Fire Prevention Assoc. Offers \$100 Prize

We imagine that those responsible for this, regard themselves as being too "soft hearted" to dispose of their unwanted pets themselves, and are laboring under the delusion that folks who live "in the country" always have room for another pet. In the past I have heard a number of persons make that statement and they actually believe that by doing this they are giving their no longer welcome pets a "50-50" chance of survival.

Actually the odds are not so good. The bewildered animals wander out in road and are run over; or in the case of cats may be set upon by unfriendly dogs and destroyed or as most always happens, the animals revert to the wild status and become a menace to everyone.

It is a very rare instance that they find a happy home "in the country."

We can only hope that they will someday realize that Chugiak is not an animal shelter, and that by depositing their strays here they are merely shifting the responsibility of their destruction to others.

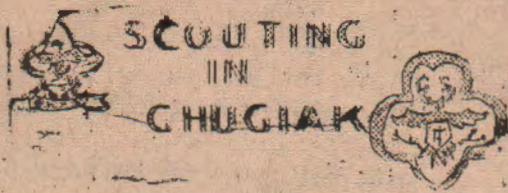

LIMITS SET ON HOOLIGAN FISHING

The adoption of an emergency regulation providing that a license is required when sport fishing for smelt (hoolegan, capelin, enlochon and candle-fish), has been announced by Walter Kirkness, Acting Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

The regulation also requires that sport fishing for smelt can only be done by dip net in the fresh waters of the state and that the bag or possession limit in the drainages of the Turnagain Arm is limited to 20 pounds of smelt.

The regulation is in effect now. Sportsmen are cautioned procure their sport fishing license before going smelt fishing.

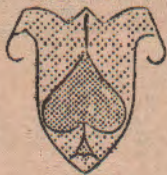

WACKY CAKE

1½ cup flour
3 tbs cocoa
1 cup sugar
1 tsp soda
½ tsp salt

MIX these ingredients together and sift into ungreased pan.

MAKE 3 holes in sifted mixture.

2nd hole: 1 tsp vanilla
3rd. hole 1 tsp vinegar

POUR over all 1 cup cold water. MIX well with fork. BAKE for 25 minutes at 350°.

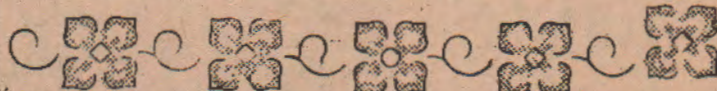

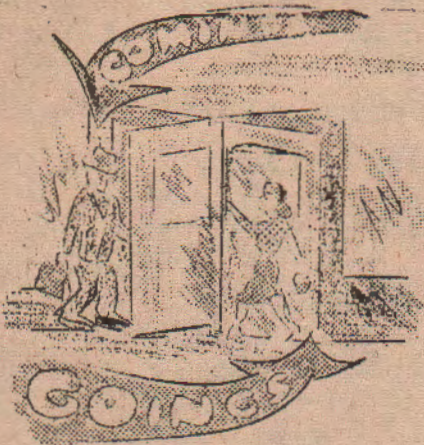

PLANTING SUGGESTIONS

When planting a garden in Alaska, it is well to consider what you really want for returns.

The garden that produces has a good layer of top soil. Even though it is a chore to fill a garden with top soil, it is well worth the effort.

Usually a plot is necessarily small then, and one must weigh carefully what is planted.

Strawberries are a must, with some families. The berries furnish easy fruit for summer and are put in the freezer with little effort. Rhubarb is an easy plant to grow and keeps well raw in the freezer or in water in jars in the basement.

Onion sets planted early bring in a tempting green onion early in the season.

Next plant peas. They do very well in Alaska and save many dollars if stored properly in the freezer.

Carrots and beets can be planted where they have room to spread. The weather and ground seldom harms them. These vegetables can (next col.)

be easily stored in a cool place in an orange crate. Newspapers between layers help keep them dry until early spring. Pickled beets are easy to do also.

Perhaps if one has ample room, potatoes, broccoli and cauliflower can be grown. Broccoli uses a lot of space as does cabbage and cauliflower. A little can be grown, but the plants have a habit of spreading out too much.

Turnips and radishes must be treated to keep the worms out of them.

Green beans seldom mature properly because our rainy season rots the pods. Peas and beans usually cannot lie on the ground as they do elsewhere.

Lettuce should be planted in a thin row as it too will rot if not enough air gets to it.

Many things can be grown in Alaska, if one has the time and effort. It depends on what a family prefers, how much they depend on the garden to cut down the family grocery budget.

The dances are under the sponsorship of Mr. and Mrs. Howard D. Spain, teachers.

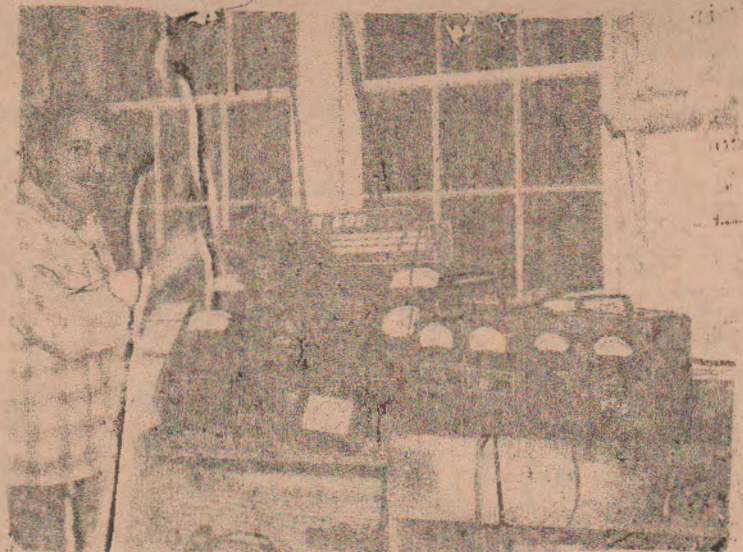
