## Birchwood Man To Represent MEA In Chugiak

All MEA business in Chugiak, with the exception of the payment of light bills will be directed to the newly appointed representative in the area, Frank (Hunk) Petronavich of Birchwood.

Petronavich, who until recently was associated with CEA will be constantly on duty in Chugiak to take care of any trouble calls, re-connects, dis-connects or any other MEA activity.

The MEA truck which will be assigned to this area seven days of the week will be in constant radio contact with the Matanuska Electric Association office in Palmer, and a radio is to be installed in the Petronavich home in Birchwood which will be able to call to the truck regardless of where in the area it may happen to be.

Mrs. Petronavich, is also employed as dispatcher for MEA and she will relay any calls via the radio to the service truck.

In the future residents of Chugiak are requested to call HO-2-5018 when they have any business to transact with MEA.

This includes new subscribers who wish to have meters installed.

This new system is expected to facilitate things in the Chugiak area and to make prompt more efficient service available.

A HIGH SCHOOL FOR CHUGIAK

A High School here in Chugiak  
is certainly an exciting prop-  
spect, and certainly not an  
overly ambitious one.

The current petition which  
is now being circulated con-  
tains a phrase requesting  
drawings for a high school  
in our community.

This will probably remind  
some of the old timers of  
when the residents of Chug-  
iak were seeking to have a  
grade school built in this  
area.

Then the grade school stud-  
ents had to travel by bus to  
Anchorage as our high school  
students do now, a tiring trip  
and often dangerous over icy  
roads.

When the school was complet-  
ed and the 64 students enrol-  
led in the fall of 1951, no  
one could have predicted that  
in ten short years the enrol-  
ment would have grown to al-  
most six hundred youngsters,  
and the need for a second sch-  
ool in the area become so ur-  
gent.

With this increase in mind  
the need for our own high  
school within the next few  
year is apparent for all to  
see.

There have been comments  
passed that perhaps our  
high school students would  
be deprived of some of the  
privileges enjoyed only in  
a large high school if we  
were to have a school of  
our own.

However the general opin-  
ion is that Chugiak students  
are handicapped by the great  
distance they must travel  
to Anchorage, and that in  
very few instances do any  
of them have the opportuni-  
ty to participate in any  
of the extra curricular ac-  
tivities, that are regarded  
as the advantages received  
in a larger high school.

Only if the parents are  
able to provide transportation  
for their children after  
school may they partake in  
any such activities. Most  
of the students must really  
scamper at the close of  
school in order to board  
the bus home.

A high school of our own  
is only a dream now, but  
not for long we feel sure.

By the time some of our  
present fourth or even fifth  
graders are ready to enter  
high school, we feel sure  
that they will have one in  
our own community for them.

Most people who have at-  
tended both high schools  
in small towns as well as  
those in large cities, ad-  
mit that they found the  
school spirit just as strong  
if not stronger in the sm-  
aller ones and felt that  
they were able to get more  
out of their high school  
education in the smaller  
less impersonal school.

We have had heard a great  
many comments and suggest-  
ions on where Chugiak High  
shhould be located, and we  
would like to hear from  
some of our readers in let-  
ters that we might print.

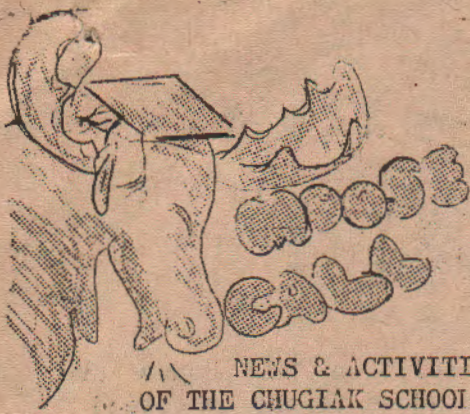

EXPANDED HIGHWAY PROGRAM ANTICIPATED

On November 20, 1960, highway construction projects recently awarded and still under contract in Alaska totalled over fourteen million dollars.

"This amount alone," said Mr. A. G. Gardner, Assistant State Highway Engineer "guarantees a big start next spring; and when coupled with the many projects now in the final stages of design and right of way acquisition will provide a spring highway program unequalled in Alaska's history."

Gardner pointed out that about one-half of the work now under contract will be carried to completion by the Bureau of Public Roads as the states contractor. After that, the Bureau will directly supervise only forest highway and park service projects. Federal Aid highway projects will be handled by the Department of Public Works through its Division of Highways with the Bureau of Public Roads supervising the manner in which the Federal funds are spend.

"The large highway program now ready for next spring comes at a most timely moment due to the decrease in some other Federal public works programs slated for next summer," Gardner said.

