The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company responded with a tanker and fought the blaze for several hours, before a bulldozer was brought in to clear around the burning area.

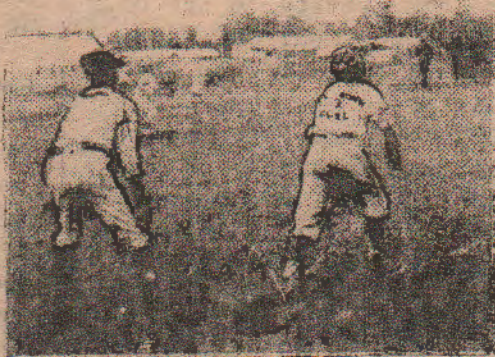
The fire was brought under control and subsequent rains are believed to have extinguished it.

attention of the people of
Chugiak.

Norris, Tiensvold, who is
at the present time in the
5040th Hospital, where he is
suffering from a fractured
neck, makes this request of
us.

He says that in the ward
where he is hospitalized
are a number of young ser-
vicemen whose condition is
what is known as ambulatory.

In other words, not sick
to the point where they are
bedridden, but not well en-
ough to be released. Many
of them are in casts or on
crutches.

Now if these men had homes
in the area, they would be
permitted to go to their
homes, but since they are
quartered in barracks, they
must remain in the hospital.

Now Norris has learned
that those men who have
friends living in the An-
chorage area, are permitted
weekend passes when they
are invited to visit these
friends. However, most of
them do not know anyone in
Alaska, and spend their lone-
ly weekends in the hospital.

Norris, who himself has
experienced the warm-hearted
generosity of the people
of Chugiak, feels sure that
there are many homes in the
community that would wel-
come the opportunity to ex-
tend hospitality to one of
these young men, and help
make the road to recovery
a little less rocky.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Tiens-
vold hope that this plea
will bring forth several
invitations, and they of-
fer to act as go-between
for anyone desiring to have
a weekend guest.

go wrong.

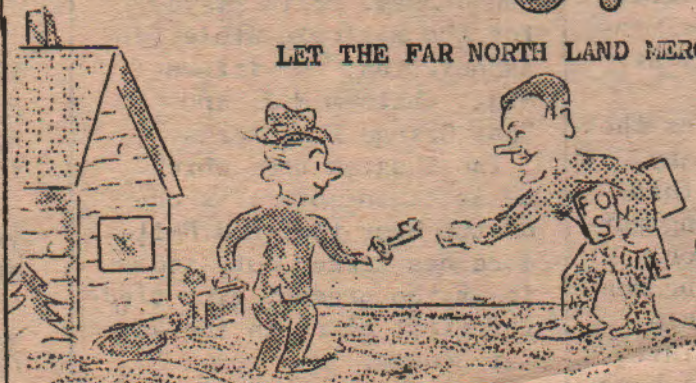
A well trained bird takes

Registration blanks became available on July 22nd regulations are available.

REGULATIONS ON GAMES OF CHANCE AVAILAABLE

Revenue Commissioner, Peter Gatz has said that copies of the proposed regulations to implement legislation passed by the recent State Legislature authorizing certain games of chance (next col.)

(games of chance)

and skill are available for all interested parties.

Copies of the regulations already have been sent to the B46 holders of permits issued in accordance with Chapter 27 SLA 1960, and to other known interested organizations and individuals.

Gatz said a hearing on the proposed regulations will be hwl's August 1 in the Senate Chamber of the Capitol at Juneau in accordance with provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act.

Persons or organizations not planning to attend the hearing may submit a statement of their views to the Department of Revenue, Games Division, Alaska Office Building, Juneau, post-marked not later than August 6.

In addition to the Juneau hearing, Gatz said, a Department of Revenue officer will be available at the City Council chambers in the basement of the Z.J Loussac Library, Anchorage, on August 3, between 9am and 12 noon and 1 pm and 4 pm to explain the proposed regulations to interested persons.

Copies of the regulations, the Commissioner said, may be obtained from Department of Revenue field offices in Anchorage, Fairbanks, Ketchikan and Nome.



