## School Board Elected

One hundred and forty three votes were cast last night at the first election of an advisory school board to be held in Chugiak.

The open meeting which was held at the Chugiak Carnival Hall, began with the reading of the rules governing the election and the duties of the board (which were defined as to assist and advise the State Board of Education on local matters.)

Following this nominations were called for from the floor.

Due to the fact that there was some question as to whether the nominations originally made at the last PTA meeting were in order, all nominations were to start "from scratch."

There were a total of 11 nominees, which included all of the original five. Bruce Robinson was also remominated, but this time declined to run.

Elected to the board, were Walter Pipple, Gib Reid and Rev. Wayne Hull.

Although all votes had been cast by nine o'clock, it was voted to keep the polls open until ten to allow any late comer to vote. The votes already (cont page 8 col 2)

goes by, their ranks will  
slowly grow, because these  
stubborn defenders of our

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# The Cook of the Month

The story of our cook for October reads like an Alaskan adventure.

When Dorothy Steeby came to Alaska in 1948, it was to homestead near Homer.

A young war widow with a six year old daughter, she undertook this task alone.

It was while she was living on her homestead that she met Carl Steeby, who was also a homesteader in that area.

Dorothy lived on her homestead until she had completed her requirements, then she joined Carl, who had returned to his home state of Kansas to complete his college education.

Carl and Dorothy were married on the campus of the University of Kansas at Lawrence Kansas and lived there until Carl graduated. It was there that Kurt, their first child was born.

The Steeby's returned to Alaska in 1952, when Carl (now a graduate civil engineer) went to work on the Ek-lutna Hydroelectric Project.

They lived in the housing at the project until 1953, when they moved onto their homesite on Jayhawk Drive in Birchwood and became our neighbors. It was the Steebys who named the road, after Carl's home state.

Dorothy is without doubt one of the most well known women in our community. She claims community service is her main hobby, and we know this to be true.

There is scarcely any organization in Chugiak that does not list Dorothy Steeby (next col.)

of the Chugiak Republican Club and is at present organizing the United Council of Churches in Anchorage.

Besides all of this, Dorothy finds time to attend real estate school one night a week.

The Steeby Children now number five, Sandra 18, Kurt 8, Kandy 5½, Karen 4 and Carl Jr. 2½.

Dorothy is alone a good part of the time, as Carl's work with the Retherfors Associates takes him away from home for long periods; however she keeps too busy to get very lonely.

When she is not working on one of her current projects, or weather keeps her from her greenhouse, she likes to read. At present she is working on a rug made of old nylon hose, and took this opportunity to request any of our readers who have some to spare to save them for her.

RHUBARB PIE

- 2 or 2½ cups rhubarb
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup flower
- 1 cup sugar (next col.)

- 1 tbs flour
- 2 tbs cream or butter  
(canned milk ok)

TENDERIZE fresh rhubarb by  
pouring boiling water  
over it.

DRAIN and put in unbaked  
pie shell

MIX remaining ingredients,  
beating well

POUR over rhubarb and put  
on top crust

BAKE at 450° for 15 minutes,  
then reduce to 325° for  
25 to 30 minutes.

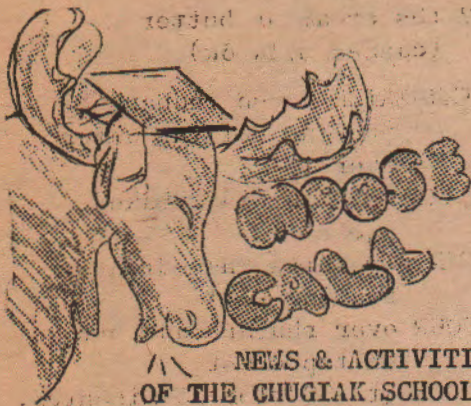

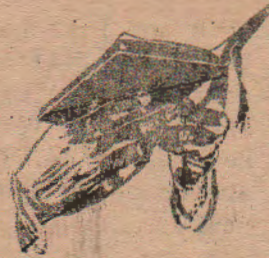

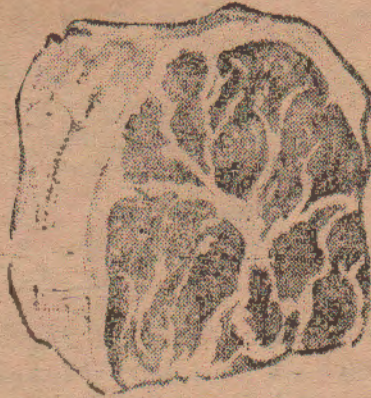
