Auto Wreck Kills Man Injures Wife

Mrs. Joyce Patricia Titlow is recovering from injuries received in an auto wreck which took the life of her husband last Thursday morning.

Icy roads are blamed for the accident, which occurred on the Ft. Richardson by-pass just at the gate #3.

The car in which the Titlows were riding went out of control and skidded into the opposite lane of traffic to be struck by an oncoming car.

Funeral services for Charles Edward Titlow were held Saturday at the Evergreen Memorial Chapel, with Rev. David Blackburn of the Anchor Park Methodist Church officiating.

Mrs. Titlow, who suffered two broken ribs, a chipped bone in her foot and multiple cuts and bruises was released from Providence Hospital Saturday to attend the funeral.

Eagle River Fire Company Elects Chief

Orrin Ivie, of Eagle River has been elected chief at a meeting of the newly organized Eagle River Volunteer Fire Co.

The Eagle River Improvement Association, which is sponsoring the Company met on October 24th to elect new officers and to choose members of the Fire Company.

Also elected, were Bernie Vaverka Captain and two ten man fire fighting crews.

A new board of directors of the Eagle River Improvement Association were chosen at this time.

Re-elected as Chairman, was Virgil Flint, Vice Chairman, Walter Pipple, Treasurer Walter Bowen and Secretary F.H. Hawthorne. Other members of the board are Jesse Nichols, Galen Atwater and Herman Jones.

The seven man board voted to purchase the Fire Truck now on loan from the Fairview Fire Department and to go about setting up a fire station.

Plans at present call for twenty four hour duty with two separate crews one of which will always be on call.

A large building, belonging to Mr. Herrman has been made available to the Fire Co. and storage for the Fire Truck as well as quarters for two firemen will be readied.

F.H. Hawthorne, Secretary of the board, stated that there will always be a standby of two men at the station, where the emergency phone is to be located. Also, a siren will be installed on the roof.

Thusly, the public has become
accustomed to judging fire com-
panies efficiency by visual
evidence.

ities.

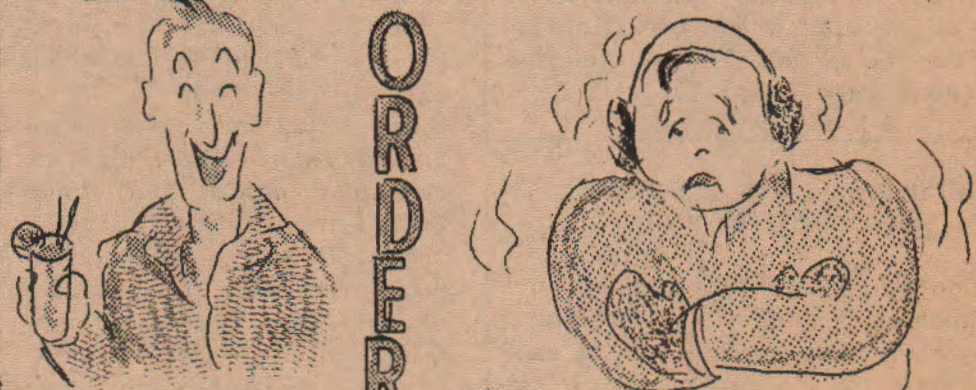

COOK FOR OCTOBER
DOROTHY STEEBY

With the holiday season approaching, many of us will welcome this simple recipe for a sweet dough that adapts to all those fancy breads and other holiday baking.

BASIC SWEET DOUGH FOR BUTTERHORNS & OTHER CHRISTMAS BAKING

- 1 cup milk (scalded)
- 1/2 cup shortening or oleo
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 tsp salt
- 4 1/4 cups flour
- 1 tsp lemon peel (grated)
- 2 pkgs yeast
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 2 eggs (weel beaten)
- 1/2 tsp mace

COMBINE milk, shortening, sugar & salt
 COOL to lukewarm
 STIR in 2 cups flour & lemon peel
 BEAT until smooth
 ADD yeast, softened in lukewarm water
 ADD eggs
 (next col.)

 MIX thoroughly
 ADD rest of flour
 MIX to make soft dough
 KNEAD on lightly floured surface
 LET rise, then punch down & make rolls.

