## Birchwood Family Burned Out

A telephone receiver left off the hook resulted in the total destruction by fire of the home of the Thomas DiNatale family of Birchwood.

Mrs. DiNatale discovered the fire which had started in the electrical wiring in the roof of the house and attempted to call the fire company.

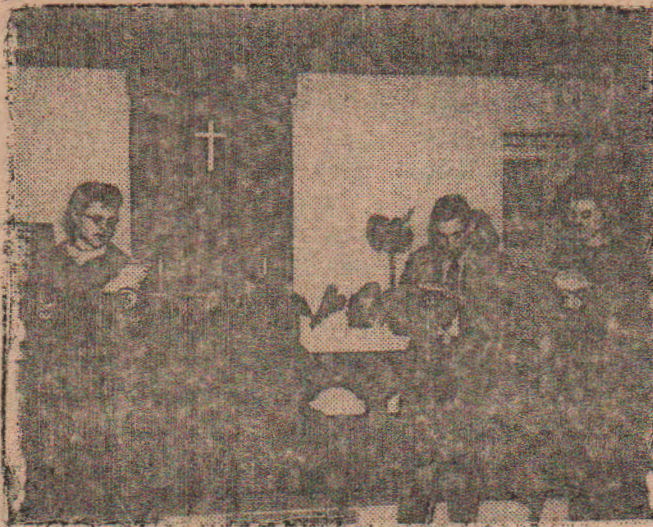
She discovered that someone on her party line had left their phone off the hook and she was unable to call out.

The fire at this time was still progressing slowly, so she sent two of the children to a neighbors to call in the fire.

The children finally ended up at the home of Wes Mickey where they gave Mrs. Mickey the incorrect message that "...a woodpile was smoking and that they were afraid it was going to catch fire."

Mrs. Mickey called the fire company, but since the DiNatale's were newly arrived in the community the location of their home was not known. The children gave the location as near Ondola's. This led to confusion as there are two families by that name in different sections of the community.

## Chugiak Helps Elect A President

A record 750 voters turned out in Chugiak to help select a president in the first presidential election in the state of Alaska.

This is over 200 more than the 549 who voted in the primary last August.

Ballot number one was cast by Mr. Elva Osbourne of the Birchwood Building Material Yard who had arrived at 7:30 to construct the voting booths out of lumber which he had donated.

Also donating to the polling place were the Market Basket who supplied the ballot boxes, Lorraines Dept Store who provided the curtains for the booths and Eagle River Hardware who supplied shelf brackets.

PARTY LINE HAZARDS

One of the hazards of the  
multi-party line telephone  
is that at some time or other  
someone is guilty of leaving  
the phone "off the hook."

How often has one of us  
picked up the receiver only  
to be greeted by the sound  
of distant conversation, a  
radio or television or child-  
ren playing in someones home  
or one of the many indications  
that someone has failed to  
properly replace their rec-  
eiver after using it.

This is at the least an an-  
noyance and usually a great  
inconvenience. The thought  
that usually crosses the mind  
at this time is "...what if  
we needed to call a doctor  
or there was a fire...."

Well, last week just such  
an incident happened, with  
the results noted on the front  
page of this issue of the  
COURIER.

This was one instance when  
a call to the fire company  
could have resulted in the  
saving of a home, but....  
someone had the phone off  
the hook.

The telephone company has  
repeatedly cautioned it's  
subscribers of the res-(next

col.

(telephones)

possibilities of being on a  
party line. This week the  
COURIER would like to re-  
peat these and add a few  
of our own observations.

Small children playing  
with the phones are the worst  
offenders. It goes without  
saying that phones should be  
so placed as to be out of  
reach youngsters, or better  
still a wall phone installed.

Small objects such as ash-  
trays on the table next to  
the phone are sometimes en-  
ough to cock the receiver  
just enough to leave the  
line open.

Many people protest that  
they use their phone very  
little, sometimes not for  
days. These are the ones  
who are most likely to of-  
fend, as if their phone should  
be replaced incorrectly or  
knocked off during dusting,  
they would be unlikely to  
become aware of it for a long  
time.

Also phones in public places  
such as taverns are frequen-  
tly left off the hook by cus-  
tomers who use the phone and  
carelessly replace it.

Therefor it behoves all of  
us to take it upon ourselves  
to be our own keeper in this  
department.

Following these few sug-  
gestions may keep last week's  
tragedy from being repeated.

Phones should always be  
out of reach of small children.  
The table on which the phone  
is kept should be free of any  
object which might hold the  
receiver up, and above all,  
whether or not you use your  
phone frequently, (next col.)

check it whenever you think  
of it.

Party lines will be with  
us for a long time, lets try  
to make the best of it, and  
respect the rights of those  
who share our line with us.

# Cook Of The Month

COOK FOR NOVEMBER  
DOROTHY JONROWE

Homemade soup is a treat that we rarely get anymore. This hearty beef soup is equally good made with moose or caribou. Dorothy offers a small hint...let it simmer on the top of a space heater!

