## EXAMINATION FOR STATE POLICE

JUNEAU, July 24th.

Superintendent A.P. Brandt of the Alaska State Police announced today that the annual competitive examinations for the appointment of recruit State Police Officers will be held during the month of August in the Cities of Ketchikan, Juneau, Fairbanks and Anchorage.

The examinations which will consist of a written intelligence test, and an oral interview, will be administered by the State Police personnel Officer. Successful candidates will later be required to pass a physical examination and a background character investigation. The examinations will be held in Ketchikan on August 17th, in Juneau on August 20th and in Anchorage on August 27th.

Interested applicants may secure application forms at any local office of the State Police, or by writing directly to the Alaska State Police Headquarters Box 2719, Juneau. Persons desiring to compete in the examinations must be physically fit, between the ages of 23 and 35 year, not less than 5'11" tall, with weight in proportion to height, citizens of the United States and High School graduates. All applicants must be of good moral character. Previous police experience is not a necessary qualification for participation in the examinations.

All interested young men who are desirous of pursuing a law enforcement career are encouraged to submit applications and participate in the examinations.

## koko's karnival begins Fri.

The "Karnival" which begins at 6 P.M. on Friday will be the most elaborate to be held in this community. Under the direction of a professional "carny" man Dick "KoKo" Rand, this carnival will feature many new ideas, in addition to some of the familiar booths and games run by local organizations.

Dear Rusty:

Through you I'm appealing to  
the people of Yakala Flats to  
do something very important  
for their children and at the  
same time, something which will  
immeasurably affect the growth  
of their area.

Chugiak has a large school  
which the pupils from the Ya-  
kala Creek area have been at-  
tending for 8 years. They  
have had to be transported to  
the Chugiak School by buses.  
This year three rooms are be-  
ing added to this school and  
the 4 quonset huts now there  
will still be used. It is  
also understood that more qu-  
onset huts will have to be  
moved in to accomodate the in-

creased student load. This  
will also mean more busses or  
maybe even a split shift. He-  
aven forbid! I also understand  
that there will be 18-yes 18,  
teachers. This precludes that  
there will be at least 4 first  
grade classes/ So the busin-  
ess of the Little Red School-  
house with one teacher for all  
8 grades is no longer applic-  
able anywhere in the Chugiak  
Area. Since it is apparant  
that there will be at least  
4 First grades, it is reason-  
able to assume that at least  
two of those First grade classes  
will be filled with children  
from Yakala Creek area alone.  
At this rate there are also  
enough pupils to have all 8  
grades, a complete elementary  
school

Therefor, why not more the  
quonset huts into the Yakala  
Creek area and have a school  
right there where there will  
be no transportation problem?  
Then again, perhaps no build-  
ing needs to be moved into the  
area, or not many buildings.  
Mr. Briggs has a quonset hut  
on his property which is a pub-  
lic building, belonging to Civil  
Defense— then there is that  
fine, well-constructed building  
which Henry Herrman put up a  
few years ago. (Hurry! Henry  
may tear it down.) That build-  
ing has plumbing and heating,  
and is central enough to the  
entire Yakala Creek area. The  
children could walk from all  
of the subdivisions in the area  
with no hardship even on the  
little ones. This wial would  
use up some of the excess en-  
ergy that bus drivers hereto-

have had to contend with. Then again, there is that fine gravel triangle between Mr. Briggs (and Mr Slanker's property that would make an excellent school yard. It belongs to public domain in some capacity or other like the Road Commotion so with not too much effort it could surely be converted to school use, this would also secure that corner for the community, so that it could be a credit instead of an unsightly gravel pit.

Now this may not be the ideal situation from the point of view of the educator, the consolidated school plant has for a number of years been the goal— but consider the unconsolidation of Chugiak School it rambles all of the 5 acres. Not only that—count how many levels there are in the newer building; there are 2 in the basement (yes, there are and I'm not counting the stage level), and there are two on the top level and a level in between which makes 5 levels in a one story and basement building. From this we can assume that there will be three levels at least in the addition, as there are to be 3 classrooms there. But back to the subject the two schools would be only about 5 miles apart which is comparable to Anchorage City Schools. And our excellent modern communications system shortent that distance even. True, the teachers must be considered in order for them to do a good and thorough job, and truly earn the taxpayers money, but they would be every bit as comfortable and have as pleasant surroundings in the Yakala Creek area as anywhere, even more so for the people of the area will surely be proud of their efforts in this direction.

So from the standpoint of pupil welfare, the welfare of the next generation (which when you come right down to it is the only justification for human endeavor and progress) (next col.)

(letter) ess ( and there are those who will argue that we only revert, not progress), the separated school plant is the only answer. The only place on this earth where the production line or regimentation of humans is reasonable and justifiable is in a socialist state. Is that where we are headed?

