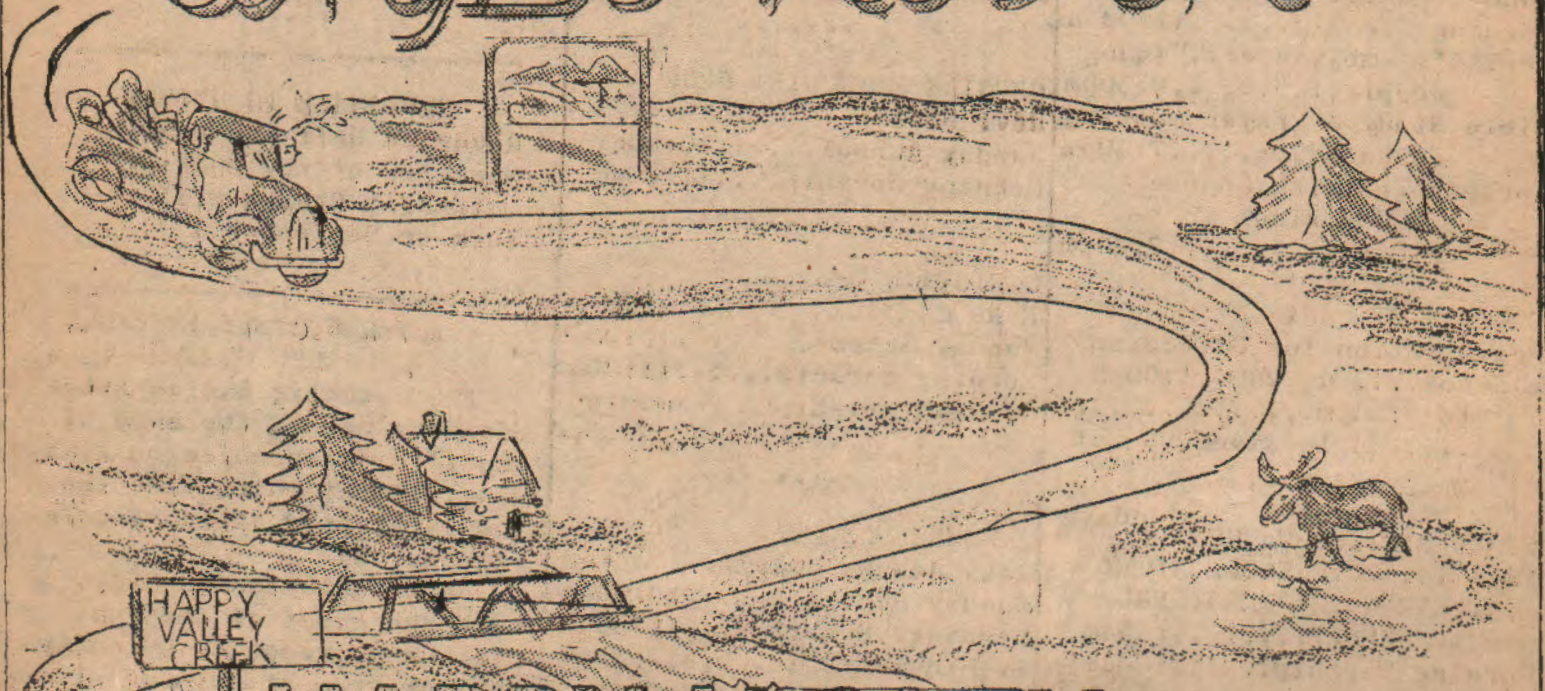

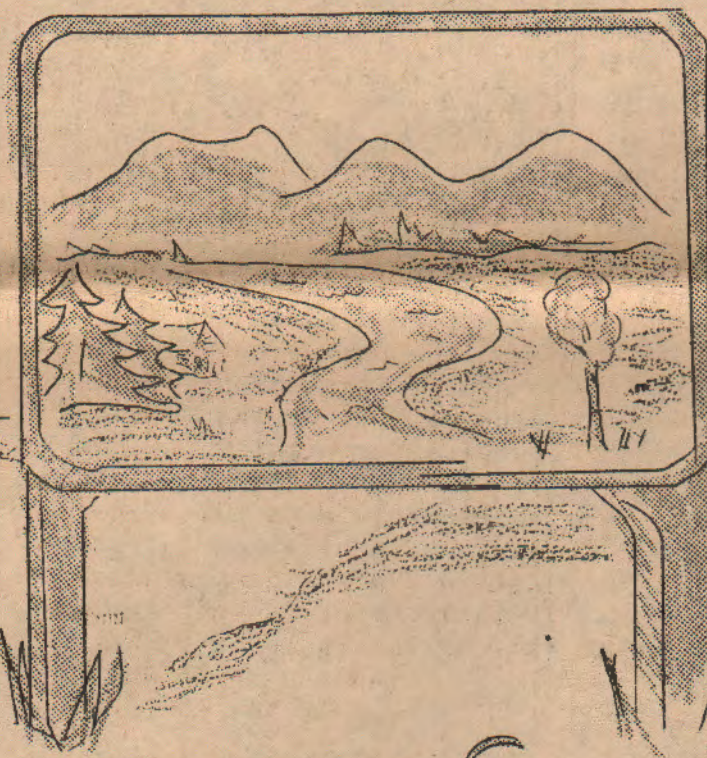

The Cook of the Month



For her final week with us, Mary offers us her favorite recipe for hot rolls.

Working mothers don't really spend the weekends lounging around reading mystery stories and resting up for the next week. Saturdays they do a weeks housework and Sundays they start cooking for the week, especially if they like to invite folks for dinner on the spur of the moment. Keep on hand one 3# Fluffo can full of:

NO-KNEAD REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

(Right part of Betty Crocker's "Good and Easy" cook book)

- 2 pkg active dry or
- 2 cakes compressed yeast
- 2 cups water (use warm water, 110°, with dry yeast; use lukewarm water, 85° with cake yeast).
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tsp. salt
- 6½ to 7 cups sifted flour
- 1 egg
- ¼ cup soft shortening

DISSOLVE yeast in mixing bowl in water (next col)

(cook)
 ADD sugar, salt and about half the flour.
 BEAT thoroughly 2 minutes
 ADD egg & shortening, gradually beat in remaining flour until smooth. Cover w/damp cloth, place in refrigerator.
 PUNCH down occasionally as dough rises in refrig.
 About 2 hours before baking cut off amount needed & (next col)

(cook)
 return remaining dough to refrigerator.
 SHAPE into rolls & place on greased baking sheet.
 COVER..let rise until light 1½ to 2 hrs.
 HEAT oven to 400° (mod)
 BAKE 12 to 15 minutes.
 Makes 4 doz med rolls total but lasts well in refrig. so make only as many as you will need.

