The cause of the fire is unknown at this time. The building was covered by insurance.

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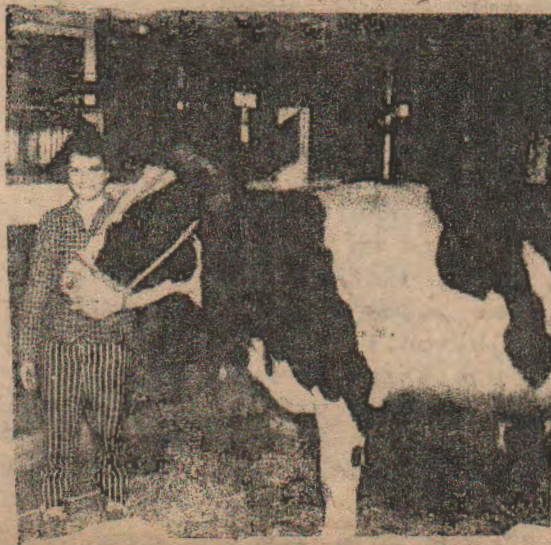
## CHUGIAK 9th GRADERS ATTEND CENTRAL SCHOOL

Eleven Chugiak girls, all members of the local 4H groups came away from Alaska's 1st State Fair laden with ribbons.

Winners in the livestock division were Cheryl Teeter, who won a blue ribbon with her New Hampshire Red hen, and Sheryll Oberg, who entered two heifers, a yearling and a 2 year old, and won blue ribbons with both.

This was the second year for Sheryll, having taken a blue ribbon last year with "Karen" and winning again this year both with "Karen" and with yearling "Baby Johnny".

In addition to entering in the 4H class, Sheryll entered in the Kiwanas class of "two from a farm". She took 3rd place in this class a cash prize of \$20.

Sheryll plans to sell her livestock to help pay for her college education. She has already found a buyer for Karen at the Fair. She will keep Baby Johnny for another year.

Members of the "Needles and Pins" club, the 4H sewing group competed in both the divisional and State competition, which resulted in some of the girls winning more than one award.

# The Green Thumb Corner



## FALL FERTILIZATION

Now that some of the gardens in the area have received the first gentle nips of frost, it may seem strange to be talking about fertilizing.

However some plants do much better with a hearty dose of fertilizer to "sleep on" throughout the winter, than they do when fertilized in the spring.

Strawberries are the best example of this: since the application of fertilizer in the spring seems to stimulate the growth of leaves while at the same time discourages the production of fruit.

The best type of fertilizer is well seasoned horse manure, if available. However since this variety of animal fertilizer is particularly scarce in this area, superphosphate is recommended. Bone-meal may also be used in this manner or even an application of compost (next col.)

(green Thumb)

can prove beneficial.

Whichever the fertilizer used, it should be applied alongside of the rows and worked lightly in.

Also, after the first frost is the time to dig those bulbs that need to be dried for next spring, such as dahlias, begonias and glads.

Bulbs that are planted in the fall, such as daffodils and tulips should go into the ground right around now.

Some gardeners even like to sow some of the hardier perennial seeds at this time to insure an early flower bed in the spring. This however, is rather tricky as if they are sown too early, a warm spell may cause them to germinate in the fall.

Usually when seeds are so planted survival is only about 30%, but those which do mature are much sturdier and from six weeks to two months ahead of plants started indoors or in a greenhouse.

## SPORTSMEN OPPOSE GUIDE LAW

At their monthly meeting last Thursday (Sept 3rd.) the Matanuska Valley Sportsmen went on record as opposing the proposed re-establishment of a mandatory guide law as applied to non-resident hunters.

The sportsmen opposed the law for a number of reasons, among which were the fact that such a law would discriminate against the non-resident hunter of limited means, and the fact that during the time that this law was not in effect none of the predicted destruction of game or lost non-resident hunters came to pass.

The group was able to hear the opinion of a non-resident hunter on the subject from Mr. Jack Greer, of Paso Robles California who was a guest at the meeting.

Mr. Greer felt that the non-resident hunter would desire to hire an experienced guide whether the law required it or not. Mr. Greer also voiced his opinion on the tags which non-resident hunters were required to buy before they are permitted to hunt for big game. He felt that a system employed in (cont page 10 col 1)

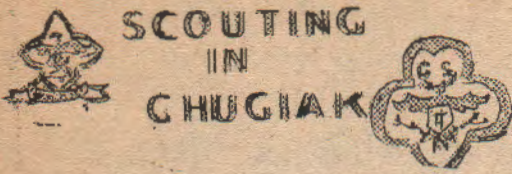

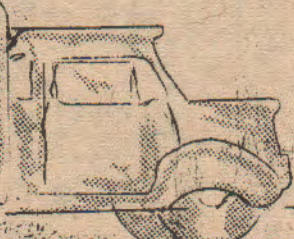



# The Cook of the Month



COOK FOR SEPTEMBER

ELSIE OBERG

Elsie recalls her girlhood on a farm in north central Colorado, when no birthday was complete without one of her mother's Cakes.

