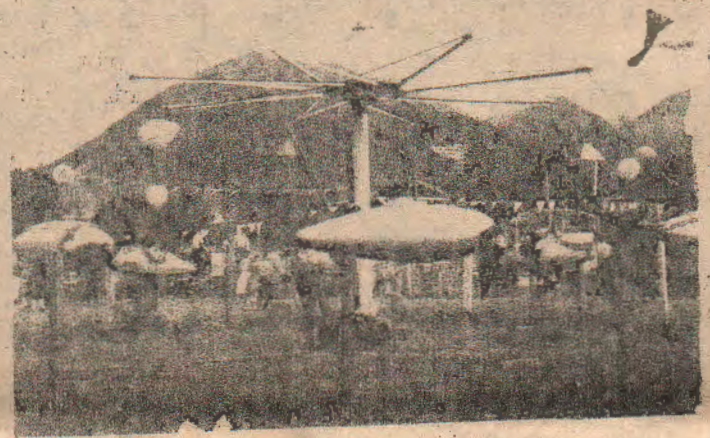

(work on school, cont.) doubtful if the addition will be ready for occupancy in time for the beginning of this school term.

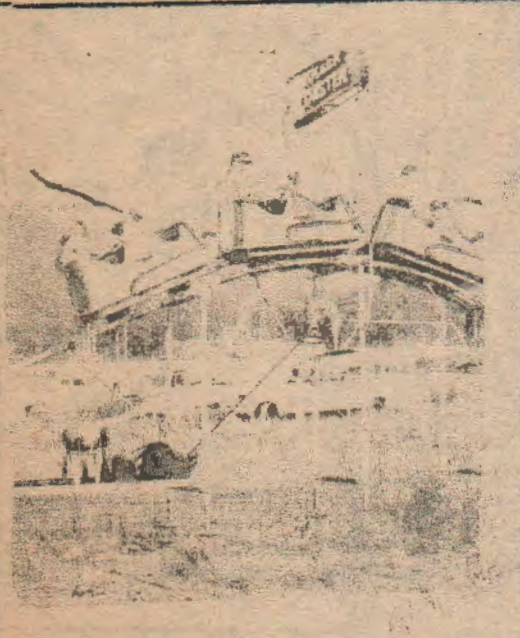

The Cook of the Month

"Organized chaos" is the phrase that Mary Kennicott uses to describe the conditions under which she usually keeps house. However upon looking around the living area of their modern home in Peters Creek, there was little evidence of any chaos.

Mary went on to explain that it was almost always open house at the Kennicotts, with friends dropping in at almost any hour of the day to visit or shoot a game of pool. Despite all these unscheduled interruptions, meals, bedtime etc. always come off on schedule with the company being expected to take it all in their stride. Mary likes to cook casseroles and similar dishes, and it is always possible to stretch one of her meals to take in any extras that may be around at mealtime.

Since Mary is a member of that large sisterhood of American women the "working mothers", she has learned to be efficient and to use every minute to the utmost. Many of her recipes include shortcuts and tricks to either stretch a meal or to whip one up on short notice.

Mary came to Alaska in 1951 from Los Angeles Calif.

She came for a vacation but took time to work for the Alaska Rail Road to pay her expenses. While working there she met Jack Kennicott, a fellow employee and they were married in 1952.

Before moving to Chugiak, they lived in Anchorage and also lived at Eklutan for two years while Jack was in charge of the surplus property there.

They purchased the land on which they are now living from Leo Robinson and like most of the folks in this community are living in and building their home at the same time.

Modern styling prevails in their home, with unpartitioned "cooking", "dining" and "living" areas all in one large room on the main floor of their home and the bedrooms upstairs. The first thing to meet the eye upon entering the front door is a pool table which dominates the entire scene. Mary says that Jack had always wanted one and when he got the opportunity to trade an oversized birdbath for one he jumped at the chance.

On Saturday nights Mary makes no attempt to serve a formal meal. All the family, in-

cluding 6 year old Edward and 15 year old Wanda are devotees of T.V. Westerns. Mary just makes a huge kettle of soup and they all sit around drinking soup from mugs and absorbing two and a half hours of solid cowboys and indians.

Since Mary works full time for the Small Business Administration in the Federal Bldg. in Anchorage, she has little time for hobbies. However, she does love to sew and wishes that she had more time to devote to it.

I know that the many friends who have enjoyed Mary's cooking will be glad to learn some of her recipes and to also know how even in an "organized chaos" she manages to turn out such delicious meals.

Mary has such a quick wit, and a roll sense of humor, that we will print along with her recipes all the comments she may make about them.

"We never know when to expect company, but when they arrive, they always bring from two to six children. This can be doubled, or made into two pans easily.

