In the midst of the annual Food Crusade distbibutions to 20 countries overseas, CAME, the foreign relief agency, has been dispatching emergency relief to two Latin American areas.

Costa Rica, everely dameged by floods, and Guatemala, hit by Caribbean storms have been receiving special assistance from CARE, it is announced by the Northwest office in Seattle.

In addition to 5,000 cans of meat rushed to flood victims in Costa Rica, CARE has allocated an additional \$5,000 to help with recon-(next col.)

struction of damaged dwellings in the Guanacaste prov-p

CARE's mission chief in Costa Rica, reports that the meat has "staved off outright starvation in many places where, as a result of theis worst flood in the history of the country, food stockpiles were wither critically dow or non-existent."

Medical supplies, including 600 pounds of dressing and bandages, 400 blood trans fusion kits, 12 large CARE first aid kits; and several thousand anti-malaria tablets, were dispatched by air freight to disaster regions of Guatemala.

Holiday contributions to aid refugees or disaster victims through CARE may be sent to the CARE office, Seattle 11, or to local outlets, in this case the Northern Commercial Company in anchorage.



For Cynthia's first recipe, we will print it in her own words.

ipies are handed down from my mother and my grand-mother This is an old-time beef stew brought up-to-date for either reindeer(add a good dash of (Bells poultry seasoning)
moose (a couple of bay leaves)
or caribou (addd ginger to
taste. It is especially good
cooked outdoors over a wood
fire for hours and hours, but
can be cooked over any form of
heat.

CUT meat into pieces about 2 inches long, free of almost all fat.

WIPE off
PLACE in large heavy kettle
COVER with hot water
BRING to boil

ALLOW to simmer until tender
(at least two hours)
SKIM off excess fat

CUT celery, onions, turnips into bits size pieces ADD to meat

ALLOW to partially cook
ADD cuped white potatoes and
fresh frozen peas and canned tomatoes

DUMPLINGS may be places on top of stew about 12 min. before serving.




