MOOSEHORN GARAGE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Prompt action of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. with the assistance of units from Ft. Richardson and Fairview, confined a fire at the Moosehorn Trading Post to the automotive shop; leaving the cafe and living quarters virtually intact.

The blaze was discovered around 8pm on Monday evening, at which time the shop was unoccupied.

State Police officers who happened to be at the cafe when the fire was discovered, radic d the alarm in to Anchorage. Chugiak Fireman appeared on the scene in about five minutes with the jeep pumper and the tanker and were able to keep the fire confined to the shop until units from both Fairview and Ft. Richardson answered the call. Both of these fire departments operate on a mutual aid agreement with Chugiak.

The combined efforts of the three fire Companys was sufficient to save the main part of the Trading Post from the fire, however the garage, a frame structure was completely destroyed.

The building belongs to Jim McDowell, (who now resides in Homer) but at the present time service station, shop & cafe is being leased and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Day.

Property loss consisted of hand and machine tools belonging to Day anda 1954 Buick belonging to Wayne Crabtree, of Birchwood, which was in the shop for repairs at the time.

None of the service station stock or the Day's personal belongings were damaged. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

BLOOD TYPING PROGRAM HEEDED

Then one of our neighbors fell ill last week and required a blood transfusion, there was a mad scramble of phoning all the names in the book in an attempt to find donors with the proper type blood.

This points very strongly to the need of an up to date list of available donors that can be called upon at a moments notice.

A number of responsible citizens in the community are aware of this and an attempt to organize an efficient blood typing program is already in the mill.

The Alaska Dept. of Health has expressed it's readiness to provide Chugiak with the qualified technicians and equipment to conduct such a program, provided a sponsoring organization and a place to conduct the tests be found

Ray Henriches, Chugiak director of Civil Defense has undertaken to sponsor this program and the ladies of the Chugiak Health Council have expressed their willingness to assist.

Therefor, we hope that in the near future we will be able to announce the time and place for these tests.

The important thing is to be able to endist the cooperation of all the residents of Chugiak; to encourage each person to go down and have their blood typed, regardless of whether (next col.) (blood typing)

or not they wish to sign up as blood donors themselves.

The need for a sudden blood transfusion can affect any of us; and it is only by having a record of each person that quick, life-saving action can be taken.

One of these three projects is the Eagle River revision, a distance of 3.5 miles; which is estimated will cost around \$860,000.

Egan said the Eagle River revision, located on Federal-Aid primary route 42, seven miles east of Anchorage, "is badly needed." At the present time, he said, military maneuvers often hold up traffic and creat traffic hazards in the heavily populated areas.

(blood bank, cont page 8 col 3) will be able to "draw" blood from the bank when a transfusion is needed; which may be pertaced by them or their family on a rate of two pints for every one pint used. This to build up an adequate reserve for extreme emergencies.

The charges for blood transfusions handled in this manner would be only to cover the technical work involved.

With the blood bank established it will be possible to operate an exchange program with Anchorage Mospitals.

The program will also work in with the Community Blood Bank, which is in the planning stages in the Enchorage area.
