Doctors Wife Escape Injury in Wreck

Dr. Marshall Simpson and his wife Barbara narrowly escaped serious injury when their pick-up truck skidded over a 30 foot bank and over turned on Fire Lake Hill late Saturday night.

The Simpsons were returning from Palmer when they saw several figures crossing the road to a parked car.

Dr. Simpson was applying the brakes to avoid the figures when his car went into a skid, spun 180° on the highway and went over the bank on the west side of the road.

The car came to rest upside down. The Dr. and his wife were wearing seat belts at the time, a fact which no doubt accounted for their emerging with only minor injuries.

Jess Straight of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. transported the Simpsons to the Doctors Eagle River office where he himself administered first aid and then took them on to Providence Hospital.

Mrs. Simpson suffered numerous bruises and was kept in the Hospital for observation. She has since been released. Dr. Simpson had several stitches in his head, but was not hospitalized.

Chugiak Memorial the Goal of Local AMU Fund Drive

Pledges totaling \$7500 will be the goal of the AMU Fund Drive, which got underway at a "kick-off" dinner at the home of Dr. Marshall Simpson, drive Chairman.

A group of persons who will act in the capacity of team captains in the drive gathered at the Doctors home on Sunday, Apr 3rd to receive their briefing.

Guest speakers

were Rev. Fred Mc Ginnis, President of the Alaska Methodist University, Mr. Henry Meyers, chairman of the fund raising drive and Br. Gordon Gould, one of the founding fathers of the University.

The current drive is to raise funds for a 96 bed dormitory to house students and some faculty members of the University.

A total of \$700,000 is needed to construct the proposed dormitory and this money is to be raised with pledges from private citizens.

It was explained that pledges could be paid off over a three year period and at whatever rate the individual would find convenient.

It was also explained that if the pledges from the Chugiak area should total \$7,500 it could be used to secure a memorial in the name of Chugiak. This is the estimated cost of constructing and equipping a bedroom which would accommodate four students. This would be named the "Chugiak" (cont page 5 col 1)

This will give the parents an opportunity to view this original production.

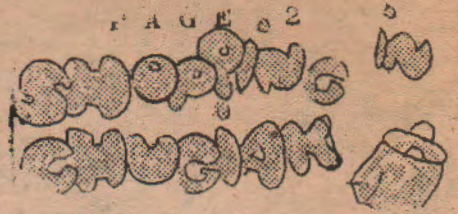

The Cook of the Month

The Matanuska Valley Colony was one year old when Alma Haik and her family first came to Alaska.

Vern was then working for the Rural Rehabilitation Corporation and they made their home in Palmer.

After two years they decided that they did not care for the windy valley and returned to Coeur d'Alene Idaho. However Alaska was in their blood, and ten year later, in 1946 they returned to make it their permanent home.

This time Vern was working as a surveyor with the District Engineers, and for one year they lived in Anchorage. In 1947 they filed on the homestead at mile 20½ where their home and business is now located.

When they first planned Spring Creek Lodge it was to be nothing more than a hamburger stand for Alma to run as a hobby; a far cry from the popular roadside dinner house it is today. The beautiful log building was built by the Haiks themselves, and Alma's wonderful cooking and baking have made it famous throughout the entire area.

Alma said that she had no previous experience in restaurant work but enjoyed cooking in large quantities, and Spring Creek, which has been in operation since 1949 is a credit to her ability.

Everyone in Chugiak is familiar with the wonderful baked goods which is the speciality of Spring Creek Lodge, particularly the homemade bread which has become an industry unto itself. This tender light bread was such a favorite of Spring Creek's customers, that many asked to buy loaves to take home. This led Alma to start baking bread in large quantities and (next col.)

Operating Spring Creek has kept Alma busy to the exclusion of almost any thing else, but husband Vern is well known in community circles.

Vern, who now works as a realtor for the Noreen Realtors of Anchorage, is President of the Alaska Sportsmen's Association, a member of the State Real Estate Board, is on the board of the MTA and is a past president of the Isaac Walton League.

This merangue dessert, which because of it's shape Alma calls Walnut Pie, is a great favorite of Spring Creek customers.

WALNUT PIE

- BEAT stiff 4 egg whites (½ cup)
- ADD 1 cup sugar to egg whites
- CRUSH 12 to 14 salted soda crackers (about ½ cup)
- CHOP walnuts (2 cups)
- COMBINE crumbs, nuts 1 tbs. baking powder 1 tsp vanilla and remaining ingredients.
- POUR in buttered pie tin
- BAKE 35 to 40 minutes at 325°
- SERVE topped with whipped cream.

She wishes to stress that these are not children who have been trouble with the law, but those taken from troubled homes.

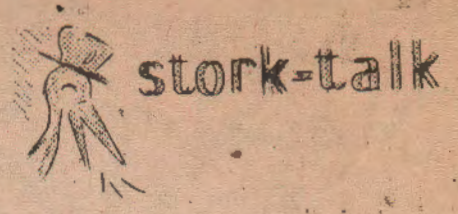
It would be preferred to place them in homes where there are no other children. The state pays \$65 per month to foster parents for the care of these children.

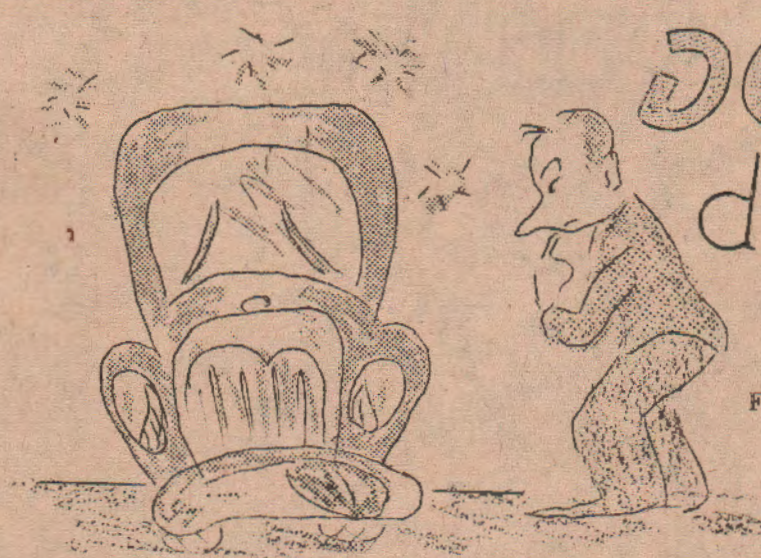

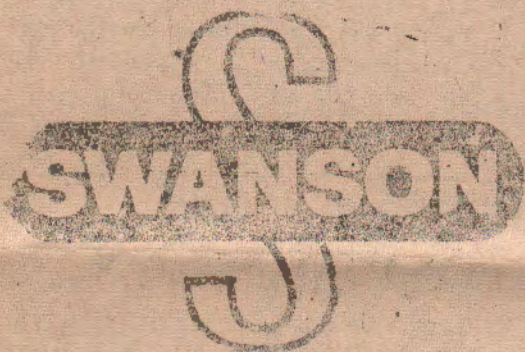