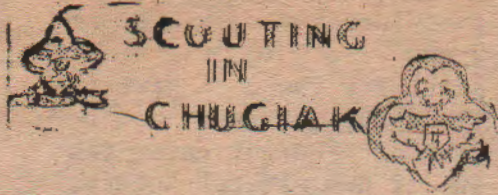

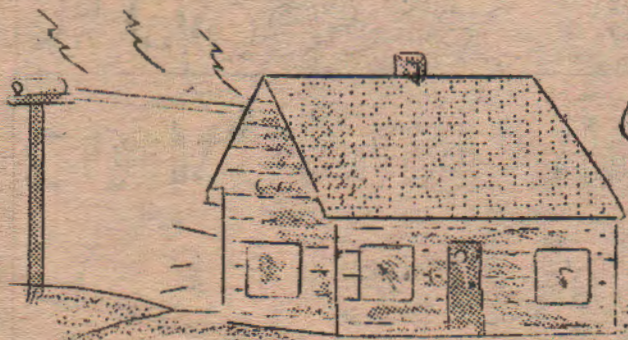

COOK FOR JULY - JOAN GLAFKE

Last week, Joan's recipe was Russian; this week it reminds us of the type of dish we associate with England; proving again that the Glafke's are fond of foreign foods.

BEEF & KIDNEY RAGOUT

- CUT 3/4 lean stewing beef into cubes
- REMOVE fat from 1 large or 2 small kidneys
- SLICE thin
- DREDGE beef in flour, salt & pepper.
- BROWN on all sides in hot fat.
- While meat is browning, put kidney in sauce pan with water to cover.
- COOK 15-20 min, or until scum forms.
- SKIM this off.
- DRAIN kidney and strain broth thru fine sieve.
- ADD 1qt broth (kidney broth & water to make quantity to well browned beef.
- NOW ADD:
 - 2 tbs paprika
 - 1 tbs meat sauce
 - 1 tbs Worcestershire sauce
 - 1/2 bay leaf (crushed)
 - 1/8 tsp thyme
 - 1/8 tsp pepper
 - 3 large onions (minced)
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped parsley
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
 - Sliced kidneys (add last)
- COVER & simmer about 2 hrs over low heat.
- ADD more salt if necessary (next col.)

 ADD 1 can mushrooms, sliced
 SKIM off any fat that floats on top
 When meat is tender
 THICKEN slightly with 2 tbs flour mixed with water to for paste.

GENERAL FUND CLIMBS

Alaska's general fund climbed by nearly 10 million dollars during the first full fiscal year of Statehood, Governor William A. Egan said today. The favorable trend left the fund with an effective balance of \$15,152,137.98 as of June 30th--more than \$6,000,000 above the general fund balance estimated by state planners for that date in preparation of budget figures last fall.

The Governor made public a report by Revenue Commissioner Peter Gatz, which showed that Alaska's general fund balance as of June 30th, totaled \$19,919,065.98 as compared with, but \$5,237,483.52 when the fiscal year began July 1, 1959.

Of the \$19,000,000 figure, however, \$4,866,928 represented transitional grant funds from the federal government which remain to be allocated among various State programs.

Gatz advised the Governor that even upon completion of the final allocation of the transitional funds, a portion of these funds is expected to be retained in the general fund account. Referring to (next col.)

(general fund)

the \$9,814,654.46 general fund increase over the previous June 30th, Gatz said the gain "for the most part is the result of increased revenue over budget estimates in oil and mineral leases, taxes and licenses and interest income."

Egan said this "excellent report on Alaska's financial position after a full fiscal year under Statehood is vivid evidence that Alaska's economy is growing which warrants all Alaskan looking to the future with optimism."

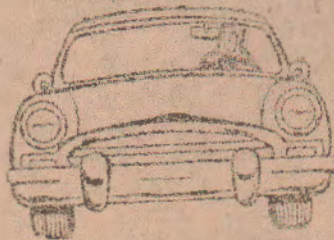
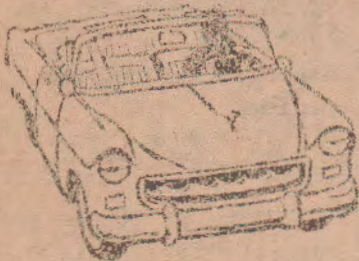

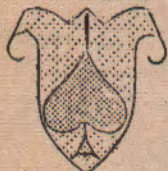