Mr. T.D. Sherad, Director and Chief Engineer of the State Division of Highways, praised all employees of his Division. "The fact that the Highway Division (next col

# Cook Of The Month

COOK FOR NOVEMBER  
DOROTHY JONRWE

There does not live a cook who doesn't have a favorite cookie recipe, and this one Dorothy has given us has many variations.

### BUTTER DROP COOKIES

- 1 cup butter (oleo)
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt

CREAM butter & sugar  
 ADD egg and flavoring  
 BEAT until fluffy  
 ADD sifted dry ingredients  
 MIX until smooth  
 DROP by teaspoon onto lightly greased cookie sheet  
 BAKE at 400° 5 to 8 minutes  
 YIELDS 4 doz cookies

### VARIATIONS

#### CHOCOLATE:

ADD 2 squares melted unsweetened chocolate before the dry ingredients.

#### CHERRY-COCONUT:

ADD 1 cup flaked coconut to butter  
TOP each cookie with candied cherry before baking.

#### PECAN :

ADD 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans to butter (walnuts may be substituted.)

### UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION APPLICANTS WARNED

JUNEAU: The Director of Alaska Employment Security program today reminded applicants for unemployment compensation benefits they must list their earnings while drawing weekly insurance checks.

Merrill E. Weir, Director of the Labor Department Employment Security Division, pointed out that when the unemployed apply for (next col.)

### (Unemployment)

jobless benefits, they must truthfully state whether they have had an income for the period they were unemployed. Misstatements subject the applicants to legal action, loss of their benefits for six months and over-payments must be repaid.

Robert L Anderson, Chief of the Benefits Section that handles applications for unemployment insurance for some 20,000 persons annually, says it is now difficult to defraud the unemployment compensation fund and get away with it. "We catch up with them sooner or later," he said.

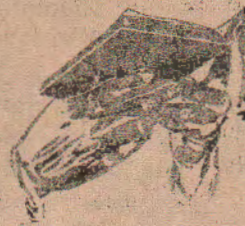

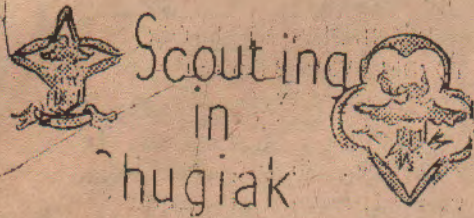

EAGLE RIVER HILL SCENE OF TWO WRECKS

She urges all parents to be on hand this Friday, to pick up their children by 9:15 at the latest.

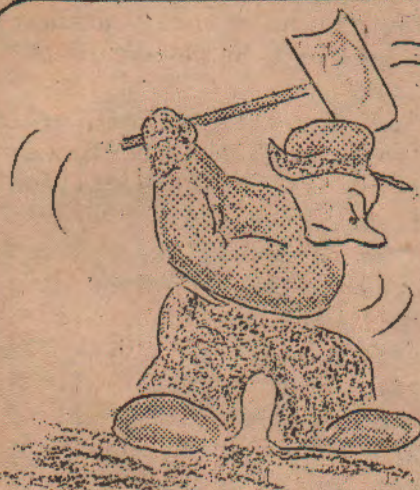

## LOCAL DOCTOR TRAVELING IN SOUTH 43

In a recent letter received from Doctor Marshall A Simpson, he tell us that he has been doing much traveling and that he and his family have been having a very enjoyable vacation.

The Simpsons have been combining business and pleasure, vacationing while the Doctor has attended several meetings and conferences.

Dr. Simpson told us that while in Wilmington Delaware he has been doing research in the library of the Delaware Academy of Medicine; a library well stocked with recent acquisitions which he has found very informative.

He has also had the opportunity to attend the Medical News Radio Broadcast which originates from Philadelphia and which is on a two way hook-up so that physicians in attendance can have an immediate reply to their questions. Dr. Simpson said that he found the discussions about afibrinogenemia and steroid therapy most educational and informative.

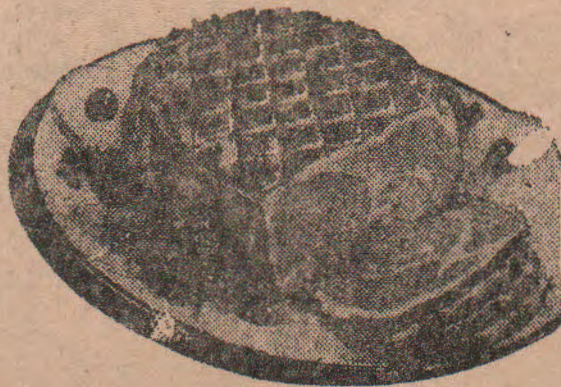
