## 24 HOUR CANADIAN-U.S. CUSTOMS

Dec. 5, 1961

It has been announced that Canadian officials have agreed to maintain round-the-clock service at Snag Creek, Yukon Territory border station.

Gov. W.A. Egan has sought 24-hour service at border stations of Tok & Snag Creek since shortly after he became Gov in 1959. Throughout lengthy correspondence, government officials have contended that it would be pointless for the U.S. to provide 24-hour service at Tok if comparable service were not provided by the Canadians at Snag Creek. However, Gov Egan has contended that if the U.S. initiate such service, Canada would follow suit.

Early in Nov, the U.S. Bureau of Customs announced that 24-hour service would go into effect at Tok the summer of '66. In Wash, D.C., Sen. E.L. Bartlett said he had been advised by

NO MORE FLOWERY AD'S

The Manager of Fawcett Shopping Sections, advertising Dept for Fawcett Publications, Inc. has replied to Gov Egans protests against misleading Alaska employment ad's with the flat assertion, "You will not see it here again!"

This assurance came from Manager Joseph Sheldon to whom Gov Egan had written when misleading ad's appeared in the Nov issue of TRUE & in the Dec issue of CAVALIER, both Fawcett publications.

Sheldon advised the Gov that after the ad appeared in TRUE, he sent a memo to the company's censorship dept telling them that such ad's were undesirable for Fawcett publications. He explained subsequent appearance of the ad in CAVALIER by saying the publication has a closing date for ad's two months in advance of publication & hence was unable to cancel the ad & for the same reason a similar ad will appear in the Jan. CAVALIER. Gov Egan received a similar letter from CAVALIER's advertising manager who stated such ad's would not appear in that magazine again.

Gov Egan's letter to the Fawcett publications were among others he wrote to national publications & newspapers in which misleading ad's appeared & he directed attention to instances where persons responding to such ad's had come to Alaska & been left stranded when employment failed to materialize. He also directed protests to the

Attorney Generals of N.Y. & N.J. seeking their assistance to halt such advertisements in the future.

DEPT OF INTERIOR OK'S ALASKA TO LEASE OFF-SHORE LAND FOR OIL & GAS LEASE SALE, Dec. 19

According to Sec't of the Interior S.L. Udall, the Dept of Interior has no dispute with the State of Alaska's offer of off-shore lands in Cook Inlet for oil & gas lease in its forthcoming Dec. 19th lease sale.

Udall's letter was read over the phone by Alaska Attorney General Ralph Moody from Wash, D.C. & in part said in Icy Bay & Yakutat Bay all the areas (proposed for lease) lie within 3 miles of the shore so there can (Con't Col. 3)

be no question of the State's right to lease them. The principal area to be leased is in that portion of Cook Inlet which lies within the E-W forelands. The distance between the E & W forelands is less than 10 miles. Applying the "semi-circular" test the portion of Cook Inlet lying above the foreland is inland waters.

There was general agreement with the statements made by the State Attorney Gen with respect to the semi-circular test. This test has been generally adopted by the U.S. & there is no known reason why it should not be applied in this instance. Therefore it was agreed that the areas of Cook Inlet above the E-W foreland are subject to leasing by the state.

A 4th area proposed for leasing by the State is in & near Kachimak Bay which also proves to be inland water & the other leasing areas are within 3 miles of the shore.

Consequently, Alaska's right to lease any of the areas named for leasing on Dec. 19th is not in dispute by the Dept of Interior since these grounds are not lands beneath navigable waters as defined in the Submerged Lands Act.

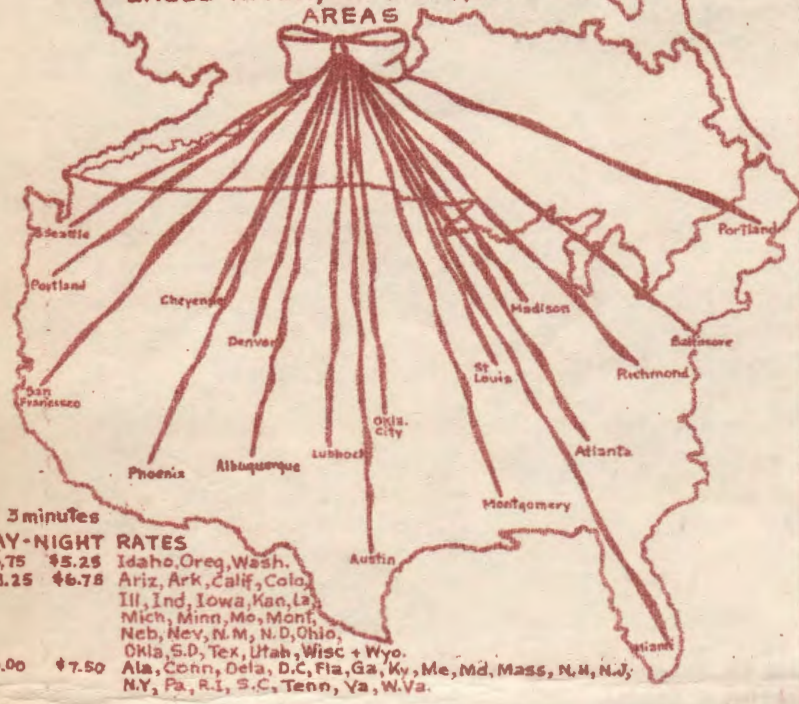

### EGAN STILL PROTESTING IN FAVOR OF CIVILIAN EMPLOYMENT AT ADAK

Labor Sec't, Arthur Goldberg, has advised Gov. W.A. Egan that he has been assured by the Navy Dept it will encourage the use of Alaskan civilian construction workers by civilian contractors at Adak the summer of '62.

