

Three Injured in wreck at Eagle River

Three Fort Richardson soldiers were injured when the car in which they were riding overturned and was wrecked in front of the Eagle River shopping Center.

The ambulance of the Chugiak Fire Co. was summoned and transported the injured parties to the 50400 AF Hospital.

The apparant cause of the accident was excessive speed. According to Chugiak Fireman Dick Brawner, a member of the ambulance crew, the car had apparently come around the curve north of the shopping center at such a high rate of speed that the tubeless tire was loosened from the rim releasing the air and causing the car to go out of control.

The accident occured last Thursday September 24 at around 5:30 pm when the men were returning from Eklutna where they had been working. The car, a '57 Ford sedan was totally wrecked, having rolled over several times before coming to rest against a power pole.

By what can only be termed as a pair of coincidences the point at which he landed the plane was at mile 18. directly in front of the home of Gib Reid, his erstwhile passenger and also in front of the property which Entz-owned while and resident of this community.

The plane (a Trojan) was undamaged in the landing and Entz was able to push it over into an ajoining field.

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SHOULD THE CAPITOL BE POVED?

Since we printed the let ter from the Matanuska Valley Chamber of Commerce regarding the advisability of moving the State capitol, there has been much said about the matter in other papers.

As far as we can determine the strongest argument against such a move is the economic effect it would have upon the city of Juneau.

while the upseting of the economy of an entire city is a serious matter, when weighed against the welfare of the State as a whole it assumes minor proportions.

Since there seems to be little doubt that the capitol should be moved the prime question seems to be where to move it?

At a recent meeting of the above mentioned Chanber of Commerce, a recommendation was made to ap-

point a committee to study the subject.

It was the opinion of a number of people that the site should be close to the population center of the State, but in an area where undeveloped land could be used.

It is quite clear that our own immediate area is likely to come under consideration for this survey. In this area between Anchorage and Palmer there are a number of ideal sites for the future Capitol, near Eklutna and the area between Birchwood and the inlet.

Most of the important links that would be necessary for a State Capitol are already in existence.

The Alaska Railroad provides connection with all the Railbelt communities. At Birchwood there already exists an airport capable of accomodating large transports. The 5000 foot runway could be extended with out any great engineering problem to accommodate jet

This abandoned bomber strip of World war II could be readily transform ed into a modern airport.

The present Glem Highway makes this area only a short half hour drive from either Anchorage or Palmer while the proposed superhighway which will pass through that area would make them even closer.

Also the very nature of the terrain, being neither mountainous nor heavily wooded would make the



The Federal agent could offer little assistance on the subject since such a situation is not covered in the game laws.

He did state that regardless of the damage caused by the moose, Mr. Pipple could not be granted permission to shoot the offending animals; nor could the Federal Agency dispose of them. The only suggestion that he could offer was to fance the area, a highly impractical solution.

Mr. Pipple was warned that to shoot, or in any other way molest the animals would be in violation of the game law.




ANCHORAGE PHONE DIRECTORIES MAY BE HAD





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
VALLEY HOSPITAL TO HAVE NEW ADDINIS* TRATOR

- ¾ tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup walnuts (coarsely Chop

- 1 egg beaten
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 tbs. melted shortening 1 No 1 flat can (1 cup) crushed pineapple (not drained)
- ¾ tsp soda.
- SIFT flour, sugar, baking powder and salt into bowl. Add raisins and nuts.
- COMBINE egg, vanilla and shortening, add to mixture.
- DISSOLVE soda in pineapple and add.
- STIR until just blended. BOUR in greased pan 8"x4" x4".
- BAKE 1 hour at 350°, or until done.



Several have purchased membership cards for their families. Arrangements have been made with the school for children having family cards to use the library during afternoon recess on Fridays.




