

Rabies Clinic Scheduled

In response to requests by local dog owners a clinic for rabies inoculation has been arranged.

Dr. H.E. Barnes, Anchorage veterinarian, will come to Chugiak and conduct this clinic on May 4th. He will be at Burg's Birchwood Kennels, (located on the Birchwood Rd, one mile from the Carnival Grounds). Dr. Barnes will begin the inoculations at 9 am and anyone interested is requested to please be on time. There will be a charge of \$2.50 for each dog; however if a minimum of twelve dogs are brought for treatment, the cost will be only \$2.00 per dog.

While he is in Chugiak, Dr. Barnes will also perform any other veterinary services that may be sought.

No Drastic Changes in

Highway Planned in Near Future

Mr. George Allen, Chugiak businessman and Democratic chairman of the Chugiak precinct, has announced that fears that the proposed changes in the highway between Palmer and Anchorage would by-pass areas in Chugiak are without cause.

During the recent democratic convention, Mr. Allen, along with three other local businessmen, Mr. Bradley, Virgil Flint and Ray Tedrow, met with Governor Egan to discuss the problem.

The Governor assured them that as long as he held office there would be no major changes in the route of the highway that might cause property and business already established in the areas to suffer from loss of property value and business.

At a subsequent meeting Mr. Allen discussed the subject with the State Highway Engineer, and with Jim Downing commissioner of Public Works, and Lee Hubbard of the Department of Highways, and they further assured him that with the exception of the straightening out of a few curves, they could see no need to change the present course of the highway for many years to come.

The only major change planned is the construction of a new bridge at Eagle River.

This bridge would lie a few hundred yards upstream from the present bridge, and the road from it would intersect the present highway at the crest of the hill; and would not by-pass the Eagle River Shopping Area.

COOK FOR APRIL... ALMA HAIK

For her final recipe, Alma gives us this rich moist fruity cake that is well named

ECONOMICAL FRUITCAKE

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 egg unbeaten
- 1/2 cups applesauce
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp soda
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 3/4 tsp cloves
- 3/4 tsp nutmeg
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup walnuts
- 1 16oz. pkg fruit mix (optional)

CREAM shortening

ADD brown sugar and cream toget.

ADD egg and mix well

ADD applesauce and vanilla

TO SIFTED FLOUR: measure and add soda and spices.

SIFT THREE TIMES and

ADD a small portion to applesauce mixture and mix well

DUST raisins, nuts and fruit with remaining flour

MIX all together

POUR mixture in greased pan lined with oiled paper.

BAKE in moderate oven at 340° for one hour.

If desired the cake may be frosted. Alma likes this simple fudge frosting

MINUTE FUDGE FROSTING

PLACE in saucepan

1 oz chocolate, cut fine

1 cup sugar

1/3 cup milk

1/2 tsp salt

BRING slowly to full rolling boil, stirring constantly.

BOIL for one minute

ADD tsp vanilla and beat until thick enough to spread

(The voice of the Chugiak Garden Club)

GROUND PREPARATION By Dick Hannen

The snow is almost gone, and the "Green Thumbs" are getting anxious to get going. However anyone that is too anxious, will probably have the pleasure of doing it all over again.

The old timers say if the "Sleepin' Lady" in the Susitna is still covered, it is too early to plant outdoors.

There are some that are fortunate enough to have a southwest slope, where the sun hits about twelve hours a day. They can plant about two weeks earlier.

In any place that is in the shade for five or six hours of the day up to the middle of June, one can dig down four or five inches and find soil that feels like it came out of the deep freezer. In order to get the plants to grow fast it should be warmed with heat cable, or for those who have running hot water, shallow trenches may be dug and hot water run in on several occasions. Those who have tried this have gotten excellent results.

The more often the soil is worked over the (next col.)

better things will grow. If the soil is worked at this time, allow the first weeds to get started and then rake the ground real good and those weeds will be eliminated.

