Cabin Burned at Eagle River

Fire completely gutted a frame cabin belonging to J. Johnson at mile 14 (behind the Town House Bar.

The cabin which was being used as a residence, was occupied by a Mr. McGavern.

The fire had apparently started in some clothing beside the bed and spread to the mattress.

The Chugiak Fire Co. responded to the call, but were unable to use the Jeep pumper, as that piece of equipment was not in working order. Hand extinguishers were not enough to bring the fire under control.

The fire damage to the building and belongings was estimated at around \$1,800.

The cause of the fire is as yet undetermined and is under investigation.

The Cook of The Month

- COOK FOR AUGUST -

CHRISTA BURE

The dessert which Christa has given us this week, requires a type of baking pan known as a "springform", which may be purchased at most any housewares counter.

OBSTKUCHEN (Fruitcake) in Springform

- 2 eggs
- 2 tbs water
- 10 tbs sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 10 tbs cakeflour
- 2 tap baking powder
- 2 tbs butter
- Fruits for topping

- BEAT egg yolks, with water, sugar and fanilla un-til frothy
 - ADD sifted flour and baking powder
 - MIX with the slightly warmed butter
 - FOLD into the stiffly beaten egg whites
 - POUR into a well greased springform
 - BAKE at med heat (350°) for about 15 minutes
 - REMOVE from form, allow to cool and replace form
 - ARRANGE fruit on top (use pineapple, fruit cocktail, cherries, or sauteed apples with plums for a delicious topping)
 - PREPARE a clear gelatin, using Knox gelatin with the liquid from the fruits
 - POUR over fruit when slightly thickened.
 - PLACE in refrigerator to set until firm.

TAX REVIEW PROGRAM UNDERWAY

JUNEAU: A full blown crash program is underway in the Employment Security Division readying the new experience rating and variable tax adopted by the 1960 Legislature.

The division, a part of the state Labor Department, has been at work more than a month preparing for the new system that goes into effect Oct. 1. When that date rolls around employers and workers will pay their employment security tax under a variable rate that sliced up and down according to the past record of employment.

The crash program entails the detective work involved in tracing back through the 12 quarterly tax reports

from April 1957 to March 31 1960 from each of Alaska's 4,216 business firms.

The painstaking reasearch is conducted by the divisions accounting section, which must sift the records of each business to insure that all payments and reports have been made and that all subsequent audits and other tax changes have been noted.

The research is the heart of the program, because the accounting section's findings will determine the variable tax rate of both the employer and his workers.

If the firm has missed filing a quarterly report during the measuring period, or is delinquent in a tax payment, both the management and the labor force will be taxed the maximum under the variable rate.

The rate itself is designed to tax more heavily those employers that have a seasonal activity or whose payroll fluctuates substantially, following a roller-coaster route from quarter to quarter.

For the employer, the new tax rate will range from a low of 1.5% to a maximum of 4%.

The worker's rate will vary from a low tax rate of 3/10 of 1% to a high of 9/10 of 1%.

Actually there will be three divisions of the contribution schedule, the maximum rate, and the standard rate. The Standard rate, set at 2.9% for employers and 6/10 of 1% for the workers, is for those business firms who have been in operation less than four consecutive quarters.

Results of the accounting sections research is transferred to batteries of electronic IBM machines, which

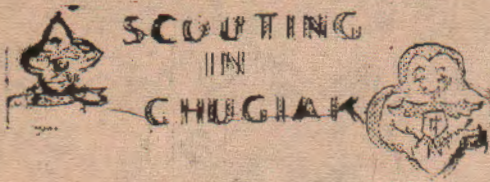

digest the tabulations, compute rates and other data and then code the information on cards.

The entire project is scheduled for completion late in September, so the new variable tax rate notices for employment during the Oct. 1, to Dec. 31 quarter can be mailed.

At that time, the employer and his workers will be informed of their experience rating and their tax rates for this year's final tax quarter.

However, the Employment, Security Division will then begin work on computing new variable rates which will apply throughout 1961.

This job also will be based on the experience of the past 12 quarters, but it will be less difficult, because of the initial ground work already laid.

The Legislature directed that the variable rating system was to go into effect for the last quarter of this year.

In the future, however, the rates will be determined each December for the oncoming new year.
