These together with the temporary buildings that were used last year, bring the total to nine.

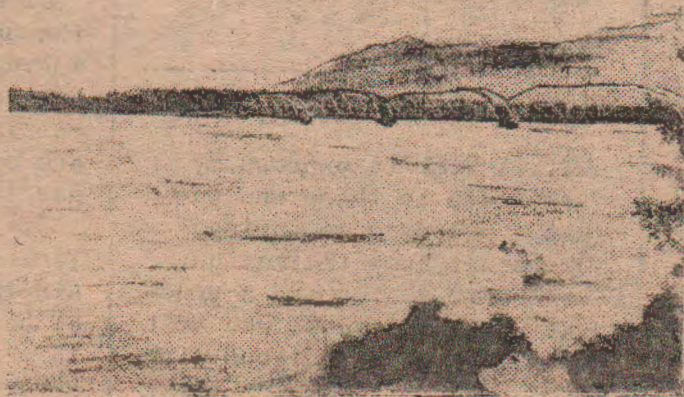
The new buildings are of the frame surplus barracks variety.

## LAKE GEORGE GOES OUT

Water covered the Glenn Highway in at least a half a dozen places last Sunday, as Lake George went out, raising the Knik River to the flood stages.

It crested some time between 2am and 10am Sunday morning, according to the U.S. Geological Survey.

Although sections of the Glenn Highway were under at least a foot of water, traffic was able to proceed, although in some places only one lane moved at a time.

MORE ABOUT ROADS

This year as we observed an  
annual phenomenon, we thought  
once again about the subject  
of roads in our state, and  
how was the wisest way to  
spend the limited amount of  
money that is available for  
this.

As we watched the rising  
waters of the Knik River,  
raised to flood stage by the  
Lake George Break up wash  
over and wear away at the  
same low spots in the high-  
way which are inundated each  
year, we couldn't help but  
wonder if this was not a much  
more logical place to use  
that money, rather than in  
constructing the much con-  
tested "Chugiak By-Pass".

If the level of the Glenn  
Highway had been raised just  
one foot, at several places,  
the water would not have  
covered it this year. If  
it were raised three or four  
feet, then even during the  
record high years, the sur-  
face of the road would be ab-  
ove water.

This was a comparatively  
mild break-up. The water  
was only about a foot deep  
at the worst part of the  
road. Still that was en-  
ough to cause some damage  
to the black-top and even  
minor repairs are costly;  
especially when we can look  
to this to happen year after  
year, as long as the Lake  
George break-up continues.

As we said, this year the  
break up was a mild one, but  
not too long ago whole sec-  
tions of the road was washed  
away; and we can expect that  
to happen again some time in  
the future.

It would seem that improve-  
ment of the road bed in the  
break-up area would be of a  
higher priority that build-  
ing a stretch of road that  
it has been admitted is not  
needed at this time, but  
that may be necessary in  
fifteen years.

Chugiak is now tied for first place after winning their last two games.

The game of Wednesday, July 13th was played in Anchorage at the Mt. View diamond against the White Sox.

Chugiak came out victors by a score of 15 to 3.

Pitching for Chugiak, and credited with the win, was Gary Hoag, Chugiak's left-handed pitcher. He allowed only one hit during the innings which he pitched. He was relieved by Tommy Branch, who also pitched good ball for Chugiak.

Leading hitters for the game were Larry Sossaman, Chugiak catcher and Ronnie Brown.

Sossaman hit two homeruns for the Chugiak team and Brown two triples. Each of these boys also had a single to his credit.

The outstanding play of the game was made when Gary Hoag (who had been relieved by Branch as pitcher and sent to center field) made a beautiful catch and responded with a quick throw to second base for a double play.

Friday's game, was at Chugiak, when the home team defeated the Dodgers of Mt. Biew by a score of 17 to 3.

Pitching for Chugiak and credited with the win was Lester Stephens, who allowed only four hits by the opposition; while Tommy Branch acted as catcher.

Our recent trip up the Alaska Highway was the third we had made in nine years; and it was interesting to note the changes that had appeared during that time.

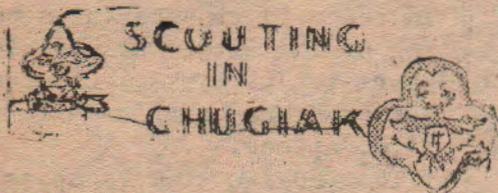

# The Cook of the Month

COOK FOR JULY - JOAN GLAFKE

One would suspect that the Glafke family are fond of dishes with a foreign flavor.

Two weeks ago, we printed Joan's recipe for an oriental dish, and this week, we offer an unusual way to prepare hamburger, with a delightful title.

## RUSSIAN PERUSKI

### BOIL:

- 1½ lbs. hamburger (start in cold water with...
- 1 onion chopped
- ½ green pepper diced
- 2 stalks celery
- 1 tsp Rosemary
- salt & pepper to taste

COOK about 30 min or 45 until done.

### COOL:

DRAIN off liquid  
PREPARE favorite raised roll recipe.

AFTER second raising take a small piece of dough and roll into oblong shape.

PLACE 1 tbs of meat mixture in center and pinch edges together.

CONTINUE with remainder of dough.

PLACE on baking sheets and let raise until double in bulk.

FRY in deep fat until golden.

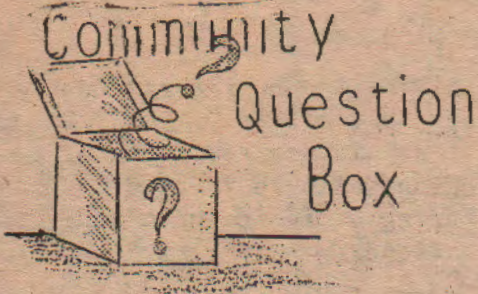

The Supplements will be available at offices of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game and at sporting goods stores throughout the state.

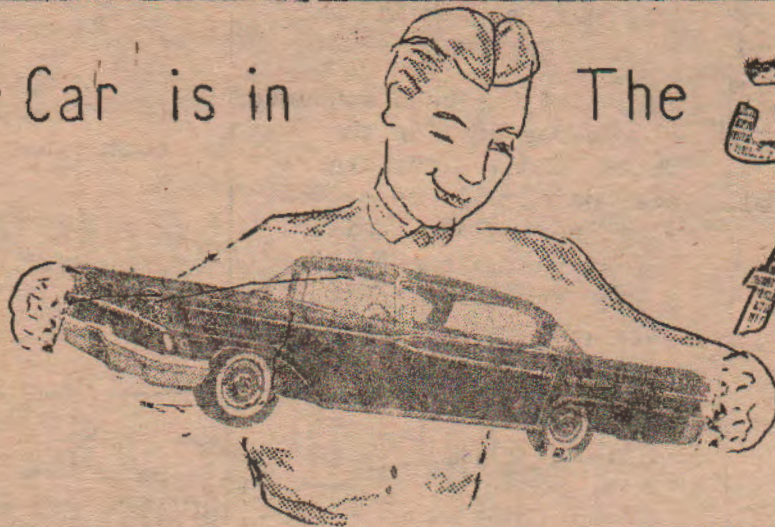

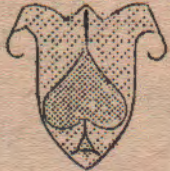