VFW OFFICERS INSTALLED

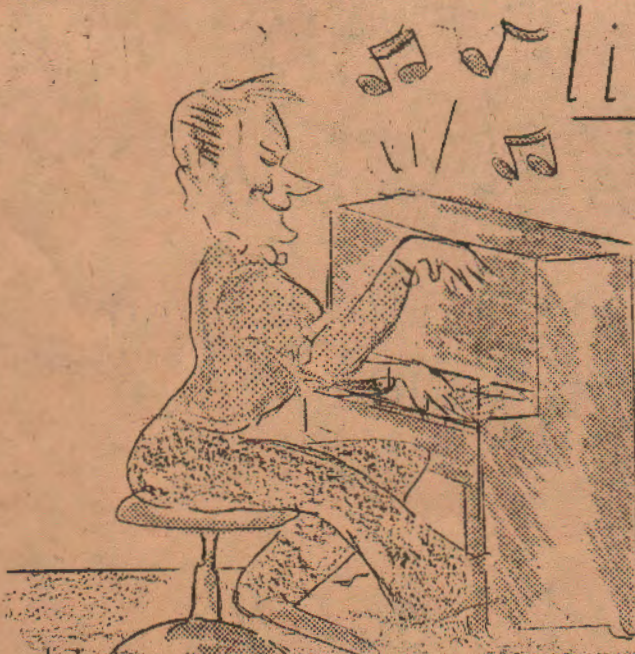
The newly elected officers of the Chugiak VFW Post were installed at the Chugach Rod and Gun Club at Ft. Richardson last Saturday, April 23rd.

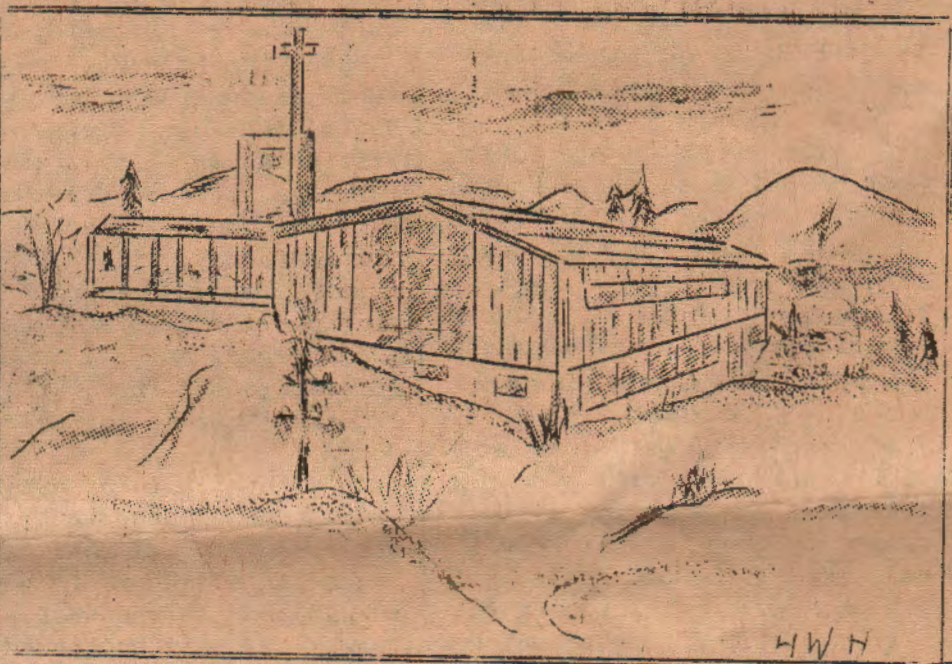

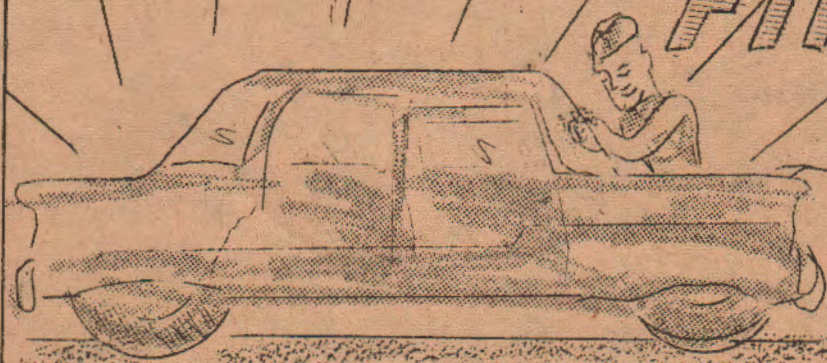

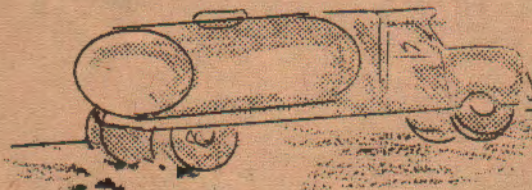
