## Child Injured in Fall from Moving Car.

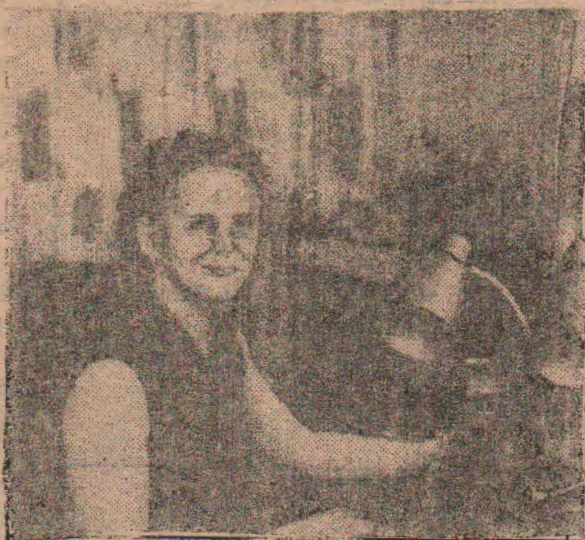
Six year old Maxie Rae Bellringer is recovering from injuries she received when she fell from the car in which she was riding.

The child had apparently taken hold of the door handle as the door came open. The force of the door opening pulled her from the car which was moving at about 40 mph at the time.

The child's mother who was driving stopped the car and found the injured girl in a water filled ditch beside the road. Since no other cars were in the vicinity, she wrapped Maxie in a blanket and drove her to Palmer where she was given emergency treatment at the Valley Hospital.

The following day she was transferred by ambulance to the 5040th Air Force Hospital. Maxie sustained several deep cuts on her head which required stitches, and numerous bruises and cuts, but no broken bones.

She was released from the Air Force Hospital this

## Fire Lake Woman Markets Original Patterns

Mrs. Connie (Mary) Brinson of Mile 17½ is the originator and designer of a new line of transfer patterns which is being placed on the market for the first time today.

In partnership with Clinton Young Printers of Anchorage, Mrs. Brinson is putting out 65 different sets of hot-iron embroidery transfer patterns designed exclusively for use with the zig-zag sewing machines.

MARICLIN SEW-EASY TRANSFERS as they are called are designed and drawn by Mrs. Brinson herself, with the Clinton Young Printers doing the manufacturing for market.

The idea for the patterns was Mrs. Brinson's to begin with, and she has spent the past thirteen years working in the designs and developing a system whereby professional locking machine embroidery could be done by any woman possessing a zig-zag sewing machine.

Mary got the idea when she purchased a new Pfaff machine thirteen years ago and then discovered that all of the embroidery transfer patterns made were for hand embroidery and not at all adaptable to machines.

The Mariclin line will be the first machine embroidery transfers to be marketed in the whole country, and they will be placed on sale for the first time anywhere at CONRIGHTS Furniture in Anchorage, where Mary will be all this week demonstrating them.

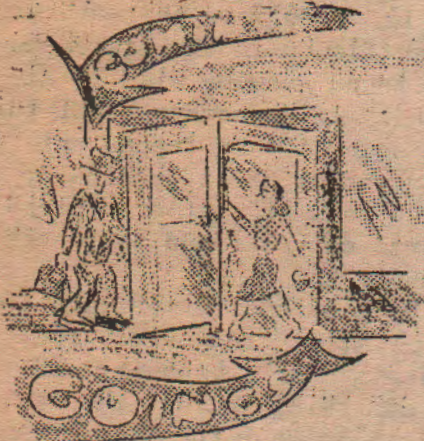

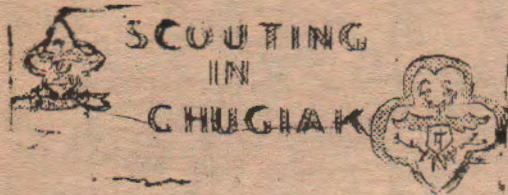

WILDFLOWERS

It has been said that every tame flower in the states can be found growing wild in Alaska. If newcomers doubt this, we suggest they trapse out in the woods. Be it orchids or "you name it", it's counterpart may be found somewhere in Alaska.

Here we had better warn against digging or picking plants near a highway. Besides being against the law, Alaskans feel that the blossoms along the roadside are part of the grandeur of our State and should be left for all to enjoy.

Transplanting fern or other wild plants from their native habitat is very tricky.

