COOK FOR AUGUST MARY KENNICOTT

We have had cooks who gave s recipies for an entire meal, but Mary is the first one to give us the menue for an entire dayl. Here in her own words is Mary's formula for a tasty, easy to fix two-meal menue.

"Like to trick your family into feeling well fed on only two meals on Saturdays and Sundays? Join my club. Start the morning out with Corn Fritters...the quick way.

CORN FRITTERS

l egg

d cup milk cup pancake mix

1 can (12oz) whole kernel corn (drained)

Cooking oil to depth of 1 inch in skillet.

BLEND egg and milk. Add pancake mix, tirring just/intil smooth. Fold in corn. To insure lightness, do not over beat. Drop by teaspoonfuls into heated (3250) oil.

COOK slowly until golden brown about 4 minutes. Serve with syrup with your choice of bacon, eggs, or ham or just fruit juice and coffee. (20 to 24 fritters) (nextcol.) (cook of the month)

"After you make corn fritters be s re to save the grease for Sweet Potato Puffs to go with your late afternoon ...early evening meal.

SMEET POTATO PUFFS 2 cups mashed sweet potato 4 marshmallows 1 cup crushed corn flakes Oil for deep fat frying CUT marshmallows in half. SHAPE 1 cup potatoes around each half. Roll in crushed cornflakes. Fry in deep hot fat (360°) F. until golden brown. Drain on paper towel. 8 servings (About 6 servings if you live in Chugiak.)





MORE ABOUT NEW SAFETY BAW

JUNEAU, AUG. IF:

Alaska's new Safety Responsibility Law applies to all drivers or owners of motor vehicles who have accidents involving death, injury or property damage over \$200, whether the car is driven by an Alaska resident or not, Superintendent of State Police, A.P Brandt reminded today; "It affects residents, non-residents who may be assigned to this state by private business or the U.S. Government and tourists.

It makes no difference whether the car is registered in Alaska or not. All drivers or owners must report such accidents on an official form wwithin five (5) days after the accident. Service personnell should pay particular heed to this requirement, inasmuch as many such personnel do have drivers licenses from other states and have their cars registered in other states. They are subject to the same law as Alaska residents while driving in this State."

"The provisions for suspension of drivers licenses when drivers or owners do not have adequate automobile liability insurance or avoid suspension through some other provision of the Law will become effective in Alaska and also in the home state of people who have licenses in other states. This is possible because of cooperative arrangements between states. Official report forms may be obtained from any state or local police office, insurance agent or from the Provost Hershal of service bases".

CHUGIAK 2nd LARGEST STATE— OPERATED SCHOOL IN ALASKA

According to a release from the Department of Education Chugiak has the 2nd largest enrollment of pupils of any state operated school in Alaska. This is exclusive of schools located on military bases.

Chugiak, with it's estimated enrollment of 500 students and 21 teachers is second only to Kenai, whose estimated enrollment is 695 and who will this year employ 32 teachers.

These present a sharp contrast with some of the other schools in the state, for example, Thorne Bay school near Ketchikan where only 8 pupils are enrolled.

The estimated enrollment of pupils within the state for the year of 1959-60 is 5,878, a 20% increase ofer last years registration of 4,875. Approximately 320 teachers are to be employed in these schools with about 60 of them brand new to Alaska. Roughly 50 others have transferred from other schools within the state.

This growth has necessitated the construction of new schools and the enlargement of present ones.

New buildings that will be ready for occupancy this fall are at Sterling, South Naknek and Aleknagik.

By September of 1960 a replacement building is expected to be completed in Bethel, and million building!

Also newly organized schools in new buildings (next col.) (schools) at Soldotna and Delta Junction will be ready by September, of 1960.

A few schools in isolated areas may fail to open because of lack of qualified teachers.

It was not felt that the immigration of homesteaders to Alaska during 1959 had any great effect upon school population, except in a few localized areas in the Third Division.

The exact count of pupils in the Chugiak district as based on the recent school census conducted by the PTA has not yet been tabulated. However, as soon as these figures become available, they will be published.


