CBA To Hold Liquidation Sale

The Board of Directors of the Chugiak Benefit Association voted to begin a liquidation sale of CBA Property when a second attempt to assemble a quorum for an annual meeting met with failure.

First to be placed on the market are several buildings (2 ounsets and 2 frame) and a bus.

These will be sold by means of sealed bids which will be accepted until June 27th at which time there will be a public opening of all bids. (See page 9 of COURIER for further information.)

CAMPER INJURED IN FREAK ACCIDENT

A camper at Mirror Lake was injured last Sunday when an abandoned cartridge exploded in his camp fire, driving a piece of brass into his thumb.

The man (who requested that his name be withheld) called for aid from early morning fishermen to help extricate the splinter from his hand and to administer first aid.

He said that he had been very careful to clear the area where he had built the fire, and was at a loss to explain how the cartridge had gotten there.

He felt that other campers in that area should be warned to be on the lookout for discarded live ammunition.

George Allen chairman in charge of the picnic stated that in addition to a personal telegram to the President, a letter had been written to Gen Armstrong of the Alaskan Command, who will be guiding the President on his tour.

Governor Egan and the Mayor of Anchorage have also added their names to the invitation.

If the President should accept, he probably would make his appearance in Chugiak around 2:30 PM on Sunday.

ABSENTEE VOTING - OUTLINED

Sec. of State Hugh J. Wade has outlined absentee voting provisions of Alaska's new election code. He said the statement was prompted by numerous inquiries as to procedures to be followed under the recent enactment.

The new code, passed by the recent State Legislature, provides that any qualified voter may vote absentee at any election:

1. If he believes that he will be unavoidably absent from his voting precinct on election day, whether within the State or not, or
2. If he will be unable to be present at the polls because of physical (next col)

(absentee voting)

inaccessibility of the polling places, thereby causing undue expense, hardship or hazard to the voter.

Wade said absentee ballots may be obtained either by mail or in person from magistrates or deputy magistrates in the election district where the voter has permanent residence, or may be obtained by mail from the Secretary of State at Juneau.

Mailed applications for ballots must be signed by the voter and must contain both his present address, to which the absentee ballots will be returned, and his full permanent resident address in Alaska. Mailed applications may not be postmarked more than 90 days nor less than four days before any election.

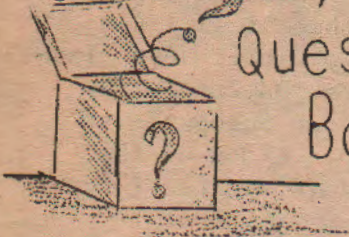
Joint applications for more than one ballot, such as for a husband and wife must be signed by each of the applicants.

For the August 9th primary election, absentee ballots may be cast in person with the magistrate or deputy magistrate in the election district where the voter has permanent residence not later than August 7th or earlier than June 30. This primary nominating ballot also will contain the initiative ballot for the act to move the State Capitol from Juneau to the Cook Inlet-Railbelt area.

The Cook of the Month

COOK FOR JUNE- MARY BRINSON

This delicious seafood recipe of Mary's utilizes a fish that is very plentiful at this time of year and which is always an Alaskan favorite.

SALMON NEWBURG

2 cups leftover cooked salmon
1/2 cup chopped mushrooms (fresh or canned)

6 tbs shortening
1 1/2 tbs flour
1 1/2 cups milk
2 egg yolks
1/2 tsp Worcestershire Sauce
1 tsp salt
1 tsp lemon juice

DRAIN and flake salmon
FRY mushrooms in 2 tbs shortening for 10 minutes.

MELT remaining shortening in heavy saucepan and

STIR in flour

STIR in milk and cook over medium heat stirring constantly until thick.

ADD egg yolks (first beating with a little hot mixture)

BLEND in remaining ingredients

COOK over low heat for 2 minutes stirring constantly.