We suggest that a family who is planning an outing should always carry a shovel and a pail. Otherwise, any plants that pulled or improperly dug up will not live. Place wet newspaper in a pail and wrap the plant with some of the native dirt immediately to prevent wilting. Also put a few inches of water in the bottom. Protect from sun and wind on the way home.

Waste no time intransplanting. Dig a hole and fill with water, firmly pack the soil around the plant and keep

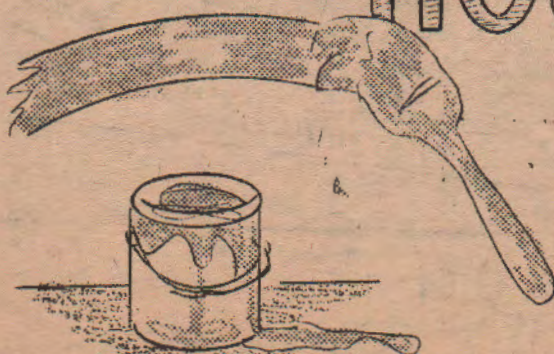

Parents are requested to keep this in mind when planning immunizations for children this summer.

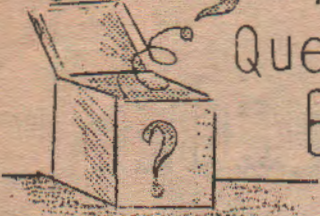

QUESTION:

"...can dialing a number in the Homestead exchange and failing to dial the "HC", in anyway "foul up" the line?"

ANSWER:

According to the MTA service man, it is not necessary to dial HO when calling from one Homestead phone to another. All that is necessary is to dial the numbers. (i.e. if the number was HO-2-5275, it is only necessary to dial 2-5275 is you are calling anywhere in Chugiak). This does not in any way have any effect on the lines.

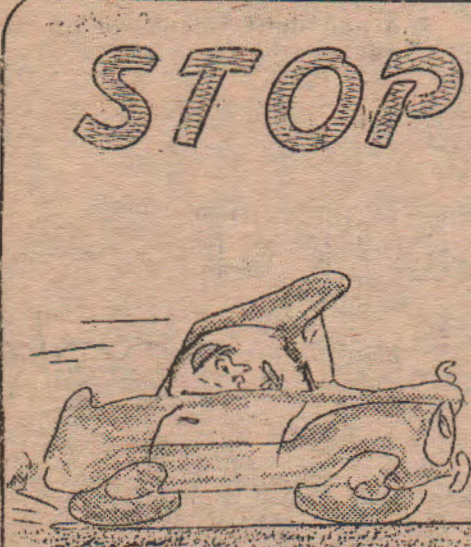
The telephone service personnel never dial exchange letters when calling within the Palmer, Chugiak or other MTA exchanges. However it is necessary to use the prefix when calling long distance or when dialing from one MTA exchange to another.

- 1/2 cup tomato sauce
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1 # mooseburger
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/8 tsp pepper

COMBINE and mix well PAT mixture into 9" pie plate flute edges and set aside.

### FILLING:

- 1 1/3 cup minute rice
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 cup tomato sauce
- 1 cup grated cheddar cheese

COMBINE rice, tomato sauce, salt, water and 1/4 cup cheese.

SPOON into shell COVER with aluminum foil BAKE at 350° for 25 minutes. UNCOVER and sprinkle top with remaining cheese. BAKE uncovered 10-15 minutes. CUT into wedges (serves 5 or six.)

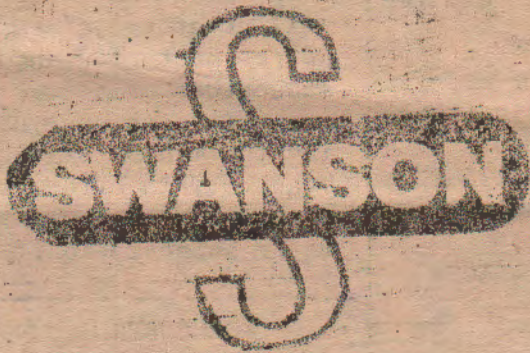

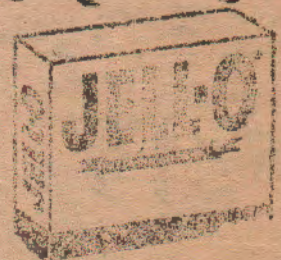
