Legislator Speaks To PTA

Bruce Kendall, newly elected representative from this district addressed the Chugiak PTA last night on procedures necessary to have the immediate needs of the school included in the next state budget.

This took place at the business meeting which followed an interesting program on conservation of our natural resources, and wildlife.

Mr. Ed Bellringer, and A/1c Bob Collins of the El-mendorf Wildlife Office both spoke on the importance of wildlife conservation education in the schools and Airman Collins narrated on two color movies, one on sport fishing in Alaska and one on Alaskan wild game.

Mr. Kendall advised the group to immediately prepare petitions to be submitted to Governor Egan by the 1st of December requesting the additional buses and classrooms that are desperately needed and also advised that it was not too early to begin petitioning for a high school in this area.

Because short time available, the advisory school board, as well as representatives of the PTA will meet to draw up the petitions and see that they are circulated for signatures.

Following the meeting refreshments were served by the seventh grade mothers.

Three of the newly elected members of the State house of representatives addressed the Monday meeting of the Eagle River Improvement Association at the Lampost Inn.

The guests all spoke on the subjects of roads, boroughs and schools.

F. H. Hawthorne, secretary of the organization announced that plans for the fire company are coming along nicely and that the fire hall should be ready for occupancy soon. He also stated that the fire crews are training for two hours two nights a week. Members of the Anchorage Fire Department are coming out to assist in this program.

Homesteaders To Be Evacuated

Twelve Eagle River families are to be evacuated from their homesteads on four successive Mondays.

This is to be done in conjunction with the test firing of the Nike Hercules missiles which are to take place.

Only the homesteads which will lie directly beneath the proposed course of the missiles are effected.

Captain Lamay, who resides at mile 17 in Chugiak said that this evacuation is to be at the expense of the military and in military vehicles. This is to include all members of the families as well as pets and livestock. The evacuees are to be housed in the guest house at Ft. Richardson and all their needs during the time they are there will be provided by the army.

The first firing will take place on Monday, November 21st at 1:30 pm. The families will be taken to Ft. Richardson on Monday morning and returned to their homes on Tuesday.

Captain Lamay said that this is merely a precautionary measure, and no difficulties are really anticipated.

The homesteaders involved live on the south fork and the north bank of the river. The firing is to be up the river, away from the Bridge.

Captain Lamay has invited any one interested in viewing the tests to Ft. Richardson, where "ring-side seats" will be provided. He said that weather permitting, the entire sequence should be visible, up to the contact with the target, in this case a drone airplane.

All of the families who are to be moved have been notified and all are willing to cooperate.

LETTER FROM THE
FIRE MARSHAL

Following is a copy of a let-
ter from the State Fire Mar-
shal to the recently formed
Eagle River Fire Co.

"...It is with deep pride
that I offer my congratulation
to you and the men forming the
nucleus of your new Fire Dep-
artment for reason that a vol-
unteer fire company represents
the ultimate height of effi-
ciency because its support is
drawn from resources which
otherwise would be consumed
in leisure exercise.

A volunteer fire department
not only provides for the pro-
tection of live and property
against fire and thereby re-
duces the level of insurance
premiums for the community,
but also provides an outlet
for a closer social relation-
ship that contributes to the
health and economic welfare of
the community.

With the vast expansion of
the surburbs in our State and
the rising cost of community
service, the savings provid-
ed by volunteer fire compan-
ies are substantial and most
opportune and welcome. Local
volunteer companies are a cred-
it to their community and to
the people they serve as is
confirmed by the amount of
time each man contributes to-
ward training and fire fight-
ing in an effort to provide
the best possible fire protec-
tion for his community. They
represent basic integrity of t
typical Alaskan citizens to be
self reliant.

It is our hope that we can
be of assistance to you in
the upgrading of the fire ser-
vice and to keep it on par with
other top fire agencies in

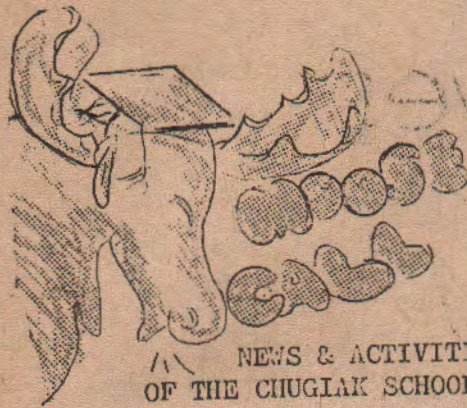

Cook Of The Month

COOK FOR NOVEMBER
DOROTHY JONROWE

This recipe is one which Dorothy found in an old cook book which belonged to her mother. It may be used as pan rolls, cinnamon rolls, or as the original recipe. It is quick, easy and ready to eat in 1 1/2 hrs.

SPEEDY KOLACKY

COMBINE: 2 cups warm water
1/3 cup sugar
2 pkg dry yeast

ADD 1 tbs. salt
2 cups sifted flour

BEAT for 2 minutes with electric or rotary beater.

ADD 2 eggs
1/3 cup softened shortening
(Or oil)

BEAT an additional minute

ADD: 4 1/2 cups sifted flour
MIX until soft dough is formed
LET stand for 20 minutes for easier handling.

DIVIDE dough in 1/2.
USE 1/2 for Kolacky,
REFRIGERATE the rest or make pan rolls.

KOLACKY:

ROLL to 1/2 inch thickness on floured board

CUT into 2 1/2 inch rounds
PLACE on greased cookie sheet
LET rise 40 minutes

PRESS indentation in centers with small glass

FILL with your favorite jam
BAKE at 375° for 18-20 minutes
FROST while still warm with thin icing.

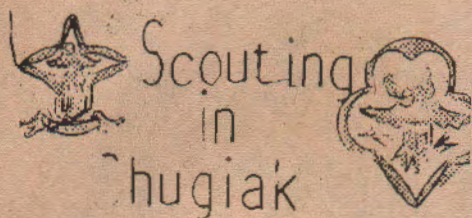

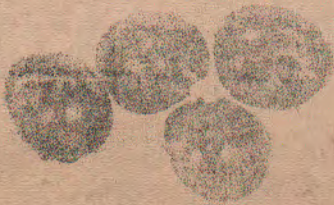