## BROWN STOCK

- 5 # soup bone
- 3 qts cold water
- 6 whole cloves
- pepper to taste
- 3 bay leaves
- 2 tsp parsley flakes
- 1 tsp thyme
- 1 1/3 tbs. salt
- 2 stalks celery
- 1 No. 2 can peas & carrots
- 1 No. 2 can whole kernel corn
- 3 large onions
- 2 large cans tomato soup
- 2 cups elbow macaroni

CUT 1/2 meat from bones and brown.  
PUT drippings in large kettle  
ADD water and rest of meat and bone.  
ADD seasonings  
BRING to boil  
SIMMER 4 hours  
ADD vegetables and macaroni  
COOK one hour more  
ADD tomato soup

Dorothy makes this comment:  
"...I like to make this right after dinner and let it simmer all evening. Then it's ready to reheat for dinner the next day. This also freezes well. Wonderful on a wintry day!"

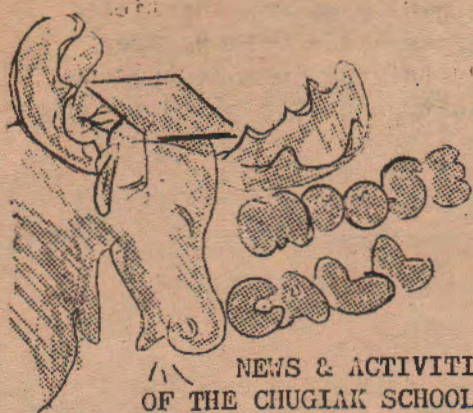

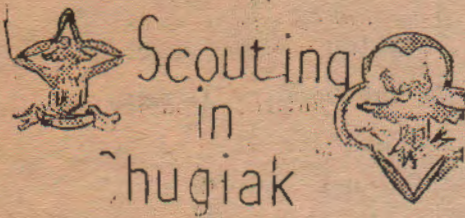

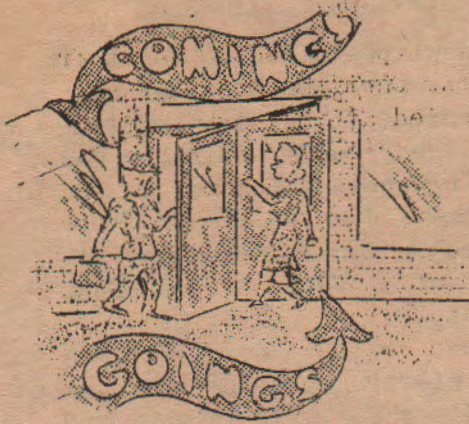

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## DOCTOR ATTENDS HEART ASSOCIATION MEETING

Word has been received from Dr. Marshall Simpson who is attending the meeting of the American Heart Association at St. Louis Mo.

Dr. Simpson has attended numerous clinical sessions where new techniques and diagnosis were discussed and demonstrated.

The Doctor expresses special interest in a discussion on "Ear Oxmetry in Cardiac Diagnosis", that is the measurement of oxygen saturation of the blood as measured at the ear and how it may help in the diagnosis of certain heart diseases. The Doctor told how he and Mrs. Simpson attended the annual dinner of the American Heart Association. At this affair medical problems are discussed in a social atmosphere. Several hundred physicians and their wives attended the dinner, at which three gold hearts were presented.

One of these was to have been presented to Eddie Cantor, who was unable to attend. It was accepted in his absence by actor Vincint Price who gave the major address of the evening. Dr. & Mrs. Simpson found him a very forceful and ententaining speaker.

The Doctor went on to tell of the many panels and demonstrations that he attended.

One of which was particular interest was a demonstration of a new technique of closed chest resusitation for victims of heart attacks, by Dr. Samuel A Levine.

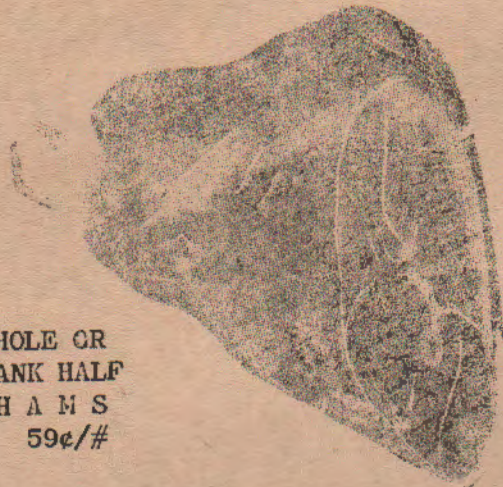

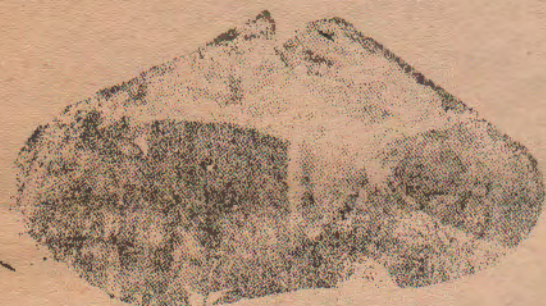
