"CARE" HELPS THOSE
WHO REALLY NEED IT.

In the midst of the annual
Food Crusade distributions
to 20 countries overseas,
CARE, the foreign relief
agency, has been dispatch-
ing emergency relief to two
Latin American areas.

Costa Rica, severely dam-
aged by floods, and Guatem-
ala, hit by Caribbean storms
have been receiving special
assistance from CARE, it is
announced by the Northwest
office in Seattle.

In addition to 5,000 cans
of meat rushed to flood vic-
tims in Costa Rica, CARE has
allocated an additional
\$5,000 to help with recon-

struction of damaged dwell-
ings in the Guanacaste prov-
ince.

CARE's mission chief in
Costa Rica, reports that the
meat has "staved off out-
right starvation in many
places where, as a result
of their worst flood in the
history of the country, food
stockpiles were wither crit-
ically low or non-existent."

Medical supplies, includ-
ing 600 pounds of dressing
and bandages, 400 blood trans-
fusion kits, 12 large CARE
first aid kits, and several
thousand anti-malaria tabl-
ets, were dispatched by air
freight to disaster regions
of Guatemala.

Holiday contributions to
aid refugees or disaster vic-
tims through CARE may be sent
to the CARE office, Seattle
11, or to local outlets, in
this case the Northern Com-
mercial Company in Anchorage.

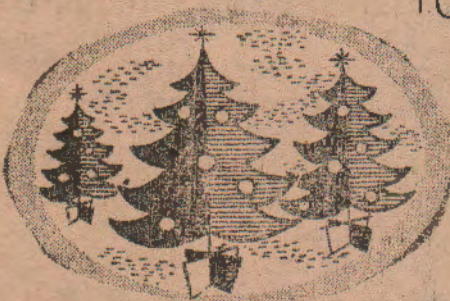

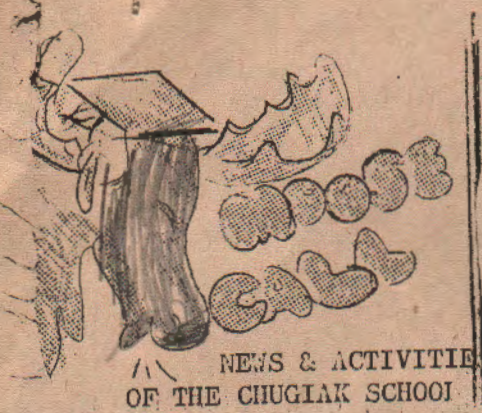

The Jay Womac family have moved to Mt. View for the winter. The Womac's have been renting the Paul Curtis home at mile 22 1/2.

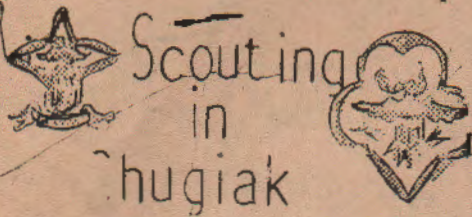

The Cook of The Month

Most everyone reached a joint in their lives when they feel that they are in "a rut", but few are willing to take such drastic measures to get out as did the family of our cook for December.

When Cynthia Lowe's family reached this decision, they packed up lock-stock and barrel and left their home in Delaware to come to Alaska and make a new life.

The Lowe's fell in love with Chugiak immediately and had no other Alaskan home than their one at mile 25.

Cynthia and Bill, who were both originally from New England, came to Alaska in the summer of 1959 along with their three children.

They spent their first summer in a tent as they built their home. "I feel that we are real Alaskan's", says Cynthia, "because we lived in a tent until after the first snowfall."

Although they have lived in the community a comparatively short time, the Lowe's were quick to become a part of Chugiak. Bill is a member of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. and both belong to the Peters Creek Community Club, the PTA and the Chugiak Players.

Cynthia, (or Cindy as her friends call her) loves to have people around her, and also loves to cook. She says that she accomplishes the former by exercising the later, namely feeding them.

There is usually an extra chair pulled up at the Lowe dinner table as friends always feel welcome to drop

in at any time.

Cynthia says that she has cooked over every type of stove imaginable, from an open fire to the most modern ranges.

Both Cynthia and Bill work, Cynthia at Ft. Richardson and Bill at Elmendorf. The three Lowe children (Kitti, 13, Richard 11 and Suzie 6) all attend the Chugiak School.

We know that Cynthia's many friends will enjoy reading about her, and will look forward to sharing some of her favorite recipes while she is our cook of the month.

For Cynthia's first recipe, we will print it in her own words.

"...Many of my favorite recipes are handed down from my mother and my grand-mother. This is an old-time beef stew brought up-to-date for either reindeer (add a good dash of

(Bells poultry seasoning) moose (a couple of bay leaves) or caribou (add ginger to taste. It is especially good cooked outdoors over a wood fire for hours and hours, but can be cooked over any form of heat.

CUT meat into pieces about 2 inches long, free of almost all fat.

WIPE off

PLACE in large heavy kettle

COVER with hot water

BRING to boil

ALLOW to simmer until tender (at least two hours)

SKIM off excess fat

CUT celery, onions, turnips into bits size pieces

ADD to meat

ALLOW to partially cook

ADD cubed white potatoes and fresh frozen peas and canned tomatoes

DUMPLINGS may be placed on top of stew about 12 min. before serving.

...You may use any quantities you desire, but be sure to make a large enough amount ...it disappears like magic!"

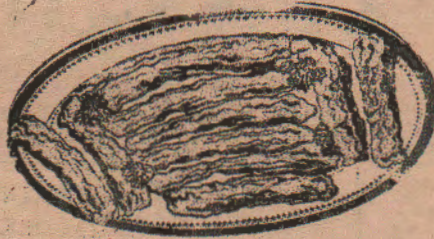

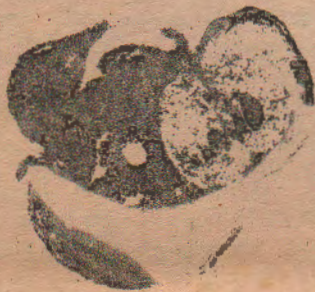

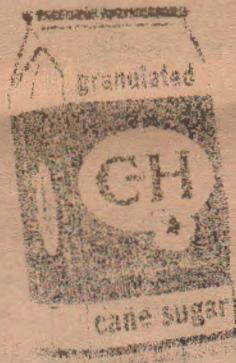
