She discovered that someone on her party line had left their phone off the hook and she was unable to call out.


The fire at this time ins was still progressing slowly, so she sent two of the children to a neighbors to call in the fire.

The children finally ended up at the home of Wes Mickey where they gave lirs. Mickey the incorrect message that " .. a woodpile was smoking and that they were afraid it was going to catch fire."

Firs. Mickey called the fire company, but since the DiNatale's were newly arrived in the community the location of their home was not known. The children gave the location as near Ondola's. PARTY LINE HAZARDS

One of the hazards of the multi-party lime telephone is that at some time or other someone is guilty of leaving the phone "off the hook."

How often has one of us picked up the receiver only to be greeted by the sound of distant conversation, a radio or televison or children playing in someones home or one of the many indications that someone has failed to properly replace their receiver after using it.

Thes is at the least an annoyance and usually a great inconvenience. The thought that usually crosses the mind at this time is "... what if we needed to call a doctor or there was a fire...."

Well, last week just such an incident happened, with the results noted on the front page of this issue of the CCURIER.

This was one instance when a call to the fire company could have resulted in the saving of a home, but.... someone had the phone off the hook.

The telephone company has repeatedly cautioned it's subscribers of the res-(next

(telephones)

ponsibilities of being on a party line. This week the COURIER would like to repeat these and add a few of our own observations.

Small children playing with the phones are the worst offenders. It goes without saying that phones should be so placed as to be out of reach youngsters, or better still a wall phone installed.

Small objects such as ashtrays on the table next to the phone are sometimes enough to cock the receiver just enough to leave the line open.

Many people protest that they use their phone very little, sometimes not for days. These are the ones who are most likely to offend, as if their phone should be replaced incorrectly or knocked off during dusting, they would be unlikely to become aware of it for a long time.

Also phones in public places such as taverns are frequently left off the hook by customers who use the phone and carelessly replace it.

Therefor it behoves all of us to take it upon ourselfes to be our own keeper in this department.

Fallowing these few sugfestions may keep last week's tragedy from being repeated.

Phones should always be out of reach of small children the table on which the phone is kept should be free of any object which might hold the receiver up, and above all, whether or not you use your phone frequently, (next col.)

check it whenever you think of it.

Party lines will be with us for a long time, lets try to make the best of it, and respect the rights of those who khare our line with us.

1 No. 2 can whole kernel corn

3 large onions

2 large cans tomato soup

2 cups elbow macaroni

CUT ½ meat from bones and brown

PUT drippings in large kettle ADD water and rest of meat and

bone:

ADD seasonings BRING to boil

SIMMER 4 hours

ADD vegetables and macaroni

COOK one hour more

ADD tomato soup





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