BUTTERHORNS (use 1 1/3 cube oleo or butter)

ROLL dough to 1/4 inch thick
 SPREAD with 1/3 cube oleo
 FOLD in quarters
 ROLL again (four times in all)
 ROLL as for jelly roll
 CUT in 12 even pieces
 PLACE on greased cookie sheet
 SQUASH to 1/2 inch thick or less if possible .
 LET raise 1/2 hour in a warm place
 BAKE at 400° for 15-20 min.
 GLAZE with powdered sugar and water mixture.

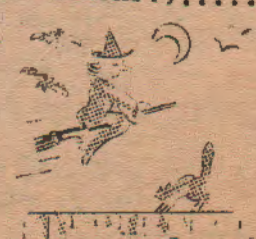

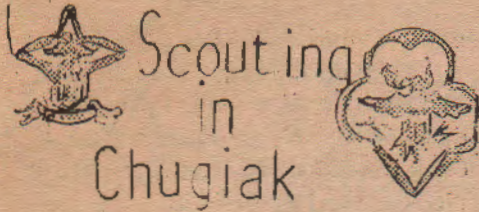

that this amount will increase 10 fold within the next few years, therefor to take on a state wide bond issue for the construction of a ferry system that will never be self-supporting is bad business.

He says that if this system was feasible, southeast Alaska should form an improvement District in that area, sell bonds, and put it in operation and pay for it selves just as Anchorage is doing with their new dock.

He feels that when we are paying office rent for State Offices in Anchorage and Fairbanks that it would be foolish to erect buildings for such use when the moving of the capital to a central area would eliminate the need for them, and to build a vocational school north of the Yukon would be as useless as starting an ice plant at Barrow.

If there is need for such a school, why not locate it centrally?

He wants the University to have every thing that they need, but feels that there will be ample funds from present revenues to take care of this (next col.)

(Bonds)

and as for the building of airfields for all the rural areas, with a million and a half dollars is foolish thinging.

Allen goes on to say that he feels the instigators of these proposals only had one motive in mind; to put the State of Alaska so deeply in debt that we would be hamstrung and so highly mortgaged that we could not raise enough money to pay for holding another election on the removal of the calital.

Allen has talked to many of our voters and to several leaders of the opposing party, and they have suggested that the bond issue be on a non-partisan basis in this area and that there will not be a single vote for any of them.

"Let's keep our state on a cash basis", is his plea.

Allen wound up his statement by saying that the legislators were to be complimented for putting these matters before the voters to be decided, rather than voting on the appropriations themselves.

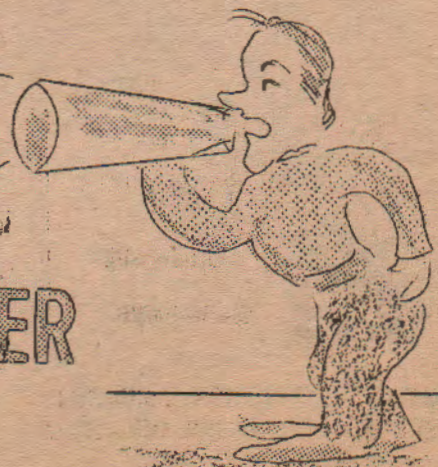

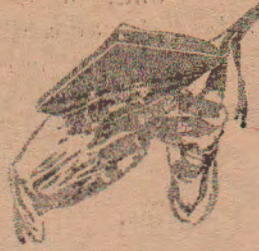

In the past in Chugiak, a laxity in Fire Prevention has helped to defeat the purpose for which dedicated men organized the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co., namely that of preventing loss of property from fire.

If we were to put a fire engine in everyone's back yard, this would not decrease the number of fires we would have, nor would it necessarily mean that every fire would be extinguished.

In a typical community, in a normal year fires in dwellings account for 2/3 of your fire companies loss.

The best municipal fire department cannot do the work of fighting a fire any better if forced to work under the same conditions as the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

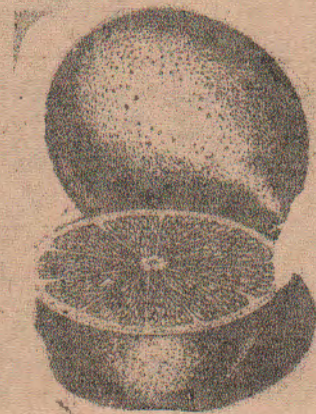
