More Gifts For New Years Baby

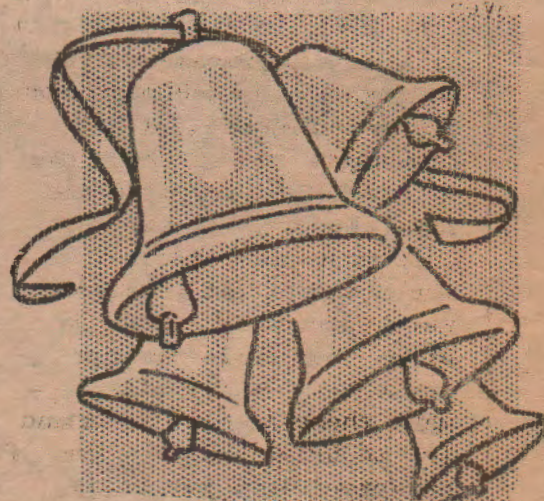
Three more Chugiak business establishments have added their names to the list of those who will be presenting gifts to the first baby to be born of Chugiak parents in 1961.

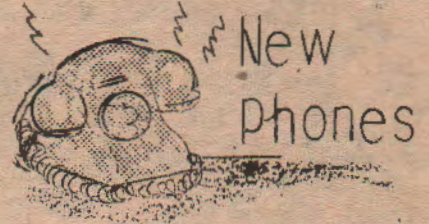
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MOTORISTS MUST PRESENT

YOUTH CAMP BUILDINGS ACCEPTED

Acceptance and occupancy of the first permanent buildings at the Matanuska Valley Youth Conservation Camp near Wasilla was announced today by Charles Pfeiffer, director of the Department of Health and Welfare's Youth and Adult Authority.

The two buildings--a dormitory and combination mess-hall and kitchen were built by the Capital Construction Co., Palmer.

SNOW REMOVAL EQUIPMENT TO BE MADE AVAILABLE

Public Works Commissioner, Richard A. Downing said today that State-owned snow removal equipment will be made available by the Division of Highways, on a reimbursable basis, for removal of snow from driveways of commercial establishments along State Highways in remote areas where other equipment is not available.

Such work will be done, he said after completion of the division's primary responsibility for snow removal on State highways and after clearing away snow berms left at entrances to dwellings and roadside establishments during the course of clearing the highways.

Downing said that the policy was adopted "in realization of the necessity for maintaining access for the travelling public to those commercial establishments in remote or isolated areas which furnish necessary services to motorists travelling upon the main highways of the State of Alaska."

THE COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR DECEMBER :
CYNTHIA LOWE

Of her last recipe, Cynthia boasts, "...So far I've only met one man who couldn't be won over with Grandmother's chocolate cake. Sounds awfully conceited, but it's true !

CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 2 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3 squares baking chocolate
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2/3 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup boiling water

MELT chocolate & shortening together over hot water
 ADD the sugar
 COOL to lukewarm
 ADD beaten eggs & vanilla
 SIFT together, flour, soda and salt
 ADD to chocolate mixture alternately with buttermilk.
 MIX gently, only enough to blend ingredients
 ADD boiling water last
 MIX together
 POUR into two 8" round or square pans (greased and lined)
 BAKE at 350° for 30 min.
 COOL baked layers few minutes
 REMOVE from pans
 PEEL off paper liners.

FROSTING:

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 tbs cornstarch
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 1/4 tsp salt (next col.)

(cook of the month)

1 cup boiling water
 1 tbsp butter
 1 tsp vanilla
 GRATE chocolate into tiny slivers
 MIX with sugar, cornstarch and salt
 POUR into boiling water
 MIX well
 COOK until mixture thickens and becomes glossy.
 REMOVE from heat
 ADD butter and vanilla
 CONTINUE beating for 1 minute
 SPREAD on cake layers while still hot for a nice gloss.

1961 HUNTING LICENSES MAY BE LATE

The Alaska Department of Fish and Game said today that due to printing difficulties the new 1961 hunting, fishing and trapping licenses will probably be delayed in delivery. Al Bloomquist, Supervisor of the Department's Licensing Section, said that even though the actual licenses may not be available on the first of the year, the 1960 licenses still expire on December 31st.
 This doesn't mean you can't go hunting (next col.)

(licenses may be late)

(there is a special deer season in some parts of Southeastern Alaska which will remain open until Jan. 31) or trapping until the new licenses are available. Bloomquist explained that there is a way around the difficulty. If you are planning on going hunting or trapping before the new licenses become available, this is what you should do:

- 1: Complete two State license applications (these can be obtained from any licensing officer) and have them certified by a Licensing Officer, Notary Public, Magistrate or Postmaster.
2. Mail one copy with the correct remittance to State of Alaska, Department of Fish and Game, License Section, Support Building, Juneau.
 For your own protection, the remittance should be either registered or certified. The 1961 license will then be issued and mailed from Juneau as soon as they are available.
3. A copy of the application should be kept by the applicant, so that if he is checked by a Department of Fish and Game Protection Officer in the field, he will have verification, confirming his application for a current license.
