#### LORE ABOUT ROADS

This year as we obsebued an annual phenomenon, we thought once again about the subject of roads in our state, and how was the wisest way to spend the limited amount of money that is available for this.

As we watched the rising waters of the Knik River, raised to flood stage by the Lake George Break up wash over and wear away at the same low spots in the highway which are inundated each year, we couldn't help but wonder if this was not a much more logical place to use that money, rather than in constructing the much contested "Chugiak By-Pass".

If the level of the Glenn Highway had been raised just one foot, at several places, the water would not have covered it this year. If it were raised three or four feet, then even during the record high years, the surface of the road would be above water.

This was a comparatively mild break-up. The water was only about a foot deep at the worst part of the road. Still that was enough to cause some damage to the black-top and even minor repairs are costly; espcially when we can book to this to happen year after year, as long as the Lake George break-up continues. (next col.)

As we said, this year the break up was a mild one, but not too long ago whole sections of the road was washed mway; and we can expect that to happen again some time in the future.

It would seen that improvement of the road bed in the break-up area would be of a higher priority that building a stretch of road that it has been admitted is not needed at this time, but that <u>may</u> be necessary in fifteen years.

The discovery of oil in parts of British Columbia has had the usual effect and we could hardly recognize some of the little communities with their bustling refineries and typical boom town mushroom growth.



#### VINS CASH PRIZE


A cash jack-pot of \$125-was won at the CBA Bingo game last Saturday evening by Hubert Reid of Peters Creek.

#### RUSSIAN PERUSKKI

BOIL:

- 1½ lbs. hamburger (start in cold water with...

- 2 stalks celery



AMENDMENTS TO GALE REGULATIONS AVAILABLE

Amendments to the 1960 game regulations are now available, it was announced by C.L. Anderson, Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

Designated "supplement No. 1" it contains changes and additions passed by the Alaska Board of Fish and Game at its spring meeting.

The supplement contains regulations for the special moose hunts to be held this fall in the Cordova and Anchorage areas, as well as several other new or altered provisions, all of which are now in effect.

The amendments are being distributed to licensing officers and to offices of the Department throughout the state.

All prospective hunters and trappers are cautioned that they are expected to avide by the amendments, which are printed separately from "Game Regulatory Announcement No. 1", which has been in circulation since last January.

The Supplements will be available at offices of the Alaska Department of Fish and Come and at sporting goods stores throughout the state.


