Mrs. Watson, who was traveling toward Palmer, turned sharply to the left to avoid the oncoming car, which caused her small auto, a Renault Dauphine sedan to veer off the road and roll over the bank down onto a plowed field on the Pipple farm.

Mrs. Watson, was uninjured with the exception of minor bruises. The only passenger in her car was a small French poodle named Pierre, who also appeared to be uninjured.

The Chugiak Fire Co, ambulance was summoned, but Mrs. Watson declined to be taken to the Hospital.

The accident occurred about 6:30 pm. Her car sustained considerable damage.

The other day one of our read-  
ers, Mrs. James Simpson of  
Birchwood sent us a copy of  
the monthly Journal of the  
Scandinavian American Frater-  
nity, which is published in  
Eau Clair, Wisconsin.

In this publication is an  
article titled "Alaska, our  
Forty-ninth State".

Now we have read many arti-  
cles on Alaska, most of which  
stretch the truth beyond all  
recognition. However, this  
article was informative and  
very authentic.

It neither painted a grim  
picture of the hardships of  
homesteading, nor did it make  
it seem that free land was  
to be had for the asking with  
opportunities to make one's  
fortune on every hand.

In fact it truthfully descri-  
bed Alaska as a "Frontier  
primarily of city dwellers,  
who expect and have the com-  
forts of modern American liv-  
ing." This is a more ac-  
curate description than many  
we have read, which portrays  
the average Alaskan as a  
bearded homesteader, who  
cuts his own wood and had  
never seen a television set.

We wish that there would  
be more of this type of thing  
printed for the consumption  
of those on the "outside".

The writer truthfully tells  
of the problems of Alaskan  
living, along with his reports  
of the vast potential of the  
(next col)

State.

This type of reporting would  
neither tend to discourage a  
potential Alaskan from attempt-  
ing to immigrate to the state,  
nor would it be likely to stam-  
pede any would-be pioneer  
piling all his worldly goods  
on top of his car and heading  
for the "Last Frontier".

Instead it lets the reader  
know exactly what to expect  
and enables him to make a  
more accurate decision as to  
whether or not a move to Al-  
aska would be the best thing  
for him or his family.

No, not according to the Post Office, which in it's list of abbreviations for the various states says of Alaska, ' do not abbreviate!''.

However, the triple "a" abbreviation has been used by Alaskans for many years, and is recognized as an abbreviation of Alaska albiet an unofficial one, and mail thus addressed always manages to be delivered.

Incidentally there are other states which the Post Office requests "do not abbreviate" Some are Maine, Iowa, Idaho, Utah, Hawaii, Guam...it will be noted that these have abbreviations which common usage has made acceptable, even though not official.

## CARIBOU CROQUETTES

- 1/4 cup shortening
  - 1/3 cup enriched flour
  - 1 tsp salt
  - 1 cup milk
  - 2 cups finely diced cooked caribou
  - 1 tbs grated onion
  - 1 tbs lemon juice
  - 1 tbs chopped parsley
- MELT shortening and blend in flour and salt  
 STIR in milk, gradually  
 COOK stirring constantly until thickens  
 SIMMER over low heat 3 minutes and cool.  
 STIR in meat, onion, lemon juice and parsley  
 SPREAD mixture in 8" square pan and chill  
 CUT into squares  
 DIP in beaten egg and roll in crumbs  
 FRY in deep fat until brown.

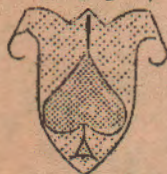
