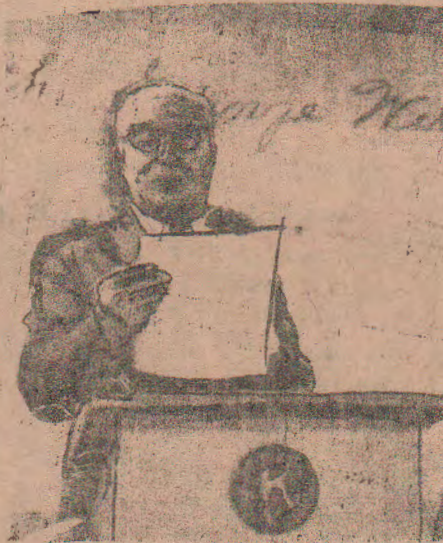
There are also plans to put on a play this year, although this will not be considered as a fund raising project.

PASSING OF SCHOOL  
BUSES

The state police have in-  
formed us that there have  
been numerous complaints in  
this area of cars passing the  
school buses when they are  
loading and discharging stu-  
dents.

For this reason they have  
been concentrating in the  
Chugiak area during the hours  
when the buses are on the road.

It was the fact that a pas-  
senger car was in the neighbor-  
hood that was responsible for  
the prompt response and speedy  
arrest of the driver who  
passed one of the buses last  
month and struck a school boy

We are all of us aware that  
aside from being a violation  
of the law, common sense de-  
crees that passing a bus that  
may be picking up or discharg-  
ing small children is utter  
folly.

During the dead of winter  
these buses travel after the  
hours of darkness, and it is  
very difficult to see the  
small forms darting out to  
cross the road.

The near tragedy last month  
and the very real tragedy nine  
years ago, when one little  
girl was killed and her sis-  
ter seriously injured by a  
truck passing a bus are grim

evidence of how easy ac-  
cidents can happen.

The offender in the ac-  
cident last month was not a  
resident of Chugiak, and let  
us hope that these other of-  
fenders that have been ob-  
served are also not any of  
us.

Remember, those are our  
children on those buses, so  
please, let them grow up.

to stop when you see those  
blinking lights

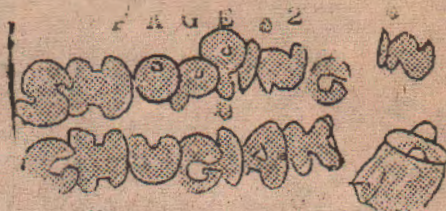

## GOVERNOR REQUESTS TOK CUSTOMS OFFER 24 HOUR SERVICE

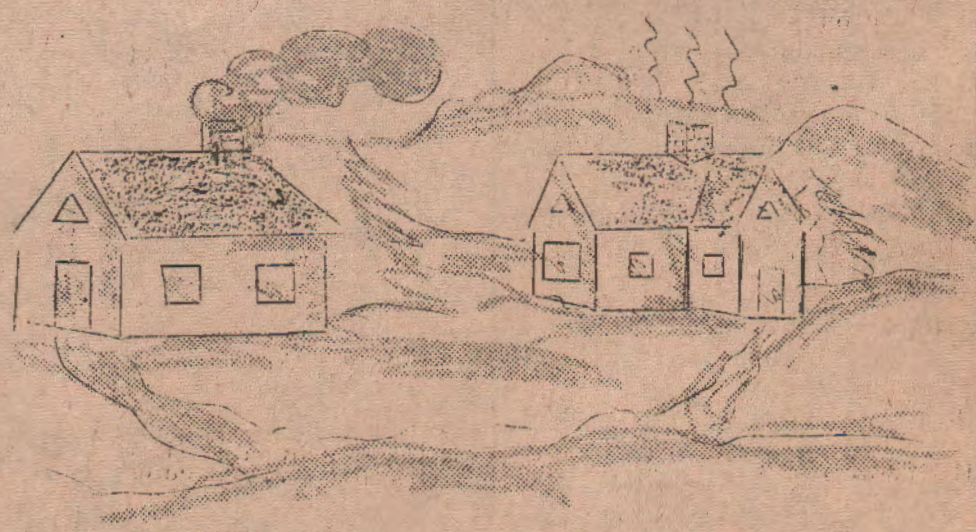
Governor Egan has formally requested the U.S. Customs to "immediately institute year-round 24 hour daily service at the Tok Alaska Station."

