Birchwood Man Found Dead

The body of John Weeks of Birchwood was found in his cabin by a neighbor last Monday.

Allen Taft, the neighbor, had become concerned when he failed to seek Weeks for several days, and placed a stick against the door of his cabin.

When the stick remained undisturbed for several more days, he investigated and discovered Weeks dead.

The State Police responded to the call with the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. rescue unit standing by.

At the time no visible cause for the death was discovered, and the coroner's office has the matter under investigation.

HIGHWAY HEARING DRAWS PROTESTS

Feelings ran high against the proposed highway changes at the public hearing held at the Chugiak Carnival Hall last week.

Approximately 100 persons attended to voice their dissatisfaction at the prospect of the new road which would by-pass Chugiak.

Mr. Lee Hubbard, District Highway Engineer, from Anchorage and Mr. John Fairley from the State Division of Highways in Juneau were there to explain the new route, along with Mr. Robert Johnson of Eagle River in an unofficial capacity, who had participated in the survey when he was employed by the BPR.

Mr. Johnson explained that this road would be planned along the lines of Federal Aid Highways in other states, which were being designed with an eye on the traffic

"Move Capital to Chugiak" Drive Underway

A plan to re-locate the State Capital in the Chugiak area is being promoted by Carl Steeby, resident of Birchwood, and a candidate for the State House of Representatives.

Steeby a former homesteader and now assistant Resident Engineer on the Cooper Lake Hydroelectric Project gives these reasons for proposing this area as the most desirable place to locate the new capital.

"Beazh Lake area is the "most feasible" site; located midway between Palmer and Anchorage, it is near the Alaskan center of population and within one hours drive of Anchorage International Airport.

This area could be reached by railroad, air, and highway, with the proposed super highway between Anchorage and Fairbanks within 2 1/2 miles. There is over 2500 acres of public land within easy access of existing power facilities, excellent water supply and good sub-soil conditions.

The scenic beauty of the location would do our capital justice; located on a beautiful lake about 40 acres in size, it is nestled between the Chugach Mountains on the Southeast, the Talketna Mountains on the northeast and the Alaska Range on the West and northwest, with Mt. McKinley as a backdrop for the Sustna and Matanuska Valleys having Knik Arm in the foreground. The Chugiak area is one of gently rolling hills and numerous small lakes, making it ideal for residential development.

WHO DOES WANT THE ROAD?

The representatives from the State Division of Highways left Chugiak with little doubt as to the sentiments of the residents regarding the proposed highway change; if indeed they harbored any doubts in the beginning.

It was obvious that the reaction of the local people was exactly as they had expected and that the hearing was held merely to comply with the federal law requiring one, rather than from any need to learn how the people actually felt.

With the exception of a very few individuals who admitted that they had neither anything to gain or lose by the construction of the new road, the residents of Chugiak were wholeheartedly and emphatically against the change.

It cannot be denied that should the main flow of traffic be directed away from the Chugiak area it would be a death blow to most of the businesses along the Glenn Highway, and badly cripple those remaining.

Chugiak is unique in that it exists only because the Glenn Highway exists. Most communities have some industry or similar reason for their existence. Chugiak formed around the nucleus of the highway and it is the highway traffic which supports most of its business.

The map which was displayed (next col.)

(highway)

at the meeting showed roughly ten miles of road which left the Glenn Highway at Eagle River, paralleled it for approximately ten miles, and then rejoined it just beyond Peters Creek. As one person observed, it looked as though it had been thus designed for the sole purpose of by-passing Chugiak.

On the other side of the ledger, is the fact that a Senator Ryan pointed out, the people in the rest of Alaska, those without any roads of any description, are quite hostile to having State Funds used for road building in an area that already has the best road in the State when they are doing without.

So there we have it. The people of Chugiak don't want the road...it would wipe out most of the business people on the highway, leaving the area a community of commuters forced to do without the convenience of stores and other services in their own locale.

The rest of the State doesn't want to see this road put in, at least not until their own immediate needs have been met. This leaves one to wonder, just who does want the road?

The feeling of most of those attending the meeting was that we ure going to have the new road "crammed down our throats whether we wish it or not."

However, there is one comforting thought in the whole unhappy situation. We were told that since some state funds were involved

it would have to be voted on by the State legislature and later signed by the Governor.

It is hard to believe that these elected officials would pass upon something that is against the desires and best interests of the people of the State.

Steeby offers these thoughts on Chugiak as the future site of the new Capital of Alaska, and is anxious to hear from other residents in the community on the subject.