Goldberg reiterated Navy contentions that work done at Adak by Seabee forces as "necessary to promote their training & readiness in the National interest."

Gov Egan had protested the Navy's plans to use Sea-see Labor & had sought Sec't Goldberg's assistance to obtain use of civilian (CON'T PAGE 7, COL.1)

### LUMBERING PLANT PLANNED IN FAIRBANKS

Gov. Egan announced on Dec. 8th, approval by the State of an application for Area Redevelopment Admin. assistance for a proposed \$307,000 lumbering plant in the Fairbanks area.

The proposal was submitted by the 19th Election Dist Economic Development Committee & is being forwarded immediately to ARA Headquarters in Wash, D.C. for final action.

The proposed new plant would be built by Brice Lumber Inc of Fairbanks & would be located on Peger Rd a mile south of the city & a half mile east of Airport Rd. President of Brice Lumber, Inc. is Mr. L.A. Brice. The plant will include a sawmill, planing plant & dry kiln with a capacity of 25,000 board measure per 8-hour shift.

In its initial operation, the plant is expected to provide new employment for 20 men & 1 woman with a payroll of \$162,933. Plans envision employment of 16 additional men after the first years operation, increasing the payroll to an estimated \$282,567.

Logs will be purchased from farmers & homesteaders as well as through the company's own logging operation. (Continued next column)

## DRUG of the WEEK

The doctor put two medicines of different colors in an envelope & wrote "One orange & two green pills four times daily." A week later the patient reported she was getting mighty tired of eating four oranges every day, until she at last saw the other little pills in the envelope.

The manner in which a drug is prescribed has much to do with its effect. A sugar tablet, if it is praised enough, helps some people no matter what their condition, as long as the contents are not known. And the best of medicines may prove to be ineffective if it is given doubtfully.

So as a doctor assures his patient that the medicine is good, he should also assure the patient that all will be well whenever possible. Yet at the same time the patient must not be given a false sense of security. The courts are now ruling that physicians must advise their patients of undesirable effects of treatments. How to accomplish this becomes an art in itself. "Yes, Mrs. Piltner, that is the best drug on the market. Of course, a few people have developed jaundice since taking it, & it causes nausea if you don't take it as I advise, vertigo may be bothersome, hypotension or blood dyscrasias may develop, but it is good..... Mrs. Piltner, where are you running to?"

Or tell a person that his is a simple operation, but it has been known that persons who had suffered from septicemia, cellulitis, hemorrhage, anoxia, ileus, etc., etc. See how readily he signs the O.R. report?

And transfusions: "You're going to die without this blood, but on the other hand you may suffer from chills, fever, pink toes, yellow eyes, etc., etc. You still want the blood, don't you?"

It is so easy to emphasize the wrong thing. Do you reassure the mother who is obviously upset about her child's condition? "Everything will be just fine, Mrs. Appre." Sure as shooting things will take a turn for the worse; or, does one report the facts & then help Mrs. Appre collapse in the nearest chair?

We admire persons who can, seemingly, make snap judgements. They are real impressive. But woe to the doctor who makes it to the wrong person. "That doctor hardly saw me & look what he charged!" "I didn't even have time to ask him about my niece's tonsils

And you spend hours confirming your impressions about a particularly difficult problem, but is the patient pleased? Of course not. Obviously the doctor doesn't know what he is doing if he takes so much time before committing himself on a diagnosis

Most diseases develop instantaneously according to patients. Should the doctor run a battery of tests on the first visit to make an early diagnosis, then they cost too much & would not have been necessary if the doctor waited. Or, if the Doctor did wait, then the patient gets panicky and next day visits another doctor who could not miss the diagnosis without lab tests, because by then the symptoms are fully developed.

House calls are forever loved by the patient, but dreaded by the doctor. But relatives are friendly as they greet the doctor on the doorstep, "Glad you came, Doc; I wouldn't send a dog out on a night like this." Sometimes house calls do help solve the problem as the doctor sees the cause of Jimmy's chills are the ice cubes sister spilled in his bed. But more often the doctor must work on clinical judgement alone just because father won't bring Suzie to the office where the lab, X-ray, etc., are. Then when Suzie isn't any better the next day, father takes her to that nice Dr. Treat, who easily makes the tests & treats accordingly. Of course this is also after the diagnosis is obvious, or a new problem has developed. Obviously old Dr. G.P. must be in error.