MISS Betsy Mickey



## COOK FOR JANUARY

MISS Betsy Mickey

For her second recipe, Betsy has given us a simple cake that is still festive enough to serve at any company occasion.

### DUTCH CHERRY CAKE

- 1 1/2 cups canned red cherries
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 3 tsp baking powder
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 eggs (separated)
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup melted shortening
- 1 tsp vanilla

DRAIN cherries (saving the juice)  
SIFT flour, salt, baking powder and 1/2 cup sugar)

BEAT egg yolks and COMBINE with milk, vanilla and shortening.

ADD flour mixture all at once and beat until smooth.

FOLD in cherries.

BEAT egg whites until stiff, but not dry.

ADD remaining sugar and fold into mixture.

BAKE in (greased 7" x 11" pan at 350° for 50 minutes.

(If a larger cake is desired, double ingredients and bake in 9" x 13" pan.)

SERVE hot or cold with hot cherry sauce.

### CHERRY SAUCE

- 1/2 cup butter
- 3 tbs flour
- 1 cup cherry juice
- 2 tbs lemon juice
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 drops almond extract

MELT butter

BLEND in flour

ADD cherry juice and cook until thickens, stirring constantly.

ADD lemon juice and sugar and almond extract.

Makes 1 1/4 cups. If cake recipe is doubled, also double sauce recipe.

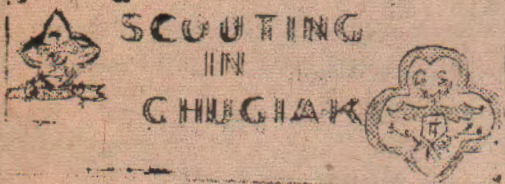

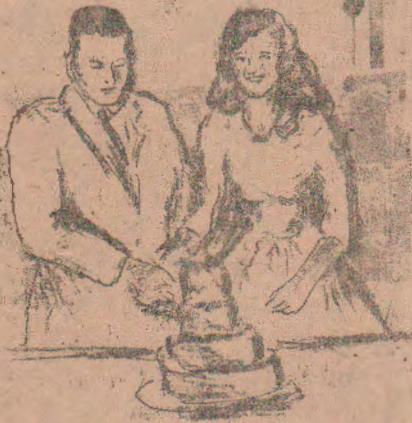

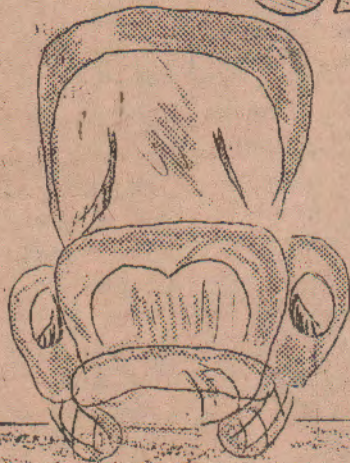

# Book Report

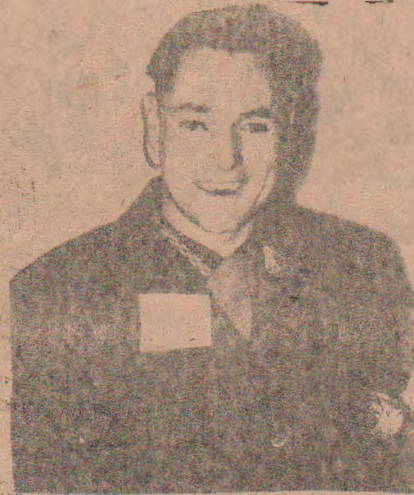

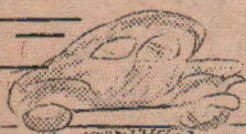

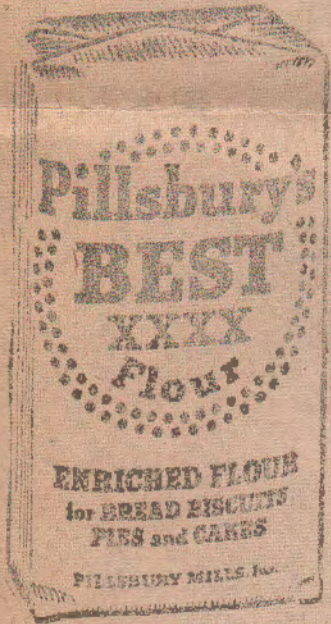
