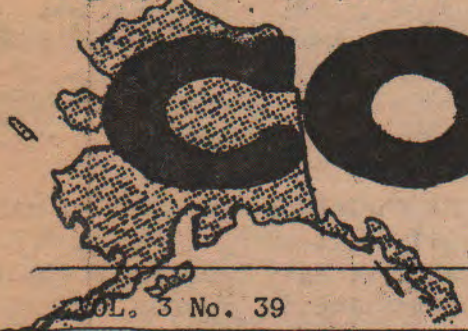

Curtain To Go Up On "Slicker"

A dress rehearsal complete with all props and scenery has shown that the Chugiak Players are quite ready to ring up the curtain on their initial production, an old fashioned Melodram, entitled "THE CITY SLICKER AND OUR NELL".

The play, starring Les Fetrow and Dorothy Thompson in the title roles will be presented in three performances at the Chugiak School multipurpose room on Friday and Saturday, November 25th and 26th at 8pm and a matinee at 3pm on November 27.

In addition to the one act melodrama there will be several musical acts presented as an olio, that is, performed in front of the curtain.

The cast enjoyed an unexpected treat following the rehearsal.

Coffee and cake had been arranged by Mrs. Thompson, the cake being a special one prepared by Mrs. Francis Lee of Swanee Slopes. It was inscribed with the name of the play, and on the top was written excerpts from the play, each being the choice line of one of the players.

An impromptu "jam session" with Natalie Haskell providing the music on the piano and the players singing favorite songs wound up the evening.

Tickets will go on sale at 7:30 on the nights of the performances, and a record crowd is anticipated.

PIONEER EAGLE RIVER FAMILY SYMPHONY MEMBERS

Arthur and Eleanor Breandel, one of the first family's to homestead in the Eagle River Valley are also charter members of the Anchorage Symphony Orchestra.

Residents of Alaska since 1945, and of Eagle River since 1947, the Breandels helped organize the Symphony in 1946 and this year Arthur was elected president, a post which he has also held in the past.

Both the Breandels play string instruments in the orchestra, Arthur playing the Violoncello, and Eleanor the viola.

Eleanor teaches both the violin and piano at their Eagle River home, and three of their own children are her pupils. Until just this year Eleanor was active in cub scouting, being Den mother for that area.

Chugiak To Petition For High School

A petition requesting additional classrooms, adequate bus facilities and a High School within three years is being prepared by the Advisory School Board, and will be circulated for signatures within the week.

The petition was drawn up in accordance with the suggestion of Representative Bruce Kendall and will be brought from door to door in the Chugiak school district for signatures.

It is imperative that the petition be in the hands of Governor Egan by the 1st of December in order that the items be included next budget which is being prepared.

Assisting the school board in drawing up the petition were school superintendent Lee Emmert and representatives of the PTA.

The figures which are to be presented to Governor Egan will show that according to the rate of increase, the anticipated number of students attending the Chugiak elementary school in four years will be 874, and in that time it is expected that there will be at least 250 high school students.

To be eligible to sign the petition, a person must be of legal voting age and either a resident or property owner in the Chugiak School district.

Mrs. Jack Stewart, president of the PTA has requested that a call be sent out for volunteers who are familiar with the area in which they live, to take the petitions around for signautes.

Anyone desiring to be of assistance may call Mrs. Stewart at H-2-5312.

The figures which are to be presented to Governor Egan will be for the year 1960. The rate of increase in the number of students at the Knik and Chugiak schools will be 87.4 and 87.4 respectively. HARRIET (RUSTY) BELLINGER, EDITOR & PUBLISHER.

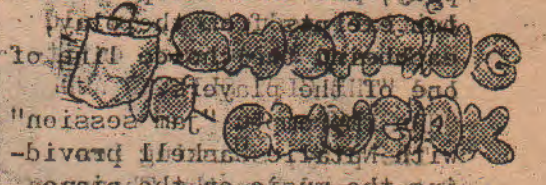
LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

COOK FOR NOVEMBER
DOROTHY JONRONE

Dorothy says that she is fond of biscuit mixes, she finds them so adaptable and easy to handle.

Here is a timely one utilizing that traditional holiday fruit which might make a welcome treat for breakfast on Thanksgiving Day.

CRANBERRY COFFEE CAKE

- 2 cups biscuit mix
- 5 tbsp sugar
- 1 tbs oil
- 1 egg
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 cup raw cranberries
(Alaskan lowbush may be used)

MIX in order given, adding cranberries last.
POUR into greased 8 in. sq. pan
COVER with topping

TOPPING

- 2 tbs biscuit mix
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 2 tbs soft butter

MAKE a crumbly mix
SPRINKLE over batter
BAKE at 350° for 25 minutes
SERVE warm.

SIXTH SPECIES OF SALMON CAUGHT

The identification of the sixth species of salmon being landed in Alaska was announced by Roy Rickey, Westward Regional Supervisor of the Commercial Fisheries Division.

On August 15 of this year, while at the P.E. Harris Cannery at False Pass, he had occasion to examine a salmon that had been laid aside in the fish house. Neither Don Rawlinson, the cannery superintendent nor Rickey could positively identify the fish.

It was thought that it was a hybrid or possibly the species that occurred on the Asian coast: Oncorhynchus masou or the Masu salmon.

It was agreed that the salmon should be frozen and transported to Dr. Arthur Welander, taxonomist at the University of Washington College of Fisheries, for possible identification. Dr. Welander's identification was Oncorhynchus masu as the specimen fit all the classifications used to describe the species.

The specimen was a female with well developed eggs and had spent two winters in the ocean. The physical characteristics of the salmon appeared to be a combination of several features of the other five species. One of the most obvious was the large number of small scales present as on the pink salmon. The head re- (cont page 5 col 1)

sembled a female chum salmon. There were a small number of fine black spots spread the length of the back from the head to the caudal peduncle, which was slender and rounded as a chum salmon. The tail structure and color resembled a red salmon. Flesh color was pale pink. A dark green coloration above the lateral line was retained many hours after death.

Rawlinson said that this species has been landed at the Flase Pass cannery on several occasions in past years from the Alaska Peninsula area but not identified before. This particular specimen was believed to have been caught in Balboa Bay near the Shumagin Islands.

The fish was also inspected by Dr. Ted Koo and Al Hart of Fisheries Research Institute. Dr. Koo said the scales resembled pink salmon scales, but had chum salmon characteristics also.

A clear view of the firing was entirely visible and the broadcast of the description of the firing had been taped for them to hear afterward.

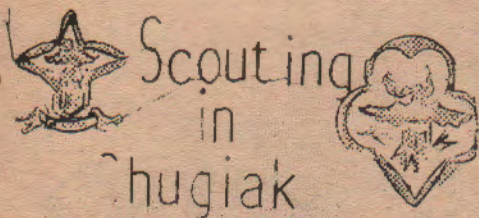

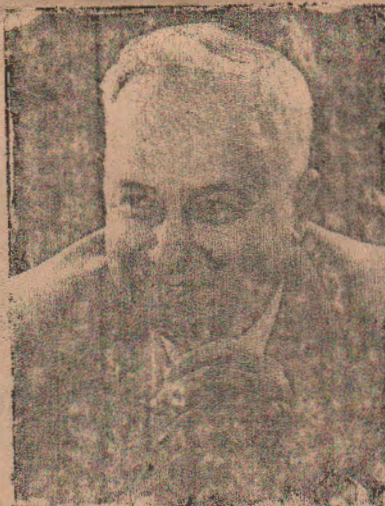
