LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

An open letter from the  
Chugiak School Superintendent  
to the People of Chugiak:

There have been rumors cir-  
culating, which, for the best  
interests of the(next col.)

(letter to the editor)

school, it would seem to  
me should be brought out  
into the open. It is well  
that an informed public  
should express their opini-  
ons on community matters.

In matters of the school,  
this should include teach-  
ers and superintendent who  
have at least as much inter-  
est as others. Exact in-  
formation, not hearsay can  
be gained by including sch-  
ool people.

The rumors, which I have  
heard, are that there are  
one or more petitions or let-  
ters being circulated, some-  
what undercover, relative  
to school affairs. One sup-  
posedly concerns the hiring  
of bus drivers and that they  
should be hired from the  
ranks of the unemployed; one  
that the apartment in the  
school should be eliminated  
and the space used to make  
several class rooms; another  
that Mr. Swanson, because  
he is the school agent,  
has a monopoly on renting  
quonsets, and that the tea-  
chers are practically requi-  
red to rent apartments or  
houses from him. There are  
reportedly other rumors,  
some of which seem to have  
a personal angle.

Rumors are double edged,  
often grow in the telling,  
and often backfire on the  
tellers. For instance, per-  
sons in the community that  
have in the past and that  
(if one believes recent con-  
versations with them,) still  
are sincere friends and sup-  
porters of the school are

# The Cook of the Month

Here is one of Ethel's favorite recipies. This single crust pie is easy to make and if very appropriate for either company dessert of to serve with coffee at a ladies group.

### BUTTERSCOTCH PIE

- 1/4 cup sugar (burnt)
- 2 tbs margerine
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 eggs
- 4 tbs cornstarch
- 2 tbs brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 2 cups milk

POUR 1/2 cup sugar in saucepan PLACE over medium heat until brown

REMOVE from heat

ADD 1/4 cup water

COMBINE in double boiler

milk, sugar, eggs, salt

cornstarch and burnt sugar

BRING TO BIOL

REMOVE from heat

ADD vanilla and margerine

POUR in baked pie shell

TOP with merangue or whipped cream.

When planning our return trip we had made available to us the services of the Auto Club (AAA). All that we needed to do was call and tell them our destination. In the following mail we received a packet of maps and information which covered our entire route from start to finish.

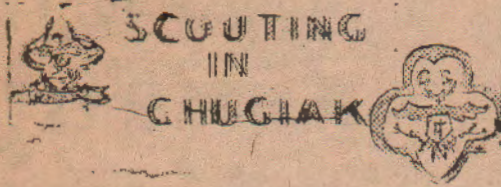

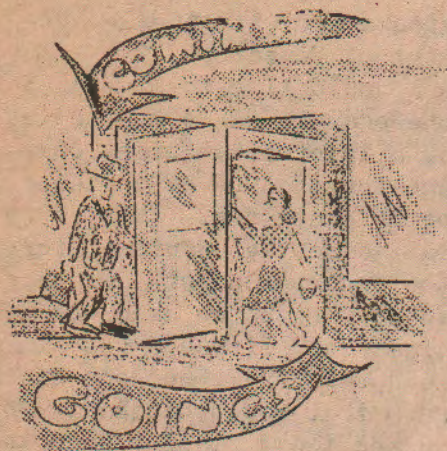

rumored to be circulating or at least signing the letters or petitions. Likewise rumor indicates that some of these people are persons who have never had, do not have, and probably never will have children in school, and some are very recent arrivals.

I feel sure that most people in our community know that any school problems can be discussed with me in a friendly way at any time, and that I welcome practical suggestions. Most of these problems are not new and have been discussed previously with different (n (next col.)

(letter)

groups and with the Department of Education.

I would like to give just one example as to how reliable information might change the picture of anything being discussed. This is relative to the apartment for the superintendent. If this space were to be used for a classroom, it would result in not several, but one classroom that would be about 176 square feet, smaller than the other classrooms in the building. The superintendent pays \$92.00 per month for the use of the apartment, and in addition, keeps check against vandalism, the operation of the water system, heating system and many other things. Lying in the school building his office hours are anytime any one wishes to come to the school or to call.

