Loop Road Discussed in Public hearing

Residents of the Eagle River Area met with officials of the State Dept. of Highways at an open meeting last Friday at the Eagle River Baptist Church.

The meeting had been called to discuss the uncompleted Eagle River Loop Rd. which had been started several years ago.

Representing the Dept of Highways were, Mr. Pennticost, of the planning dept., Jim Clinton who is the design engineer and Bob Ragland head of the right of way.

Mr. Lee Hubbard, head of the dept. could not be present, but was represented by his secretary Mrs. Myrna Courtney.

These officials explained to the approximately 30 persons present the reasons for the location of the route which the road would follow.

The road could not follow the route which had been in the original petition, because that would involve the purchasing of right-of-ways for which there was not sufficient funds available.

There was some dissatisfaction felt among those present, since the proposed route is through a section which is at this time, uninhabited, however it was

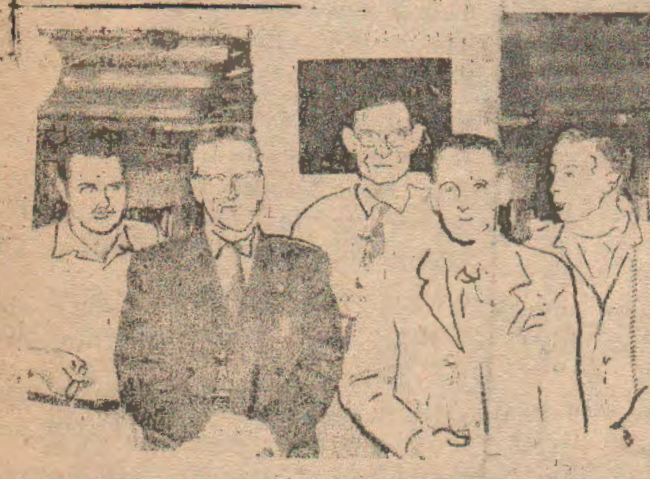

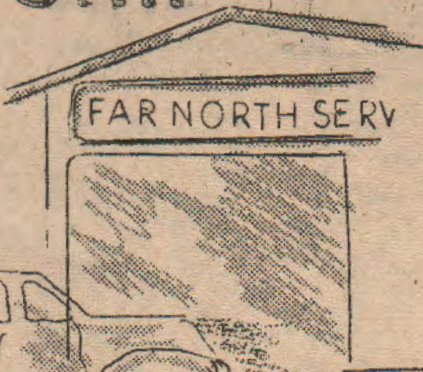
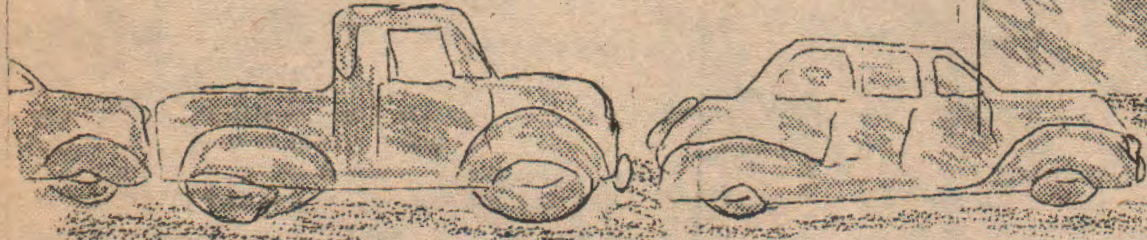

Work on the new road will not begin until next spring as it would probable take at least two months for the bids to be let out and final surveys to be made.