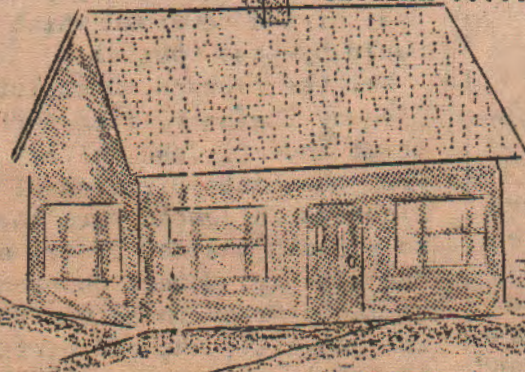

ABSENTEES MAY NOW CAST BALLOTS

Alaskans who don't expect to be on hand for the August 9th primary could begin to cast their absentee ballots as of June 30th.

The opening of the absentee voting period, set forth in the State's (next col.)

(absentee voting)

new election code, was called to the attention of Alaska's voters by Secretary of State Hugh J. Wade.

Requests already received by his office and at the offices of magistrates and deputy magistrates throughout the State, he said, indicate a large vote in all election districts.

Absentee voting procedures are simple. An eligible voter who expects to be outside his voting precinct on election day can do one of two things.

He can go to the office of the magistrate or deputy magistrate in his election district and vote an absentee ballot in person at anytime up to August 8th, one day before the election; or

He may request by letter or postcard that a ballot be mailed to him at his temporary address. Such requests should be sent to the office of the Secretary of State, or the local magistrate or deputy magistrate, and should include the voters name and Alaskan address and be postmarked not less than four days before the election. The completed ballot should be returned with a postmark not later than election day.

The election code also provides a third method for voting absentee, using a ballot obtained by personal representative of the voter.

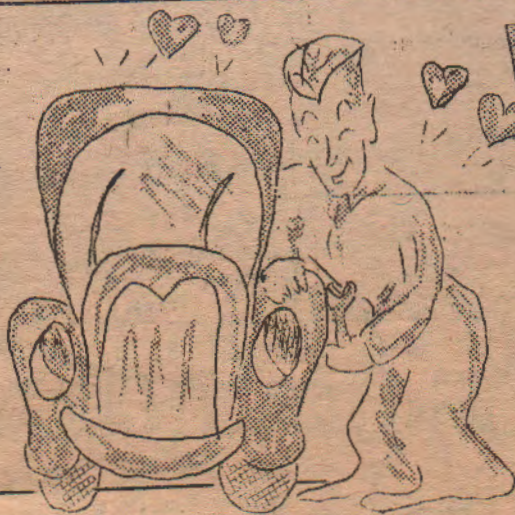

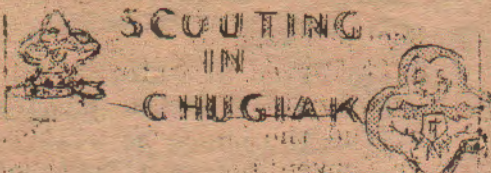

Mrs. Alton (Besse) Cross is in Providence Hospital where she is recovering from major surgery.

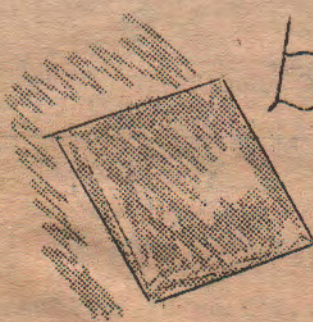

requirements in the year of 1975.

He said that eventually it would be a four lane divided highway, although it was later admitted that the present plans called for a two lane highway, with no definite date to increase it to four lanes.

It seemed to be the opinion of those present that the present Glenn Highway could be improved to fill all current needs at a much less expense and would also not cause the economic upheaval to the community as rerouting the road would create.

Senator Irene Ryan, who had attended the meeting, said at that time that people in other parts of the State were quite strong in their feelings against the expenditure of highway funds in this area, when most of them were without any roads of any description.

Some of the reasons given for the new route were, more suitable terrain, most economical direct route, insufficient right of way on present Glenn Highway.

It was mentioned that a great deal of the new road would be on Federal Land, and that the cost of securing right of ways would be much less, than if the present road were to be widened.