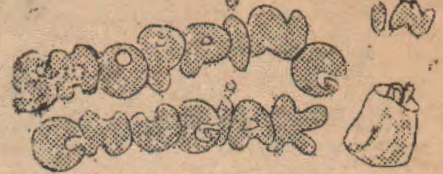

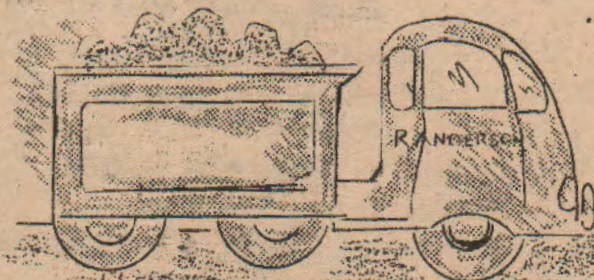

# The Green Thumb Corner



## BULB PLANTING

This may seem a little early to be thinking of next years planting, nevertheless, if you wish to put in bulbs for the earliest of spring flowers, it must be done in the preceding fall.

Daffodils and narcissus are among the first to put forth blooms, some scarcely waiting for the snow to disappear.

Also tulips make a nice splash of color long before any other blooms begin to show.

Bulbs for next spring should be ordered now so that they may be planted before the freeze up. It is sometimes possible to plant bulbs even after the ground has frozen, provided the holes have been dug prior to freezing and some unfrozen dirt reserved to cover them.

Well rotted or seasoned barnyard manure or bonemeal is the best fertilizer for bulbs and is applied at time of planting. Freezing does not ap-

(bulbs)

pear to hurt the bulbs; however repeated thawing of the ground can be very harmful and may cause the bulbs to die. For this reason it is not always wise to plant bulbs to close to a wall where heat from a basement may keep the ground in a partially frozen condition.

Last year the Chugiak garden club made it possible for all interested residents of Chugiak to take advantage of the reduced price in bulbs that they received. However, they have not yet announced whether they intend to repeat the opportunity this year.

## DIETERS DELIGHT

Here is a pleasant suggestion to those who are on a low calorie or sugar free diet.

A no-calorie carbonated soft drink may be made for pennies by following this suggestion.

Supervising these eager picnickers were Leaders Elsie Oberg and Irene Hildeman along with several of the mothers of the members.

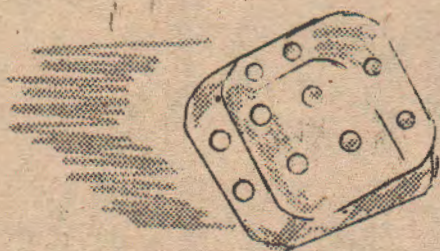

# The Cook of the Month

COOK FOR JULY  
LUCILLE SHOOSHANIAN

No list of Armenian dishes would be complete without the most well known. That is SHISH-KE-BAB, or skewered lamb. Again, other meats may be used but the distinctive flavor of lamb is what makes this such a favorite.

## SHISH-KE-BAB

- 5 or 6 lbs. lamb (or 1 leg of lamb.)
- Green pepper (tubed)
- Tomato (cubed)
- Salt & pepper

Trim meat carefully, removing all fat and gristle. Cut into 1/2 inch cubes.

Using a skewer place alternately, 1 cube meat, pepper and tomato. Continue this until skewer is full. Do this to as many skewers as desired.

Season and broil over charcoal grill or gas broiler until crisp and brown.

This may be served as a sandwich using European Flat Bread, or removed from skewer and placed on a plate. A combination salad with onion and other raw vegetables goes well with this.

This is an ideal dish for outdoor meals or cook-outs.

85,000 to 90,000 they service. So, the immediate need is evident. A modern memorial type of cemetery is a beautiful thing; one where there are no tombstones, but only beautiful lawns and landscaping. For those who haven't seen what a serene, peaceful and beautiful place it can be, I suggest a trip to visit the Evergreen Memorial Cemetery out the Seward Highway at Klatt Rd. If the Chugiak community could establish something similar, it would really be a credit to us all. It could be THE show place of our area.

Following is a suggested basis on which it could be managed. The cost of cemetery lots would be in line with the current prices, probably \$125. to \$200. per lot. A certain percent, probably 30% of this would be put into a memorial trust fund, which would guarantee perpetual care of the grounds. The balance, say 70% would (next col.)

be used for development, such as surveying, landscaping, equipment etc. Once the purchase and development is completed the 70% could be distributed to the various organizations in the community. This is only a rough draft of how it could operate, and all the organizations benefit. Ofcourse there are laws and stipulations governing the creation and maintenance of cemeteries, but that could be studied and worked out.

This would be something too, that the entire community could participate in without disregarding any religious or moral beliefs, they might have.

The carnival can never be a community-wide project because there are many that do not sanction gambling, lewd dances etc. and therefore can not give it their support.

A memorial cemetery with perpetual care would be beautiful with the Inlet and Mt. McKinley as a back drop. Lets have some serious consideration of this idea. I believe it is one that can be worked out successfully and will provide worthwhile financial aid to the organizations that CBA was organized to help.



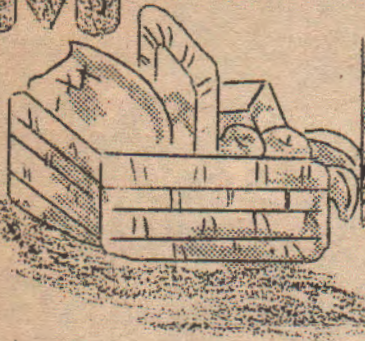