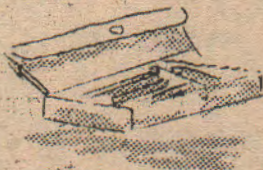
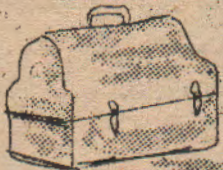

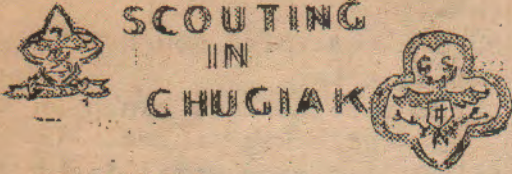

INSTRUCTIONS FOR KEEPING FLOWERS TO BE EXHIBITED AT THE ALASKA STATE FAIR

(reprinted from the Knik Arm Courier, Aug 28, '58)

Not all flowers need to be treated, for many keep well in fresh water. The formulas given below are for those you wish to keep for more than a few days, or for those that have to be revived before they can be shown. All treatment should be given BEFORE the long period of keeping in deep water.

The flowers should be kept out of draft and in a dark place for the soaking or treatment period. Amaryllis, Marguerites, Gladioli, and Marigolds:

Place in a solution of 1/2 teaspoon of peppermint extract in one quart of water for 1/2 hour.

Asters:

Let stand in a solution of one quart water with one teaspoon of sugar for one to two hours.

Dahlias, Roses, Shasta Daisies and Poppies:

Seal stems and place in deep water. Stock and other woody stem (next col.)

(flower preparation) flowers:

Crush stems with a hammer and put in deep water and let stand for two hours before arranging.

Mums:

One teaspoon clorox in one quart of water in the vase will keep the flowers for from ten days to two weeks.

While these instructions are primarily intended for flowers to be exhibited. They should prove of use to anyone wishing to preserve a lovely bouquet for the maximum time.

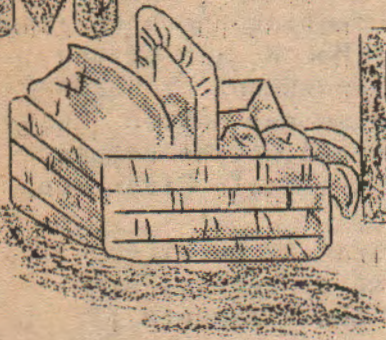