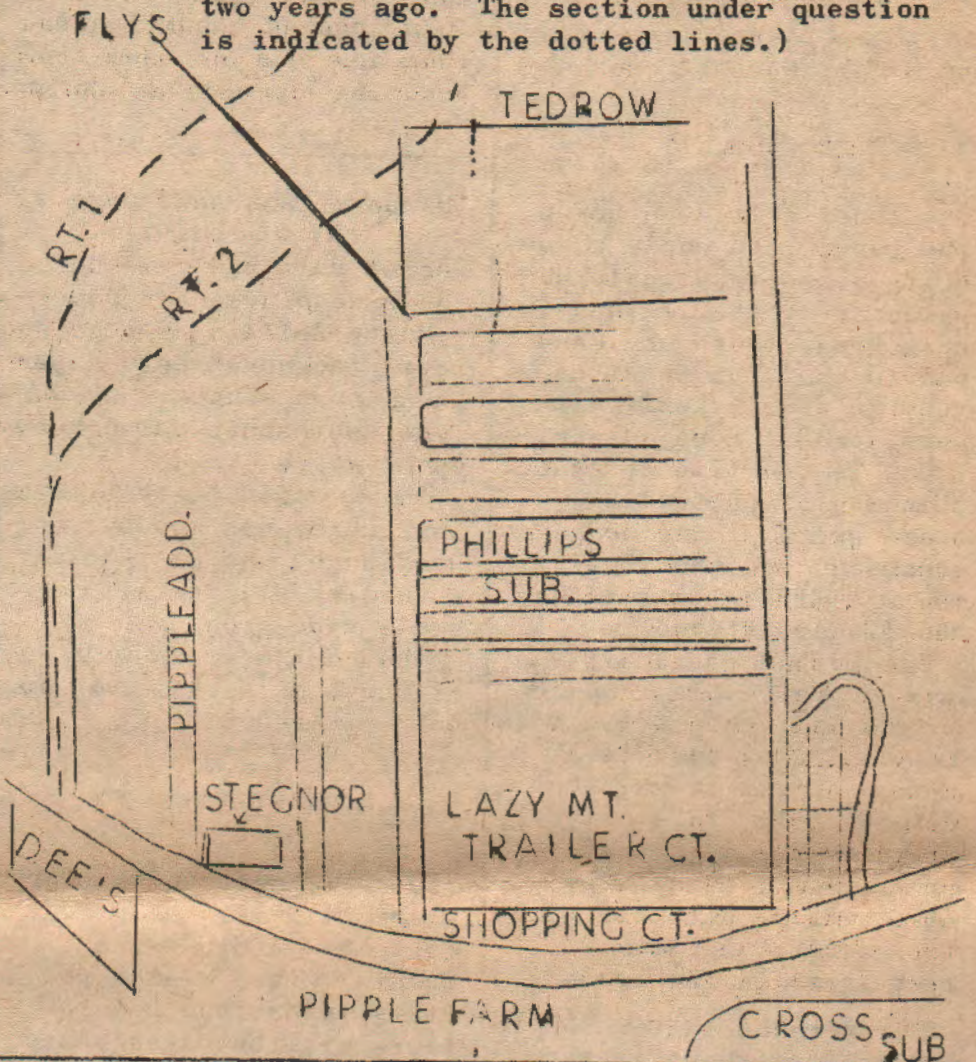
Although the matter is considered to be closed, still any further questions or suggestions may be addressed to Mr. Lee D. Hubbard of the Alaska Department of Highways.

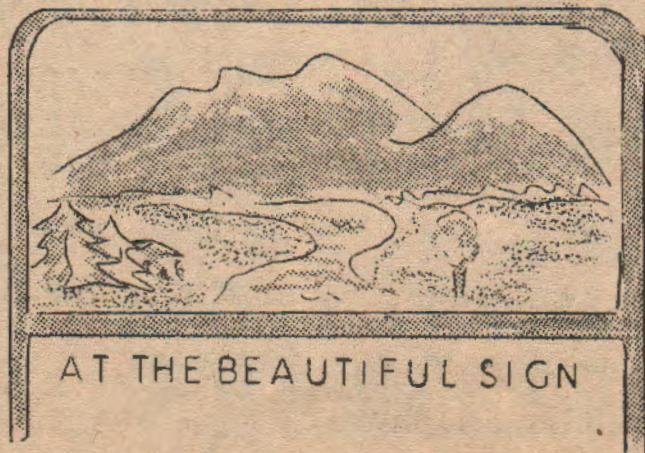

WINTER PROTECTION

The frost will soon be on the punkin, to quote a favorite verse; and while pumpkins are rather scarce in this area, there are many plants that the frost can form on equally well with considerable more damage.

Now is the time to start thinking of protecting those prize flower beds and shrubs during the winter months, literally putting the flowers to bed.

One method is to pile brush, preferably spruce boughs and cover these with leaves. Also here is a chance to put to use that compost pile, this not only provides the heat that comes from rotting vegetable matter, but will give the additional value of fertilizer in the spring.