It is with this same recipe that Elsie has won prize after prize at all of the baking contests that have been held at the Chugiak Spring Carnivals.

We can feel especially honored that Elsie has offered to share this prize winner with us.

## LARGE ANGEL FOOD CAKE

- 2 cups egg whites
- 1 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 3/8 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/4 tsp extract (vanilla, lemon or angel food flavoring)
- 1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour.

Beat egg whites until they are frothy, add cream of (next col)

(cook, cont.)

tartar, and beat until they are stiff.

SIFT sugar and add gradually continuing to beat. Mix flour and salt and sift 4 (four) times.

FOLD into the eggs and sugar and add flavoring.

POUR into large tube pan. BAKE in 375 oven 40 to 50 minutes.

INVERT and allow to cool completely before removing from pan.

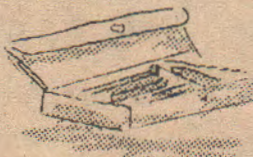
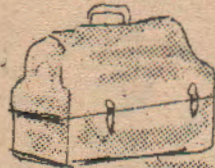

some other states and in Canada might prove more popular, whereby the hunter will pay only for the animals that he actually does shoot, rather than those for which he intends to hunt, but may never even see.

Following the meeting, the group viewed a film on fishing for yellow-fin tuna in the gulf of Mexico. This film was shown and narrated by Ruppert Andrews biologist for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game who took part in that cruise.

He explained that this cruise was an experiment in the "long-line" method of tuna fishing, which was developed by the Japanese. The Department of Fish and Game (next col)

conducted this experiment to determine if tuna could be taken in commercial quantities by this method in those waters.

In addition to many interesting shots of tuna being brought in, there were also many rare and exotic forms of marine life that were dredged up from the deep.

Most unbelievable of all was the tale of the man-eating sharks that were frequently caught on the tuna lines. These fierce creatures showed such unbelievable tenacity for life, that in one case a shark was brought aboard, opened up and his stomach and liver removed and the carcass tossed overboard. The following day the very same fish was caught on the tuna line still living!

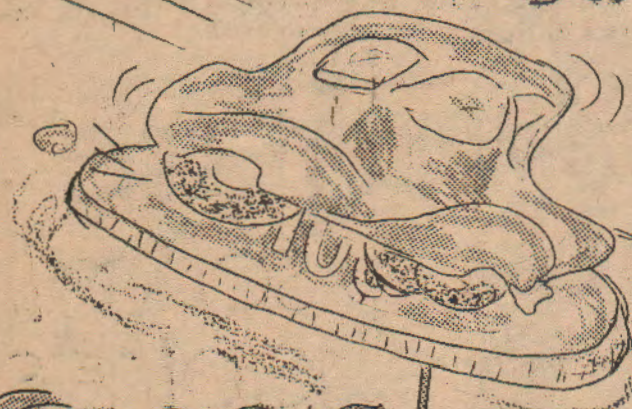

## PERTINENT FISH AND GAME LAWS MADE CLEAR

The following excerpts from the Fish and Game Code of Alaska apply to residents of the state only:  
Licenses and tags are required: It shall be unlawful, except as otherwise permitted in this act for any person to engage in sport fishing, including the taking of razor clams, hunting, trapping, guiding, fur dealing or game farming or taxidermy, without having first procured the appropriate licenses or tags as hereinafter provided, and with such licenses or tags in actual possession.

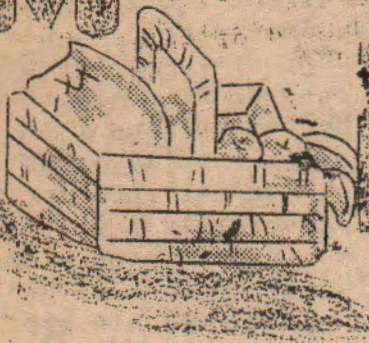

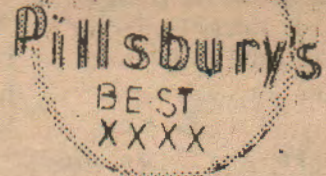
