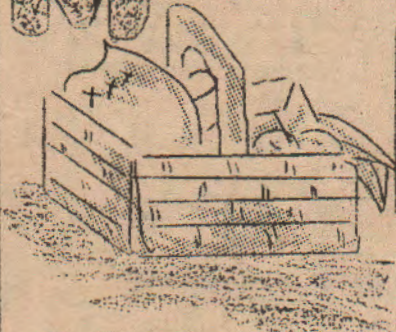
