With the holiday season approaching, many of us will welcome this simple recipe for a sweet dough that adapts to all those fancy breads and other holiday baking.

BASIC SWEET DOUGH FOR BUTTERHORNS & OTHER CHRIST-MAS BAKING

1 cup milk (scalded)

1/2 cup shortening or oleo

½ cup sugar

2 tsp salt

4% cups flour

1 tsp lemon peel (grated)

2 pkgs yeast

11 cup lukewarm water

2 eggs (weel beaten)

1/2 tsp mace

COMBINE milk, shortening, sugar & salt

COOL to lukewarm

SMIR in 2 cups flour & lemon

peel DEAT until smooth

ADD yeast, softened in luke-

warm water

ADD eggs

MIX thousoughly ADD rest of flour MIX' to make soft dough KNEAD on lightly floured surface

LET rise, then punch down & make rolls.

that this amount will increase 10 fold within the next few years, therefor to take on a state wide bond issue for the c construction of a ferry system that will never be selfsupporting is bad business.

He says that if this system was feasable, southeast Alaska should form an improvement District in that area, sell bonds, and put it in operation and pay for itselves jusk as Anchorage is doing with their new dools.

He feels that when we are paying office rend for State Offices in Anchorage and Fairbanks that it would be foolish to erect buildings for such use when the moving of the capital to a central area would eliminate the need for them, and to build a vocational school north of the Yukon would be as useless as starting an ice plant at Barrow.

If there is need for such a school, why not locate it centrally?

He wants the University to have every thing that they need, but feels that there will be ample funds from present revenues to take care of (next col.)

(Bonds)

and as for the building of airfields for all the rural areas, with a million and a half dollars is foolish thing-

Allen goes on to say that he feels the instigators of these proposals only had one motive in mind; to put the State of Alaska so deeply in debt that we would be hamstrung and so highly mortgaged that we could not raise enough money to pay for holding another election on the removal of the calital.

Allen has talked to many of our voters and to several leaders of the opposing party, and they have suggested that the bond issue be on a nonpartisan basis in this area and that there will not be a single vote for any of them.

"Let's keep our state on a cash basis", is his plea.

Allen wound up his statement by saying that the legislators were to be complimented for putting these matters before the voters to be decided. rather then voting on the approiations themselves.

If we were to put a fire engine en everyone's back yard, this would not decrease the number of fires we would have, nor would it necessarily mean that everyfire would be extinguished.

In a typical community, in a normal year fires in dwellings account for 2/3 of your fire companies loss.

The best municipal fire department connot do the work of fighting a fire any better if forced to work under the same conditions as the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.


