CHUGIAK MAY BE SITE OF AMUSE- MENT PARK

Chugiak may become the site of a permanent amusement park, if negotiations between Dick "KoKo" Rand and CBA arrive at a satisfactory conclusion.

Rand has purchased the rides from the now defunct "KiddyLand" and wished to install them at the Chugiak Carnival Grounds.

Rand has many plans, including the establishment of public picnic grounds, with the miniature railroad running to them. He is seeking a long term lease.

Should CBA agree to the lease, they would reserve the Carnival Hall for the use of the community, as well as two of the quonsets.

Also, they would reserve the right to conduct an annual carnival.

CBA comptroller, Tom Slanker was authorized to meet with Rand and work out a contract to be submitted to the board.

GIRL TUMBLERS ENTERTAIN PTA

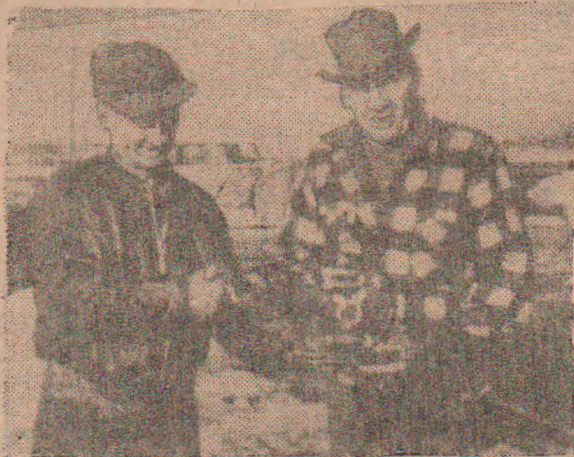
Girls of the 8th grade physical education class opened the March meeting of the PTA with an exhibition of tumbling.

WILFORD CHARLES WINS CHEECHAKO

Eighteen novice dog mushers competed on the ten mile course at Eagle River last Sunday at the 2nd annual Cheechako Sled Dog races.

Winner, in 39:16 minutes was Wilford Charles of Eagle River, who, like all the contestants qualified by not having ever competed in a sled dog race which offered a cash prize.

Second place in 42:25 minutes was Carl Pettie of Eagle River while Bob Barclay of Anchorage was third in 43:45 minutes.

Of the two women competitors, Mary Brinson of Chugiak finished 9th in 53:04 minutes, while Judy Bladholm of Anchorage was disqualified after completing 2/3 of the course. Judy had lost one of her boots and had to drop out of the race.

Winners were presented trophy's donated by local business men.

First Place trophy was donated by Denali Fuel, 2nd by Eagle River Service and 3rd by the Lampost Inn. Also the Cheechako Sled Dog Racers Club offered a trophy to each competitor. A special loving cup trophy was awarded to Walt Pipple for allowing the races to be held on his land.

Book Report

CHUGIAK PUBLIC LIBRARY)

Last month the VFW turned over the profits of one evening's "Bingo" games to the library for the specific purpose of purchasing children's books.

The library received a total of \$71. net, for which we are very grateful. The library is now doubly indebted to the VFW as they have been paying the librarians' fuel bill this past winter.

We are especially pleased with the knowledge that another community organization recognizes the value of the library's function in providing good literature for the children of Chugiak.

Twenty five novels were purchased for the new "young adult" section, twenty for younger children and several valuable science reference works. Also, books on archaeology and other careers, following special requests made by some of the students.

Following the policy of Ft. Richardson and Fairbanks libraries, we have established a special section for young adults, in which have been placed adult books both fiction and non-fiction suitable for young readers; as for example some of you may remember the "Claudia" books, as well as the "Jalna" series.

Also, western, classics, travel books and some of the new Alaskan non-fiction are also in this section.

To date, over 70 books which had been placed on sale by the library have been purchased. We still have an excellent selection (next col.)

and invite your inspection. Books are 25¢ each, and proceeds will be used to purchase additional children's books.

The library again wishes to thank the VFW for their cooperation and for the help throughout the winter, and for aiding in the much needed purchase of new texts.

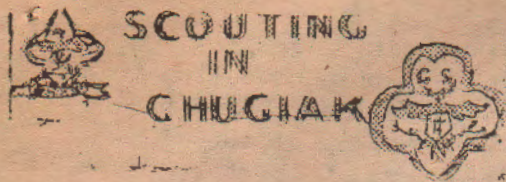

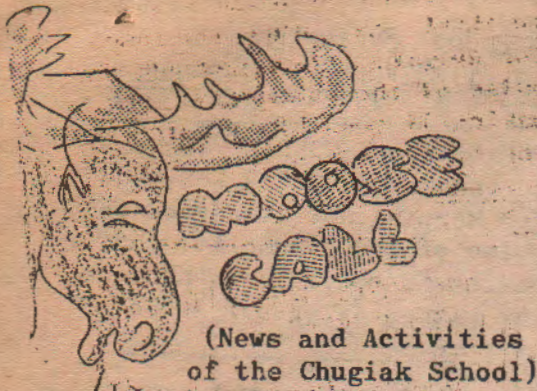
