The other day one of our readers, Mrs. James Simpson of Birchwood sent us a copy of the monthly Journal of the Scandinavian American Fraternity, which is published in Eau Clair, Misconson.

In this publication is an article titled "Alaska, our Forty-ninth State".

Now we have read many articles on Alaska, most of which strech the truth beyond all recognition. However, this article was informative and very authentic.

It neither painted a grim , picture of the hardships of homesteading, nor did it make it seem that free land was to be had for the asking with opportunities to make one's fortune on every hand.

In fact it truthfully described Alaska as a"Frontier primarily of city dwellers, who expect and have the comforts of modern American living." This is a more accurate description than many we have read, which portrays the average Alaskan as a bearded homesteader, who cuts his own wood and had never seen a television set.

Instead it lets the reader know exactly what to expect and enables him to make a more accurate decision as to whether or not a move to Alaska would be the best thing for him or his family.

The older girls made both " their own clothes and the matching outfits of their younger sisters. Fallowing the show the girls served punch and cookies to their mothers.



Manager of the grocery department at Koslosky's Department Store the past year, Tinch and his wife Frances have recently (next col.)



For her final recipe, Lary one again offers us a novel way to prepare one of the game meats that so often appear on the Alaskan table.

#### CARIBOU CROQUETTES

14 cup shortening 1/3 cup enriched flour 1 tsp salt 1 cup milk 2 cups finely diced cooked caribou 1 tbs grated onion 1 bbs lemon juice 1 tbs chopped parsley MELT shortening and blend in flour and salt STIR in milk, gradually COOK stirring constantly until thickens SIMLER over low heat 3 minutes and cool. STIR in meat, onion, lemon juice and parsley SPREAD mixture in 8" square pan and chill CUT into squares DIP in beaten egg and roll in crumbs FRY in deep fat until brown. \* \* \* \* \*


