EAGLE RIVER TO BE SIGHT OF ARCHERY RANGE

An archery range, which will be located on 80 acres of land in the Eagle River Valley is planned by the Alaska Bowman, a local Archery Club.

The land borders on the J.D. Nichols homestead and lies about four miles from the Glenn Highway.

The Bowman have seven targets installed now and plan on seven more by June 1st.

As yet they have no buildings, but are in the process of securing four surplus buildings from the Army, two of which will be moved to Eagle River to provide facilities for the range, and two of which will be moved to Anchorage where an indoor range will be built.

Snow Slide Blocks Highway

Sunday traffic was held up for approximately three hours Sunday while emergency crews cleared away the huge masses of snow which had slid down the mountain and blocked the highway at mile 38.

This particular slide usually covers the highway each spring and a bulldozer is stationed at this spot all winter in order to be able to clear the snow from the road in a minimum of time.

Mr. Peter J. Bagoy, General Foreman of the Department of Highways, said that the Army had been firing at the slide area last Thursday with 105 mm guns in an attempt to bring the snow down, but had been successful in moving it only part way.

However the warm weather and rain of the weekend was responsible for bringing the slide down onto the road.

A road grader, working along with the bull-dozer was able to clear one lane of traffic within a few hours and the following day, both lanes were free.

BLOOD TYPING BEGINS TONIGHT

The Civil Defense Blood typing Program begins tonight at the Chugiak School multipurpose room and will last through Thursday.

Residents of Eagle River through Fire Lake Areas are requested to come on Wednesday and those living from Fire Lake to the Knik Bridge on Thursday. However, those who are able to come on only one particular night may do so regardless of where they live.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

TO the Residents of the Chugiak Civil Defense Area,

I hope that all those of you who do not know your blood type will come to the Chugiak School on Wednesday or Thursday night, depending on the area in which you life and have your blood typed.

As you have been told in previous issues of the Courier, this is strictly a Civil Defense project in the event of a large scale disaster or of an emergency.

From my own experience I have learned that it pays to know your blood type for your own personal use.

On March 19th, when my doctor told me I was to have surgery and said he would need two pints of blood, it saved time and money because I knew my blood type; and within a matter of two hours donors were at the hospital ready to give blood to me. Many people came that night who did not know their blood type, but who were still willing to give. If they had known their type, they would have realized that it was the incorrect type and (cont page 3 col 3)

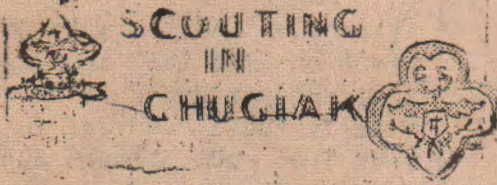

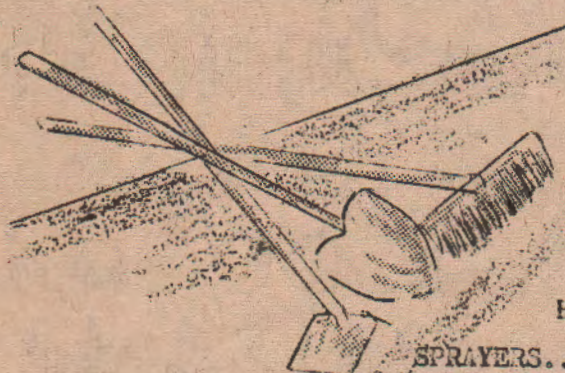

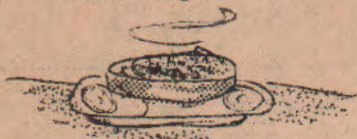

COOK FOR MAY

EMHEL McALLISTER

Here is a suggestion for the warm weather that we are having.

Hamburgers cooked right on the bun and a cool tasty macaroni salad. Serve these with ice tea and you will have the perfect refreshment for a ladies luncheon.

BROILED SANDWICH

- 1# ground beef or moose
- 1 grated onion
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 can evaporated milk (more or less)
- Salt & pepper to taste

SPREAD mixture on split hamburger buns or slices of bread. (making sure to spread clear to edges)

BROIL until light brown.

MACARONI SALAD

- 1 7oz pkg. shell macaroni
- 6 slices bacon (diced)
- 2 tbs vinegar
- 1 tbs finely chopped onion
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper
- 1/2 tsp prepared mustard
- 1/3 cup salad dressing (mayonaisse or boiled dressing)
- 1/2 cup sliced radishes
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley

COOK macaroni in boiling salted water

FRY bacon until crisp and drain
ADD vinegar, onion and seasonings to 1 tbs bacon fat

HEAT to boiling

ALASKANIS SHOP FOR SPECIALS

Weekly "ads" or "special" prices are believed to have a greater effect on the level of prices paid for foods in Alaska than in other states. Price is the major (next col.)

(specials)

attraction and normally the items on "special" are significantly reduced in price. Usually these "ads" are in effect from Wed. through Sunday when most of the family buying is done.

Six out of seven homemakers recently interviewed said they shopped for specials regularly. When asked how many items they purchased on "specials", 16 out of 51 reported from one to 10 items. One reported all the foods purchased were on special.

When asked what proportion of their food purchases were "specials" only four out of 52 reported less than 25% about three out of five reported buying over 50% of their total purchases on "special".

Small neighborhood markets as well as larger chain stores are able to attract shoppers by advertising "specials" at reduced prices.

It is believed from this survey that "specials" are of major importance in total food buying.

GREENHOUSE TIPS

By: Gretchen Dee

To many of us the coming of Spring, and the planting of tomatoes and cucumbers are practically one and the same thing.

Very interesting and rewarding results can be achieved in your small unheated greenhouse.

Warm soil being a most important factor, and can be had by installing one of the light plastic heating cables four to six inches under the soil.

In just a few days, after the soil has been prepared, it will be sufficiently warm.

Now you are ready to plant your little tomato and cucumber plants where their roots will stay constantly warm.

The heating cable in our greenhouse is left on day and night all summer. We feel that this is one of the secrets for an early and long lasting crop.

This final suggestion was given to me by Mr. Walt Pipple and will be of value to you also if cutworms have been a problem in your greenhouse.

Encircle each plant with a strip of tar paper about two inches wide, placing the lower (next col.)

edge just under the surface of the soil.

Sportsmen President Wm. Makeland says that this will be no midway snack, but a full meal complete with chips and beverage.

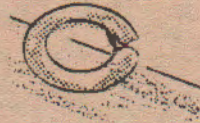
The Fish Fry will be located at the Alaska State Fair Grounds during the Aviation Fair and should be one of the most popular spots on the midway.

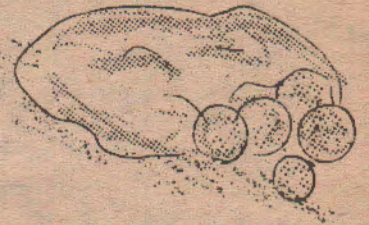
