Three Injured in wreck at Eagle River

Three Fort Richardson soldiers were injured when the car in which they were riding overturned and was wrecked in front of the Eagle River shopping Center.

The ambulance of the Chugiak Fire Co. was summoned and transported the injured parties to the 5040th AF Hospital.

The apparent cause of the accident was excessive speed. According to Chugiak Fireman Dick Brawner, a member of the ambulance crew, the car had apparently come around the curve north of the shopping center at such a high rate of speed that the tubeless tire was loosened from the rim releasing the air and causing the car to go out of control.

The accident occurred last Thursday September 24 at around 5:30 pm when the men were returning from Eklutna where they had been working. The car, a '57 Ford sedan was totally wrecked, having rolled over several times before coming to rest against a power pole.

Plane Makes Emergency Landing on Highway

Horace (Hunce) Entz of Mt. View, landed his airplane on the Glenn Highway last Sunday after suffering an engine failure.

Entz was doubly fortunate in that at that point the road was straight and, unusually for a Sunday afternoon, at that moment free from any traffic.

Earlier in the day Entz (a former resident of Chugiak)

had been flying over Lake Eklutna with Gib Reid of mile 18 as a passenger when the engine stopped.

Entz suspect carburetor ice and prepared to land on the airstrip on the lake shore when the engine started again.

Entz had let his passenger out at the Birchwood airstrip and was returning to Anchorage when the second engine failure occurred. This time he was forced to land the plane. By what can only be termed as a pair of coincidences the point at which he landed the plane was at mile 18, directly in front of the home of Gib Reid, his erstwhile passenger and also in front of the property which Entz owned while a resident of this community.

The plane (a Trojan) was undamaged in the landing and Entz was able to push it over into an adjoining field.

itol should be moved the
prime question seems to
be where to move it?

and the inlet.

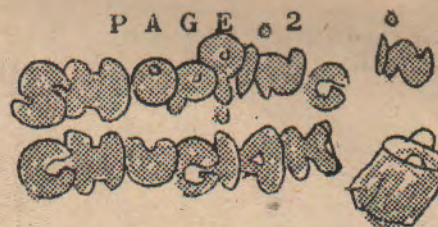
Most of the important

either Anchorage or Palmer

The Federal agent could offer little assistance on the subject since such a situation is not covered in the game laws.

He did state that regardless of the damage caused by the moose, Mr. Pipple could not be granted permission to shoot the offending animals; nor could the Federal Agency dispose of them. The only suggestion that he could offer was to fence the area, a highly impractical solution.

Mr. Pipple was warned that to shoot, or in any other way molest the animals would be in violation of the game law.

COOK FOR SEPTEMBER

ELSIE OBERG

Last week we discovered that we had miscalculated when we stated that it would be the last time that Elsie would appear as our cook of the month. It appears that there are five Wednesdays in September this year and therefore, Elsie will be with us one more week.

This will be good news to those who expressed disappointment that her recipe for Pineapple Nut Bread had not appeared in the column. So we are happy to have the opportunity to correct that oversight and print the recipe for this popular, easy to make loaf.

PINEAPPLE NUT BREAD

- 2 cups sifted all purpose flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup walnuts (coarsely Chop)

(cook of the month)

- 1 egg beaten
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 tbs. melted shortening
- 1 No 1 flat can (1 cup) crushed pineapple (not drained)
- 3/4 tsp soda.

SIFT flour, sugar, baking powder and salt into bowl. Add raisins and nuts.

COMBINE egg, vanilla and shortening, add to mixture.

DISSOLVE soda in pineapple and add.

STIR until just blended. POUR in greased pan 8"x4" x4".

BAKE 1 hour at 350°, or until done.