However the latter should not be applied until the (next col)

(winter protection)

ground has partially frozen to prevent "fooling" the plants into thinking that summer is still here and forcing them to remain in a growing condition too long and prevent them from becoming dormant at the proper time. *****

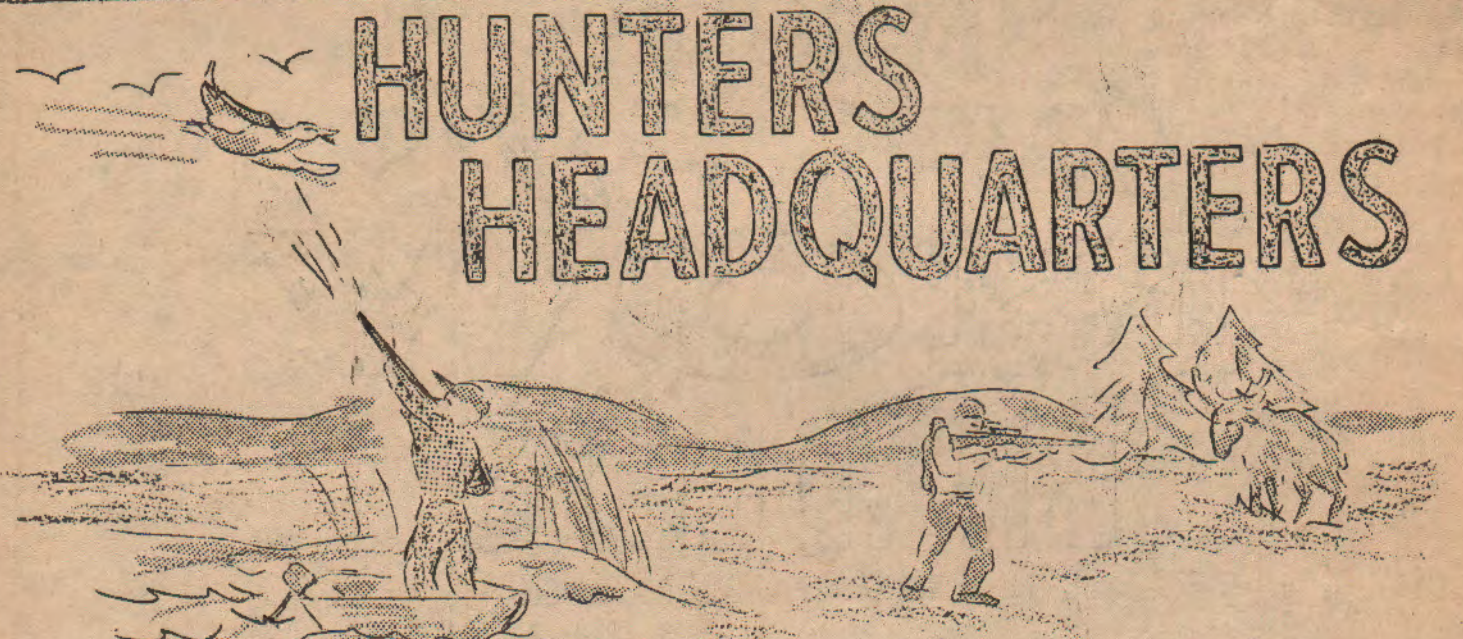

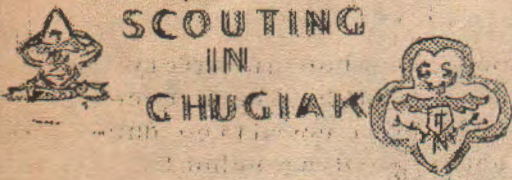

SMALL GAME & BIRD HUNTING TO BE PERMITTED ON MILITARY RESERVATION

The taking of small game & migratory birds will be allowed on the Ft. Richardson military reservation this year, but it will remain closed to the hunting of big game; this was announced by the Provost Marshall Office this week.

From September 1 to December 13th ducks, geese and brant may be taken. Limits for ducks will be 7 per day with 14 in possession; geese 5 per day with 10 in possession, and brant, 2 per day with 2 in possession.

There will be a season on Wilson's Snipe opening Sept. 1 and closing on October 15th. The limit on these will be 8 per day with 8 in possession.

Hunting on the Army Post is limited to shotguns.

Ptarmigan and grouse season opened August 20th, with the season on ptarmigan extending until April 15 of 1960. The limit on these birds is 15 per day with 20 in possession. Rabbits have no special season, nor is there a limit on them.

