Family in Birchwood Wreck

An Anchorage family of five were invelved in wreck on the Birchwood loop Rd. last Saturday, when their car overturned after failing to negotiate a curve in front of the Callahan kesidence.

Injured, was Mrs. 191 Ransome Bradley, of Tudor Kd and Wright St. in Anchorage. She was taken to the ANS Hospital with facial cuts and bruises and possible internal injuries.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company*s Ambulance answered the gall.

However, contrary to the report in the Anchorage Times, it did not take the ambulance a half hour to arrive at the scene of the wreck

The wreck apparently occuted at 7:30 pm, but the ambulance was not called until 8 pm and responded immediately.

Mrs. Bradley was transported in the ambulance, while the father and three children were taken in a private vehicle belonging to Chick LeDoux.

The Bradleyds had been returning from a visit in Birchwood when the accident occured.

According to the Anchorage Times this is the second such accident for Bradley in the past three months.

Local fliers Escape Injury

Ralph Doyle and Roe Huling, both of Chugiak, miraculously escaped injury when the plane in which they were flying crashed in the Friday Creek area up the Knik River.

The two men had been hunting for moose, when the weather closed in.

By the time they had become oriented they discovered that they were headed toward a mountain without either sufficient altitude to chimb over, or room to turn the plane. Faced with the decision of either crashing into the creek bottom, or the tree covered hillside, the pilot (Huling) took to the trees.

The plane was completely demolished in the crash, however neigher of the men was injured other than superficial scratches.

The trees, bushy alders had cushioned the fall sufficiently.

on The men had to hike approximately 20 miles back to civilization.

The plane, a Piper Super Cruiser belonged to Ralph Doyle, although Huling was at the controls at the time of the crash.

Earlier in the hunting season Huling's brother Ken also wrecked a plane belonging to himself in the vicinity of BodHer Creek while attempting to'land on a sand bar.





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

WINTER STORAGE OF VEGETABLES

with the gardening season finally over and this being the last Green Thumb Corner for the year, all that there seems left to talk about is storing of vegetables during the winter months.

Most root vegetables are preferred to be stored raw, rather than by canning or freezing. The same holds true of cabbage and cauliflower.

The most important thing in storing of vegetables is the temperature and humidity at which they are stored. while it is most important to avoid freezing, too warm and moist a store room causes decay and other spoilage.

Cabbages are usually pulled roots and all and either stored with the roots placed in moist sand, or hung upside down with the outer leaves (next col.)

(Green Thumb) tied around the head. It is important to keep heads from touching each otheras: as circulation of ain isob Root vegetables, such as beets, carrots, turnips ets. should either be stored in damp sand, for in, covered containers to prevent evaporation and consequent shriveling. When pulled the pops should be twisted off, with perhaps an inch 'or two of the stems Fildmer, Even remaining.

Potatoe's are more susecptable to freezing than most other root vegetables and should be stored in bins or boxes, preferable in a cellar with an earther floor. If the temperature at which they are stored is too high they tend to become soft and start to develop sprouts early.

Cauliflower is stored in much the same manner as is cabbage. However is transplanted into boxes of sand, they will continue to grow somewhat while in storage. However, if storage space is at a premium. Cauliflower freezes excaptionally well and most people prefer to prepare it that way. PAGE . Th



Since a meeting had been nissed earlier in the month, the next meeting was scheduled only a week later. This to be a dinner meeting at the Inn of the Arctic Moon.


All members both active as well as inactive are invited to attend. Acting as hostess at this meeting will be Rusty Bellringer.
