The Inlet Courier, like it's counterpart in Chugiak, will be a weekly and in many ways and features it will resemble it's "Sister" publication. ******


NEW SERVICE STATION TO OPEN

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




WORN NYLONS REQUESTED



- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. salt 6½ to 7 cups sifted flour 1 egg
- ¼ cup soft shortening

INSTRUCTIONS FOR KEEPING FLOWERS TO BE EXHIBITED AT THE ALASKA STATE FAIR

(reprinted from the Knik Arm Courier, Aug 28, '58)

Not all flowers need to be treated, for many keep well in fresh water. The formulas given below are for those you wish to keep for more than a few days, or for those that have to be revived before they can be shown. All treatment should be given BEFORE the long period of keeping in deep water.

The flowers should be kept out of draft and in a dark place for the soaking or treatment period, Amaryllis Marguerites, Gladioli, and Marigolds:

Place in a solution of ½ teaspoon of peppermint extract in one quart of water for ½ hour.

Asters:

Let stand in a solution of one quart water with one teaspoon of sugar for one to two hours. Dahlias, Roses, Shasta Daisies and Poppies:

Sear stems and place in deep water.

Stock and other woody stem next col

(flower preparation) flowers:

Crush stems with a hammer and put in deep water and let stand for two hours before arranging. Mums:

Cne teaspoon clorox in one quart of water in the vase will keep the flowers for from ten days to two weeks.

While these instructions are primarly intended for flowers to be exhibited. They should prove of use to anyone wishing to preserve a lovely boquet for the maximum time.
