LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

An open letter from the Chugiak School Superintendent to the People of Chugiak:

There have been rumors circulating, which, for the best interests of the (next col.) (letter to the editor)

school, it would seem to me should be brought out into the open. It is well that an informed public should express their opinions on community matters.

In matters of the school, this should include teachers and superintendent who have at least as much interest as others. Exact information, not hearsay can be gained by including school people.

The rugiors, which I have heard, are that there are one or more petitions or letters being circulated, somewhat undercover, relative to school affairs. One supposedly concerns the hiring of bus drivers and that they should be hired from the ranks of the unemployed; one that the apartment in the school should be eliminated and the space used to make several class rooms; another that I'r. Swanson, because he is the school agent, has a monopoly on renting quonsets, and that the teachers are practically required to rent apartments or houses from him. There are reportedly other rumors, some of which weem to have a personal angle.

Rumors are double edged, often grow in the telling, and often backfire on the tellers. For instance, persons in the community that have in the past and that (if one believes recent conversations with them,) still are sincere friends and supporters of the school are (cont page 6 col 2)

The pair are planning to be married on May 28th at the United Protestant Church in Palmer.


Miss Witherell, who has been teaching the fifth grade in Chugiak for the past two years calls Weedsport New York her home.

We found in most cases that the accommodations were excellent, and also the booklet listed the rates of all hotels and motels that it recommended.


Included with the road maps was a thumbnail commentary of the country through which we would be passing.



I feel sure that most people in our community mow that any school problems can be discussed with me in a friendly way at any time, and that I welcome practical suggestions.

Lost of these problems are not new and have been discussed reviously with different (next col.)

groups and with the Department of Education.

I would like to give just one example as to how reliable information might change the picture of anything being discussed. This is relative to the apartment for the superintendent. If this space were to be used for a classroom, it would result in not several, but one class room that would be about 176 square feet, smaller than the other classrooms in the building. The superintendent pays \$92.00 per month for the ' use of the apartment, and in addition, keeps check against vandalism, the operation of the water system, heating system and many other things. Liging in the school building his office hours are anytime any one wishes to come to the school or to call.

To date, the State Department of Schools requires pronciples or superintendents of
nearly all state operated schools, regardless of size to
live in the school as the most
economical way of protecting
and caring for their buildings. They could at some
time change the policy, at
least for less isolated schools.

As far as the present superintendent is concerned, it would be worth the extra cost for house rental to be able to set office hours and to get completely away from school affairs outside of those hours, if the State Dept. of Education felt it would be the most economical thing.

There has been a great deal of misinformation accepted as true, relative to other school affairs. This is certainly an unnecessary situation, when a simple inquiry at the school office could obtain accurate information - and this could be further checked with the State Department.

TRANSPLANTING OF NATIVE TREES By: Ed Baldwin

The transplanting of native trees is not difficult if certain known rules are followed. lost any size birch or spruce can be successfully moved.

Large trees, heavy branched trees, my 30 feet high, should be root pruned the year before being moved to give the toots a chance to heal and to give a year for the forming of new roots within the pruned ared. Smaller trees, any that two men can handle, can be moved usually without previous preparation.

Generally the roots on smaller trees should be cut out from the trunk at ground level one foot for each inch of trunk diameter, that is, a 4 inch trunk should have the roots cut in a circle 4 feet out from tho tree trunk. Since all trees root shallow, use a sharp axe cuticity chairman of the Chucutting down in the soil around the trees 6 inches deep. This will cut off all the roots and the tree can then be tipped out and loaded on the pick-up.

later should be on hand to wet down the roots. If the little hair roots are allowed to dry out, even for a few (Green Thumb)

minutes, the tree will likely die. The tree should be set with all possible speed in a previously prepared spot that has been thoroughly wed down. Plant the tree shallow, no deeper that it grew in the wild Place one to five pounds of bone meal under the tree. Make sure that no hollow places are left under the roots. A mound of dirt or dike should be placed over the ends of the roots to hold water and to hold the tree solid until it gets started in its new location.

Twenty or thirty foot bushy trees should be guyed three ways with rope to prevent the wind shaking them up. Spruce trees can be moved anytime.

Birches can be moved anytime up until the leaves are % grown. If leaf bearing trees been scheduled. must be moved later than that, about 1/2 the leaves should be stripped of the branches evenly over the tree.

ROAD IMPROVEMENTS TO BE AIRED AT MEETING


A meeting at which the subject of maintenance and improvement of "pioneer access roads" will be discussed has
