

For our community sake, vote



REPORT FROM CHUGIKK VOLUNTEER FIRE CO.

This is the 2nd in a series of statements from Chief Fred Hahn of the Chugiak Fire Co.

"There has been much discussion about a Fire Company. The Chugiak Vol Fire Co. is an organization called a company. Company in this sense being the basic unit of a Fire Cept. It is used both in the United States and Canada under the platoon system which may range in size from eight to 24 menses (next cold)

(fire Co.)

A company normally has one or more major pieces of apparatus, although in a small community, such as Chugiak, a single Company will operate all the apparatus housed in their Fire Station. There are some pieces of apparatus such as rescue or salvage trucks which may be manned by two or more men.

The standards for distribution of Fire Companies usually is determined by the conditions of the community, taking into consideration the number of hose streams likely to be required, availability of man power, the accessibility of various parts of the community and feequency of alarms.

Two effective hose streams is the minimum requirements for scattered residences. A dozen or more streams for large fires in unsprinklered mercantile or institutional properties. In small communities, normal response should be two pumpers which permits at least one to arrive in case of accident or delay to the other, and an attack from two directions if they both arrive (contapage 9 col 3)



The permit must be accompanied by a valid seal.


