## Fuel Tanker Involved in 3 car collision

A collision between a new Texaco fuel truck, a stake bed pick-up and a Plymouth passenger car occurred at mile 19 Glenn Highway early Saturday morning (Jan 16th).

The tanker was passing the pick-up on the hill, when the sedan appeared headed in the opposite direction (toward Palmer).

The tank truck cut back sharply in an attempt to avoid the Plymouth clipping the pick-up as it did so. The sedan struck the side of the tanker and careened into the ditch on the right-hand side of the road, striking a rock outcropping.

Slight damage was sustained by the pick-up and the tanker, however the sedan was severely damaged both the frame and the body.

None of the parties involved sustained any injury.

Chugiak Volunteer Firemen arrived at the scene and directed traffic until the arrival of the State Police.

spite fading hope for their safety.

Reports of distress signals in the Cape Newingham area proved to unrelialbe when checked out. The supposed distress signal in which the numbers of the missing aircraft were supposed to have been mentioned was traced, but it is now doubted that it was an actual distress call. It was reported as a garbled voice (next col.)

transmission in which it was thought that the last two numbers of the missing aircraft had been mentioned.

It is now believed that what had been overheard was merely a report of the missing plane, not a signal from it.

It was very unlikely that the aircraft had enough remaining fuel to carry it to that area.

However, the Civil Air Patrol has not yet abandoned the search and will continue until all possible areas have been checked out.

It is still possible that if Newton and Miss McGladrey had managed to survive the landing and were able to make full use of the survival equipment that was known to be aboard the plane, that they might still be alive and well.

The next meeting will be held on February 1st. at 8 PM.

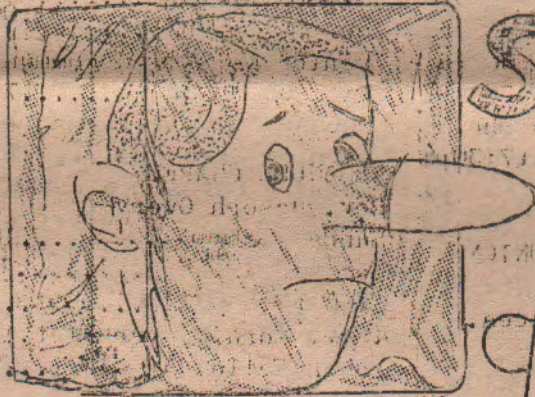

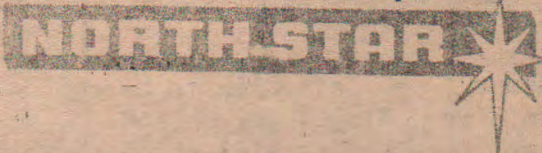

COOK FOR JANUARY

BETSY MICKEY

Betsy tells us that her husband is very fond of dates, so therefor many of her recipies call for this healthful, delicious fruit.

One of her favorites is this unusual refrigerator cookie with a date filling.

DATE PINWHEEL COOKIES  
(makes 6 dozen)

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar (firmly packed)
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 1 egg
- 2 cups sifted flour
- Salt to taste
- 1/4 tsp soda
- 7 1/4 oz. pkg. pitted dates
- 1 cup chopped nuts

CREAM butter  
ADD brown sugar & 1/2 cup granulated sugar, vanilla and egg.

BEAT until light  
ADD sifted dry ingredients  
CHILL until firm enough to roll.

### DATE FILLING

CUT dates into small pieces.  
BRING to a boil with remain-  
ing 1/4 cup sugar  
Dash salt and  
1/3 cup water.  
SIMMER for 5 minutes stir-

ring often.  
ADD nuts and cool.  
HALVE dough.  
ROLL each half on floured  
waxed paper into 9"x12"  
rectangle.  
SPREAD with filligg.  
ROLL up tightly from end.  
WRAP in paper.

SLICE 1/4 inch thick  
BAKE in moderate oven (375°)  
for 10 minutes.

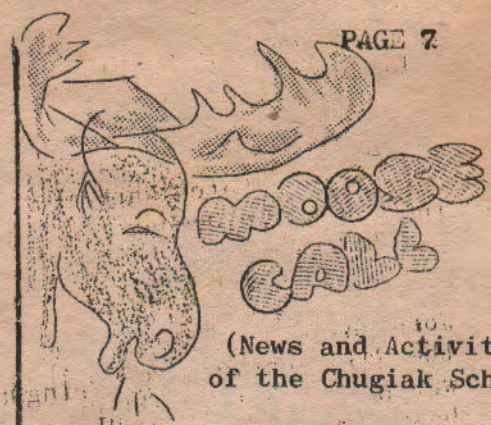

Carol Witherall..5th Grade

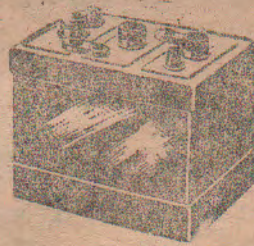
Carol Witherall the fifth grade teacher at the Chugiak school is also the girls physical education teacher.
