Car is burned in Birchwood

At 2am on the morning of Thursday, September 10th, the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co received a report of what appeared to be a wreck on the Birchwood Road just past the public dump.

A car apparently had gone over the embankment and was resting about 100 feet below the road and was on fire.

The firemen answering the call scaled down the steep embankment on ropes and with CO2 and carbon-tet. extinguishes managed to put the fire out.

On further investigation the car proved to be unoccupied and had apparently from the evidence of tracks been deliberately set fire and pushed over the bank.

State Police were called to the scene and upon investigation it was determined that the car, a Buick four door sedan of 1956 to 1958 years, had been stolen.

The license tags were those that had been issued to a Ford in 1956.

At the present time there is no further information on the subject; however the State Police still have the matter under investigation.

School Children's lives endangered at bus stop.

Mr. Emmert, school superintendent, has stated that reports have reached him that children waiting at bus stops have been playing in the road, endangering their own lives and the lives of persons driving past.

Although this condition exists at a number of stops, it seems to be more serious at the stops near the Shopping Center where a large number gather. In a show-off spirit, some of these children dart out on the road and an instance is reported where a child lay at full length across the pavement.

Mr. Emmert states that apparently a number of children arrive at the stop as much as 30 minutes early, which should not be permitted. The school assumes responsibility when pupils are loaded on the busses and until they are unloaded and safely off the road.

He further states that only the parents can control the children while waiting for the busses. He regards this a serious situation and would like to call on all parents to help in safe-guarding their children.

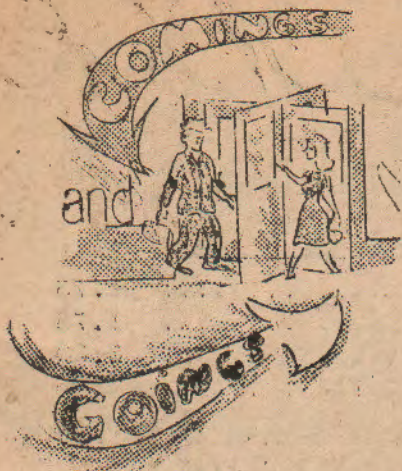

The Cook of the Month



COOK FOR SEPTEMBER

ELSIE OBERG

This week Elsie has for us two recipes. One a hearty casserole simple to prepare and the other an attractive party salad.

TUNA NOODLE CASSEROLE

- 1 can tuna
- 4 cups cooked noodles
- 1/3 green pepper (shredded)
- 1 cup cubed processed cheese.
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1/2 cube butter (oleo)
- 2 tbs. flour
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg, beaten.

MELT half the cube butter, BLEND in flour
 ADD milk and cheese
 COOK slowly stirring until smooth.
 ADD soup and pepper, then the tuna and cook over low fire. Salt to taste
 ADD the beaten egg
 STIR in noodles.
 Put mixture in a casserole, cover with bread (next col.)

(cook)
 crumbs which have been mixed with the other half of the cube of butter.
 BAKE in slow oven about 40 minutes.

COTTAGE CHEESE & CUCUMBER SALAD

- 1 to 1 1/2 cups cottage cheese
- 20 slices unpeeled cucumber
- 2 Tbs. white vinegar
- 2 Tbs. sugar
- 1/2 tsp poppy seeds (opt.)
- 1/2 tsp celery seed
- Lettuce or other salad greens.

HEAT vinegar, sugar and spices to boiling point.
 PILE cottage cheese on chilled platter or salad bowl edged with salad greens.
 ARRANGE cucumber slices slantwise in the cottage cheese.
 POUR the vinegar sauce over the salad.
 CHILL.....SERVE

VEGETABLE WINES

Once again we are going to leave the garden and enter the realm of the kitchen, which is, after all the ultimate end of all garden products.

In cleaning up your garden before the hard freeze you may find a few pounds of some vegetables that will fit neither in the freezer or the root cellar. Here is a way that some can be turned into an unusual and pleasant beverage.

Once before we ventured to print a recipe for home brewed wine and since the "revenoors" have not yet descended upon us, we will try it again.

BEEF WINE

14 # beets
4 gal. water

BOIL 2 hours with a pinch of hops, Strain.

ADD:
3# sugar to each gallon of liquid, 2 or 3 oran- (next col.)

(wine)

ges and boil 1/2 hour. POUR into crock. When cool add a little yeast and let ferment. Pour into bottles and cork when fermentation is over.

(Looks like port)

RHUBARB WINE

6# rhubarb
1 gal water
4 # sugar
1/2 oz root ginger
1/4 # raisins
1 lemon
3 Slices of white bread (toasted)

Mix, let stand 10 days, strain and let stand 10 days longer. Bottle.

OR

CRUSH 5 pounds rhubarb
ADD rind of 1 lemon
1 gal water.

Let stand 2 days. STRAIN off liquid and add 4 # sugar. Let work 2-3 days. Bottle.

This results in a light colored wine.

Both of these beverages are an interesting by-product of the garden and should be ready for sampling in time for the holiday season.

This is an increase of almost 200 pupils over the enrollment of the first week of school last year when the enrollment was 358.

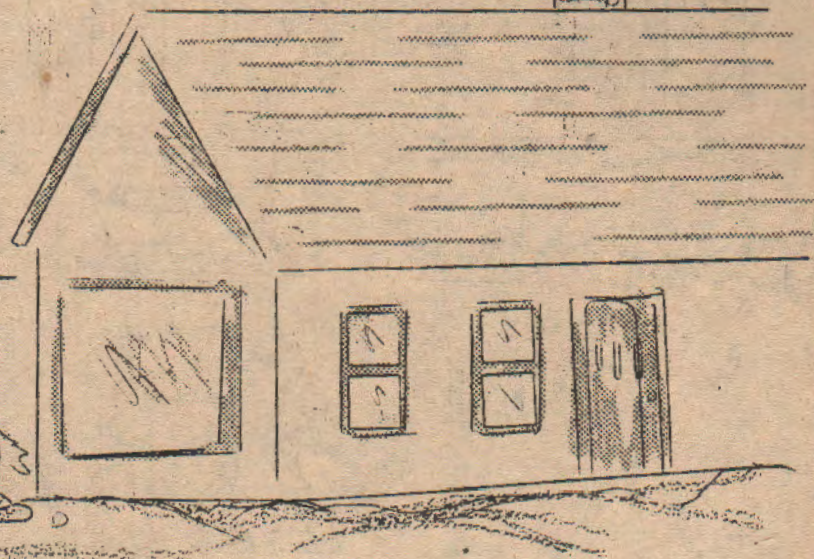
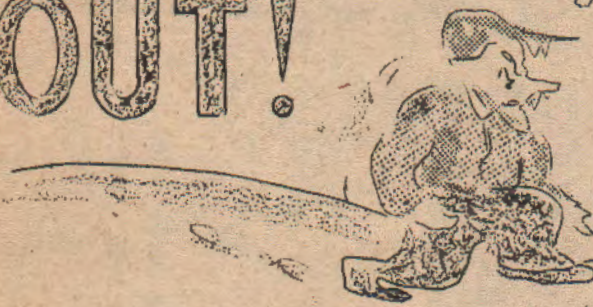
The number of students per grade is as follows:
