Librarians To Canvass Area

October 18th and 19th are the days which have been selected for the first phase of the "Junior Bookworm Fund" drive, an attempt to raise money to purchase additional children's books for the Chugiak public library.

During those days, two members of the library board, Mrs. Wes Mickey and Mrs. Dorothy Jonrowe will personally call on all business establishments in the Chugiak area to accept their donations to the fund.

"The need for more children's books is most urgent", says Mrs. Mickey. "There are only 200 books for children on the shelves and there are over 500 children in the Chugiak School. The Chugiak Library serves the place of a school library and every Thursday the children line up six deep at the children's section trying to check out at least one book. It is a matter of simple arithmetic that many of them are going to have to leave empty handed."

"Being able to provide suitable reading material for our children is of concern to all the community" added Mrs. Jonrowe, "however, we feel that the cultural development of our community is one of the primary aims of those who are in business here, and it is therefor to them that we are turning for help. Later on we will give all members of the community an opportunity to participate."

It is suggested that any business people who may not be at their places of business during the above mentioned two days may wish to leave their donation in an envelope with one of their employees, so that they will not miss their opportunity to contribute (cont page 6 col 2)

POLITICAL SCIENCE EXPERT ADDRESSES PTA

The mechanics of a presidential election was the subject of a talk given before the Chugiak Parent Teachers Association at their meeting last night.

Speaking on the subject was Mr. N.J. (Nick) Begich, principal of Ursa Minor School at Ft. Richardson and political science instructor with the University of Alaska, Elmendorf Branch.

Mr. Begich prefaced his very interesting lecture by complimenting the group on their interest in such a timely subject, and brought to their attention the fact that the results of the last primary indicated a greater percentage of interest in government by the residents of Chugiak then in any other area in the Southcentral district.

Following the program, an election for Secretary of the PTA was held to fill the post which had been resigned by Mrs. Billy Moore.

Mrs. Louis Zib was elected the new secretary.

Eagle River Man Escapes Burning Building

Mr. William Hildrith, of Eagle River narrowly escaped with his life, when fire raged through his home early Sunday morning.

Mr. Hildrith was awakened around 2am when he discovered that the room seemed unusually hot.

He saw flames in the vicinity of an oil stove in the room, and attempted to extinguish them by throwing blankets and water over them. However this was to no avail, and when he opened the door to the room, the flames immediately engulfed the house forcing him to flee with only his night clothes and a blanket.

Hildrith made his way to the home of a neighbor, Clarence Lamay, who returned to the fire with him, but by this time there was nothing could be done.

The Hildrith home was located high on a mountain side about five miles up the Eagle River Road.

Hildrith, who is employed at the heavy equipment maintenance shop at Ft. Richardson, was living alone at the time, Mrs. Hildrith being outside in the states.

He escaped with only very minor burns, although all of his clothes and other belongings were destroyed in the fire.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

Dear Editor:

Although I disagree with Mr.
Straight's opinions, I do respect
his right to express them.

What I do not respect is a
deliberately false statement
given to mislead and confuse
the readers.

I refer to Mr. Straight's
statement that he had "just
learned" about the arrangements
for the temporary buildings at
the school.

At the May PTA meeting, nearly
six months ago, Mr. Straight
posed these same questions con-
cerning the temporary school
buildings, intimating, even then,
that it was a deep, dark secret
of some sort.

At that time Mr. Emmert, Super-
intendent of the Chugiak School
once more very patiently
explained the situation (al-
though he had done so before)
and he also exploded many of the
rumors then being circulated
by the same reactionary
(next col.)

(letter)

group partially responsible
for the present rumor and
petition campaign.

The minutes of that meet-
ing containing this informa-
tion were read at the Sept-
ember PTA meeting, but per-
haps Mr. Straight wasn't
there.

Incidentally this group at
the September PTA meeting
was made up of parents and
individuals who have the in-
terest of the school and the
children at heart (as evi-
denced by their presence),
and they gave the highest
number of votes Elsie Oberg,
Rev. Hull and Paul Swanson
from among the slate of eight
very able candidates who
were nominated by that group
to serve on the advisory sch-
ool board.

At the time the contract
was given for the temporary
buildings, Mr. Swanson's bid
was the lowest received.

