School Board Elected

One hundred and forty three yotes-were cast last night at the first election of an advisory school board to be held in Chugiak.

The open meeting which was held at the Chugiak Carnival Hall, began with the reading of the rules governing the election and the duties of the board (which were defined as to assist and advise the State Board of Education on local matters.)

Following this nominations were called for from the floor.

Due to the fact that there was some question as to whether the nominations originally made at the last PTA meeting were in order, all nominations were to start "from scratch."

There were a total of 11 nominees, which included all of the original five. Bruce Robinson was also remominated, but this time declined to run.

Elected to the board, were Walter Pipple, Gib Reid and Rev. Wayne Hull.

Although all votes had been cast by nine o'clock, it was voted to keep the polls open until ten to allow any late comer to vote. The votes already (cont page 8 col 2)



on top crust BAKE at 450° for 15 minuntes, then reduce to 325° for 25 to 30 minutes.


EAGLE RIVER WOMAN TO BE ON AMU STAFF