To date, the State Department of Schools requires principals or superintendents of nearly all state operated schools, regardless of size to live in the school as the most economical way of protecting and caring for their buildings. They could at some time change the policy, at least for less isolated schools.

As far as the present superintendent is concerned, it would be worth the extra cost for house rental to be able to set office hours and to get completely away from school affairs outside of those hours, if the State Dept. of Education felt it would be the most economical thing.

There has been a great deal of misinformation accepted as true, relative to other school affairs. This is certainly an unnecessary situation, when a simple inquiry at the school office could obtain accurate information - and this could be further checked with the State Department.

# The Green Thumb Corner

## TRANSPLANTING OF NATIVE TREES

The transplanting of native trees is not difficult if certain known rules are followed. Most any size birch or spruce can be successfully moved.

Large trees, heavy branched trees, say 30 feet high, should be root pruned the year before being moved to give the roots a chance to heal and to give a year for the forming of new roots within the pruned area. Smaller trees, any that two men can handle, can be moved usually without previous preparation.

Generally the roots on smaller trees should be cut out from the trunk at ground level one foot for each inch of trunk diameter, that is, a 4 inch trunk should have the roots cut in a circle 4 feet out from the tree trunk. Since all trees root shallow, use a sharp axe cutting down in the soil around the trees 6 inches deep. This will cut off all the roots and the tree can then be tipped out and loaded on the pick-up.

Water should be on hand to wet down the roots. If the little hair roots are allowed to dry out, even for a few (next col.)

(Green Thumb)

minutes, the tree will likely die. The tree should be set with all possible speed in a previously prepared spot that has been thoroughly wed down.

Plant the tree shallow, no deeper than it grew in the wild. Place one to five pounds of bone meal under the tree. Make sure that no hollow places are left under the roots. A mound of dirt or dike should be placed over the ends of the roots to hold water and to hold the tree solid until it gets started in its new location.

Twenty or thirty foot bushy trees should be guyed three ways with rope to prevent the wind shaking them up. Spruce trees can be moved anytime.

Birches can be moved anytime up until the leaves are 1/4 grown. If leaf-bearing trees must be moved later than that, about 1/2 the leaves should be stripped of the branches evenly over the tree.

It has been suggested that it would be to the best interests of Chugiak that representatives of this area plan to attend this meeting to bring local problems to their attention.

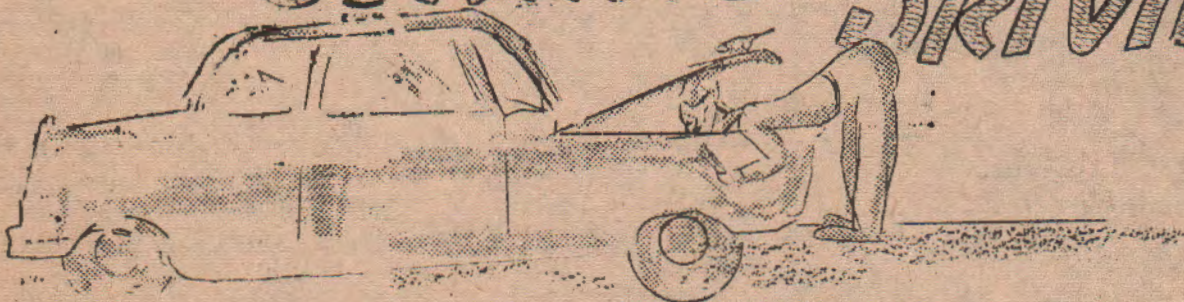

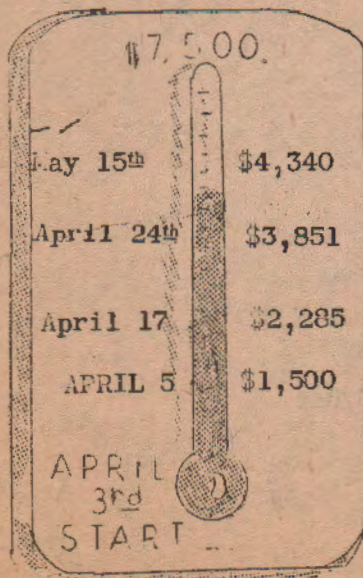