WINTER BOUQUETES

Last year we printed an article instructing the drying of flowers for winter bouquets. We have had numerous requests for a reprint of this information, and feel that now, with flowers at their prime, would be a good time.

While many are aware that straw-flowers and everlasting may be kept fresh looking throughout the winter, few realize that any flower may be preserved in a like manner.

Select the flowers to be dried on a sunny day when the blooms are fully open.

The blossoms to be dried should be tied in bunches, and hung blossom down, in a cool dark place, such as an attic or possibly a corner of the garage. They should be left there until thoroughly dry. Grasses and leaves may be dried in a like manner for attractive arrangements. Large flat leaves
(next col)

may sometimes tend to curl, and in that case should be pressed between layers of weighted newspaper.

It is interesting to experiment with different varieties of garden or wild flowers and see what results may be had. Flowers should not be picked too soon after a rain when there is an accumulation of water on the leaves and blossoms as this may cause them to mold.

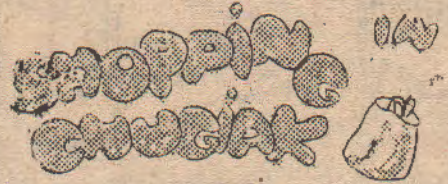

with a warning to all automobile operators and owners that he will "enforce the law firmly and impartially for the greater safety and economic security of everyone including the motorists themselves."

The new law, similar to such in programs of 46 other states becomes effective September 1. "It may seem unusual for the State to conduct such a campaign prior to the effective date of such a Law, but its provisions are far-reaching and every driver and car owner must be aware of its requirements because after September there will be no excuses acceptable." the Superintendent said.

He pointed out that such public Education campaigns have been conducted in 46 other states which have such law and they have provided a chance for every motorist to learn his new responsibilities under the Law.

This law has two primary purposes, one is to require every motor vehicle owner and operator who is involved in an accident resulting in death or injury or property damage exceeding \$200, to furnish within 45 days, proof of their ability to pay for the damage they cause or surrender their driver's license until they can demonstrate such ability (cont. page 11 col 3)

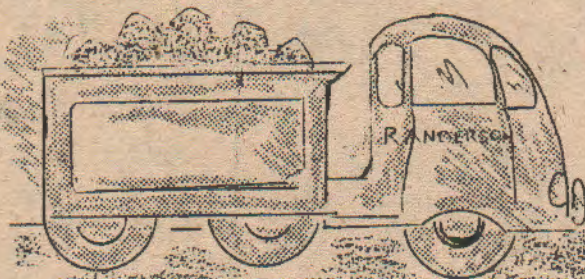
FIRE LAKE LODGE, formerly owner and operated by Jim Polyefko has recently been purchased by Mrs. Sallye Johnson of this community.

not only for the first accident, but for the future as well. The other purpose is to greatly facilitate the State's ability to remove chronic accident causers from behind the wheel.
"I cannot emphasize too much that this law applies not only to residents of Alaska, but to non-residents as well. If the driving privilege of a non-resident such as a member of the Armed Services, is suspended in Alaska, such suspension will be effective also in his home state because of reciprocal agreements between States."

"By the same token, Alaska residents who run afoul of Safety Responsibility Laws in other States and lose their driving privileges in those states will similarly be suspended in Alaska until provisions of the Law are met.

"You can understand, therefore, that this law means business. Yet it is not unreasonable, and there is no reason that Alaskan drivers who are ready to meet their driving obligations should not travel our streets and highways with far greater confidence that they are enjoying much more protection from the financially irresponsible and chronically dangerous drivers."

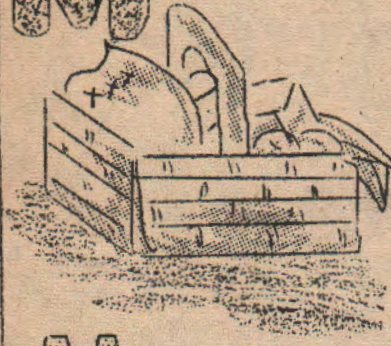

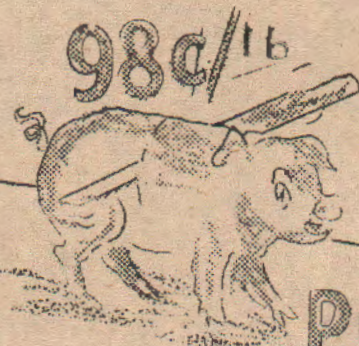

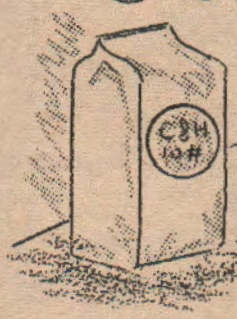