The point is he was not
the only person contacted
as previous statements would
imply. His offer is in line
with the State's policy dup-
licated all over the State.

Regardless of anyone's
views on this subject, I
feel they will agree that by
any measure it was unfair and
un-American to wait until it was
too late for a reply before
election to send a letter to
be printed in the COURIER.

In America the accused has
the right to be confronted by
his accusers and to defend
himself. None of the people
involved has seen any of
these petitions. Many of us

QUESTION

"....will mail that is 'mailed' at the Chugiak post office (either in the letter slot in the lobby or in the outside mailbox) be picked up on Saturday if it is deposited after the post-office closes at noon, but before the mail carrier comes through at 2pm?"

ANSWER:

No, the mail carrier does not have access to either of these mail boxes.

Any letters mailed on Saturday must be deposited by 11am in the outside box or by noon in the box in the lobby if it is to go out on Saturday. Anything mailed later than that will not be processed until Monday.

FIRE DESTROYS EAGLE RIVER GARAGE

A home and business, belonging to Harry Whitman of mile 14 1/2 Glenn Highway was destroyed by fire on Wednesday, October 5th.

The fire started in the shop of the garage (next col.)

part of the building, where a furnace was believed to have ignited gasoline fumes.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. responded with all its equipment and a tanker from Ft. Richardson was also summoned under the mutual aid agreement; however the fire was too far advanced to save the building.

The loss was estimated at \$30,00 including the contents. A 1957 Ford automobile which belonged to a man named Smith of Ft. Richardson was in the shop at the time, and was also destroyed.

The loss was not covered by insurance.

Whitman, suffering burns about the face and hands, was given first aid at the scene by Ted Drink of the Rescue unit, and then transported to the office of Dr. Simpson for further treatment.

ABSENTEE VOTING PROCEDURE EXPLAINED

Absentee voting materials are being sent out by the Secretary of State this week to all Magistrates' offices throughout the State.

People who will not be in the State on election day, November 8th are reminded that they may vote absentee in person or by mail anytime between now and election day.

At the primary election there was a higher absentee vote cast than at any previous election, according to Secretary Wade.

In spite of this it is felt that many of the residents of Native villages where no polling places exist failed to vote absentee because they were not familiar with the new Election Code.

Under the old law it was the custom to send a supply of ballots to all postmasters and the residents of these remote villages secured their ballots from the postmaster. Under the new State law, only Magistrates Deputy Magistrates, and the Secretary of State are authorized to distribute absentee ballots to voters, and then only upon a written request from the voter for a ballot.

Secretary Wade has sent a notice to all postmasters in small towns and villages asking them to post a notice containing instructions on how to vote absentee. It is hoped that this will stimulate absentee voting in these places.

Wade also stated that in his opinion many physically disabled persons failed to take advantage of the easy method which the new law provides to make it possible for them to vote.

Under the present law, a disabled person, such as the ill or blind, may request in writing that a friend secure a ballot for him.

Under the old law, a doctor had to certify that the person was unable to vote in person because of his physical disability.

Not so under the new law-- all one has to do is have two voters sign the letter, stating that the (next col.)

(absentee voting)

applicant is disabled and unable to appear in person.

It is therefore urged that all persons living a distance from the polling places, or who are disabled, take advantage of these absentee voter rights and apply early for their ballots.

COOK FOR OCTOBER. DOROTHY STEEBY

If any of our readers find themselves with a overabundance of unripened tomatoes in their greenhouse, Dorothy offers this very delicious solution.

GREEN TOMATO RELISH

- 2 gallons green tomatoes
- 8 large onions
- 1 cup salt

CHOP tomatoes and onions fine

ADD salt

LET STAND overnight.

DRAIN off liquid

ADD: 2qts water
1 qt vinegar

BOIL 20 minutes

STRAIN through colander

RETURN to kettle

ADD:

- 2 2ts vinegar
- 1 lb. sugar
- 1/2 lb. white mustard seed
- 2 tbs. pepper
- 1 tbs. cinnamon
- 1 tbs. cloves
- 2 tbs. ginger
- 1 tbs allspice
- 1/2 tsp cayenne pepper

BOIL 15 minutes

STIR often to prevent scorching

SEAL in glass jars.