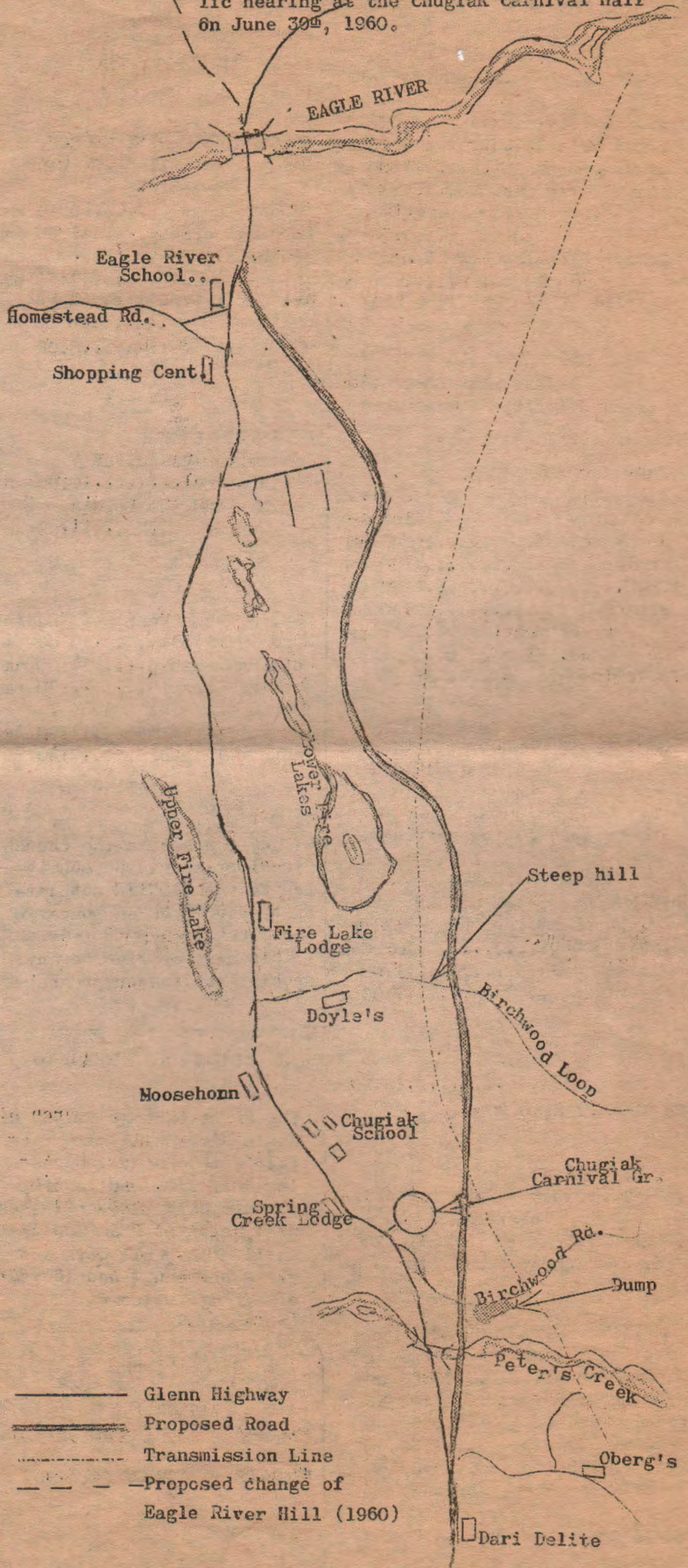
It was brought out that the proposed changes to render the Eagle River Hill approach safer were on a different program and would be started this year, regardless of the decision to change the road.

It could not be learned at that time when the final decision concerning the change would be made, or who would be responsible for making the decision.

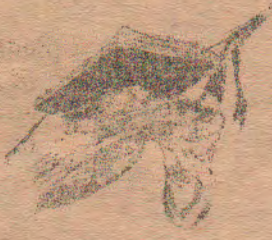

COURIER ADS GET RESULTS

Gov. Egan from Senator
 E.L Bartlett, who had
 offered the proposal
 as an amendment to the
 Federal Highway Aid bill now
 under consideration.

Also approved by the con-
 fererees was an amendment ad-
 vanced by the Alaska congress-
 sional delegation authoriz-
 ing the use of Federal high-
 way aid funds for the const-
 ruction of ferry approaches.

Governor Egan said this
 would result in savings of
 approximately 1½ million
 dollars for Alaska in devel-
 opment of the proposed South-
 east ferry system.

Both proposals still are sub-
 ject to formal adoption by
 the House and Senate and by
 the President.

The Bartlett proposal would
 be applicable to all public
 lands states, reducing their
 total matching requirements by
 some 12½ million dollars.

This would be accomplished
 by giving the States credit
 for certain reserved and ap-
 propriated public lands not now
 considered in the formula
 which determines matching re-
 quirements.

Alaska's share of the pro-
 posed reduction would amount
 to some four million dollars.

The reduction would not re-
 sult in any decrease in the
 amount of federal highway aid
 received by the State.

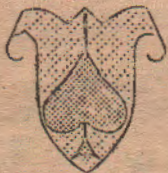

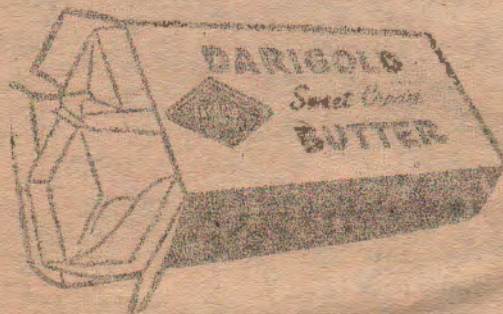