The Cook of the Month

There are very few people in our community to whom our September cook is a stranger, particularly the youngsters. If she doesn't happen to be their girl scout or 4H leader, then sooner or later she will be a substitute teacher in their class at the Chugiak school. The training of our youngsters could not be in more capable hands, for Elsie Oberg is one of the most capable persons we have ever met.

Elsie lives in the Peters Creek section of Chugiak, where she and her husband Russell came in 1951 to homestead 80 acres. With the exception of two years during which they leased a farm in Palmer, the Obergs have lived in our community.

Elsie proves that serving her community is of primary importance to her, as there is scarcely a club or organization of which she is not a member or has not at one time held an office. At the present time she is President of the Friendly Neighbor Club, Secretary of The Chugiak Homemakers, a member on both the board of directors of the Fire Prevention Association and the Chugiak Benefit Association, and has held every office in the PTA from secretary to President. In addition to that she is leader of girl Scout Troop # 54 and 4H leader for the farming group. She has also, since the fall (next col.)

of 1954 been on call as a substitute teacher at the Chugiak School.

With this schedule one would hardly expect to find Elsie at home much of the time, but she usually is, for she and Russell are turning their 80 acres into a producing farm, each year seeing a little more land under cultivation. Elsie herself looks after a good deal of the farming since Russell is employed full time as a refrigeration engineer at Ft. Richardson.

The Obergs have five children, Sherrill 11, Vonda, 8, Diane 6, Lyle 4, and Valda 3. When asked

what her hobbies were, Elsie replied that she liked to read. It is hard to imagine where she can find the time to teach school, participate in so many clubs, raise five children, milk two cows and have a minute left over in which to read; but she does particularly historical novels which are her favorites.

It is a wonderful experience to talk with such a tireless person and it is with great pleasure that we introduce her as our cook of the month. *****

Elsie claims that her family is not much on fancy dishes, favoring mostly "meat and potatoes." Since that also describes most of our families, this recipe for light fluffy dumplings should be very welcome for those stews and fricasees.

DUMPLINGS

- 2 cups flour
- 2 rounded tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt.

MIX and add:

- 1 beaten egg
- 1 cup cold water
- ADD enough flour for a soft dough.

DROP by tablespoons on top of meat, wetting the spoon each time in the liquid.

COVER: Cook without lifting the lid for about 2 minutes.*****

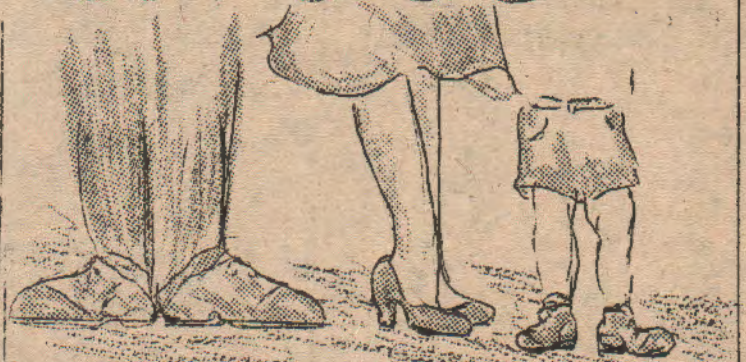

crete steps.
 However, it was noted that canopy's would be constructed over both exit doors from the multi purpose room to prevent the building up of ice from thawing eaves. This build up of ice last winter prevented the doors from opening. Also,, the concrete steps which "heaved" during cold weather were to be replaced. The "panic bolts" on both of the exits would be checked and put in good operating order.
 The faulty furnace which last year blew up has been replaced with a safer model. The ceiling to the store-room which was under the first grade classroom has been equiped with a fire-proof gypsum ceiling. The remaining item, the slippery walk at the entrance of the primary gtrade rooms will be covered with a rubber mat.

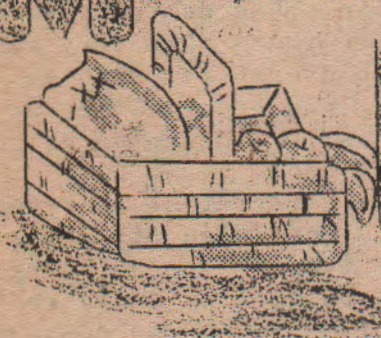

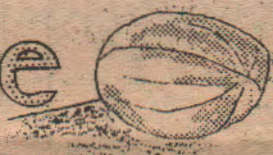
