## BEATRICE MACKEY TO COUNT CHUGIAK NOSES

Mrs. Wayne (Bea) Mackey, of mile 22 will be the official census taker in the Chugiak area in the National Census which begins throughout the 50 states on April 1st.

Mrs. Mackey has been attending training sessions along with other census takers for the area all this week.

Each of these takers has received approximately 16 hours of instruction with emphasis placed on the importance of a systematic, thorough canvass of every dwelling unit during the census to insure a complete count.

Classroom training has covered proper manner of asking questions, use of the census questions, census definitions and map reading.

The later is of importance in that a map is provided of the area to be covered by each taker. There are 25,000 maps in all, each one representing one of the 25,000 census districts of which Chugiak is one.

THE WATER PROBLEM

Each spring brings the same  
old problems of muddy drives,  
and other related problems.

One of the most troublesome  
is the fact that some of our  
wells become contaminated by  
the run-off and the water  
rendered dirty and foul tast-  
ing.

With Hepatitis still claim-  
ing new victims it is espec-  
ially wise to be wary of dr-  
inking any suspicious look-  
ing or tasting water.

If at all possible it is  
wise to carry water to be  
used for cooking or drink-  
ing from some uncontaminated  
source. If this is not con-  
venient the water should be  
boiled or treated with chlor-  
ine bleach to render it safe  
to drink.

Tests of drinking water  
will be made by the DEpart-  
ment of Health. Samples must  
be brought in containers pro-  
vided by the department.

We're all happy to know  
that spring is on the way,  
but let's not risk a serious  
disease; beware of dirty  
water.

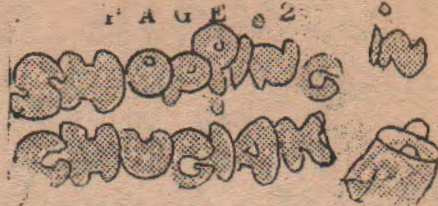

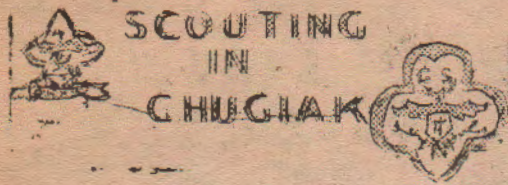

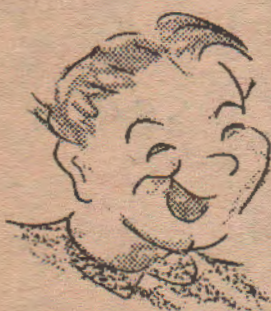

I discovered that something new had been added since I last flew commercial airline, and that was a "sight-seeing bus" type of monologue by the pilot over the plane's intercom.

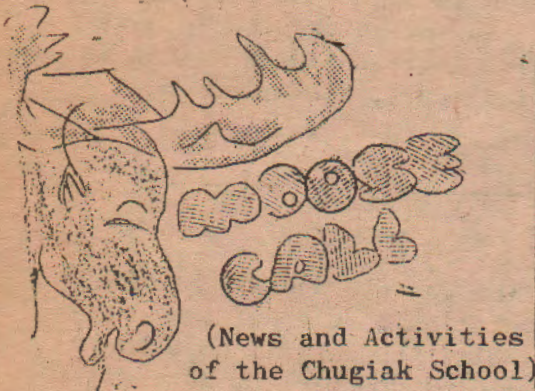
His tone was relaxed, casual and tinged with just the right amount of boredom, obviously calculated to sooth some of the more nervous passengers.

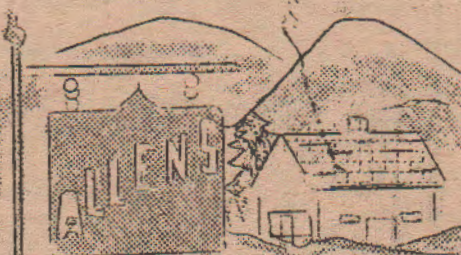



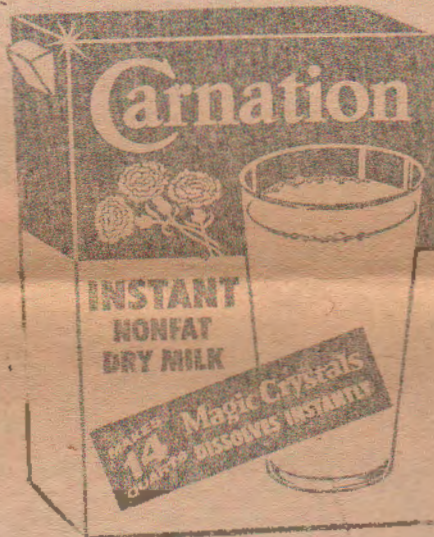
